Motley Junior Rodeo Draws Many Entries

The fifth annual Motley County Junior Rodeo drew two-hundred twenty entries to the two day event which ended this past Saturday night. Local contestants competed with other entries from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Area spectators were held breathless as they anxiously awaited the chute-gate opening on two new local entries in the Pee Wee Steer Riding. These two "future world champion hopefuls" trying their hand on bucking stock for the first time were Ron Cox and Heath Campbell. Both made excellent rides and although neither made the whistle, Heath managed to end up with a shining bruise to the forehead to account for his efforts.

Miss Lacy Parks, four year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Parks, entered the Pee Wee Division of Pole Bending and Flag Race. Billy Lefevre and Darryl Perryman, "old hands on the rodeo circuit" were also entered in the Pee Wee division. Brent Hamilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hamilton of Plainview, was here entering his first rodeo. Brent competed in the Flag Race.

Ross Graham of Matador entered the Jr. and Sr. heading and heeling, while Dennis Gwinn, Jeff Braselton, and Jelly Walker made "good showings" in the Sr. Bareback event. Other local entries are listed in the final rodeo results.

night Stick Horse Race in the 5 and 6 year age division were: 1st Kathy Perryman; 2nd Heather Hobbs; 3rd Burr Barton. The second place winner in the 4 and under was Lacy Parks. Names on the first and third place winners were not available.

Winners of the Saturday night Stick Horse Race were: Age 4 and Under: 1st Lacy Parks; 2nd Jennifer Grundy and 3rd Stephanie Hughes. Age 5 and 6: 1st Mack Marshall, 2nd Rob Hamilton and 3rd Heather Hobbs.

Miss Renee Renfro was crowned 1980 Rodeo Queen by Miss Rebecca Finch, last year's rodeo queen, during the final performance on Saturday night. Miss Renfro sold \$550 worth of chances on a pair of handmade boots and Miss Darla Dempsey, runner-up, sold \$542. Through the tremendous support of the community and the good job each of these girls did, the profit topped our last year's queen contest. Winner of the handmade boots was Julian Zabielski.

The boots will be made by Dude Damron of Matador.

The All-Around Girls title in the Pee Wee Division went to Kimberly Tatum of Vernon and the All-Around Boys title went to Bryan Keith of Afton. This is the second year in a row that Bryan has captured the title.

Tornado Warnings, Hail Hit County On Monday

Golfball size hail and a tornado warning sent Matador and Motley County residents to storm shelters Monday evening.

The National Weather Service in Lubbock issued a tornado warning for Matador following a report of a tornado in Matador.

Sheriff Alton Marshall said when contacted by the Tribune, "We have no idea who reported the tornado."

Residents of Motley County are asked to report any serious weather or tornado sightings to the local Sheriff's Office instead

of calling the Weather Bureau in Lubbock.

Shortly before ten o'clock the storm warning siren was sounded by cloud watchers, but no damage has been reported in the Matador vicinity.

Matador Received .40 inch of rain and pea size to golf ball size hail. No serious crop damage has been reported to the Tribune.

About .15 inch of rain was reported South of Flomot along with some hail, but it was reported that crop damage was not too severe.

Roaring Springs reported .88 inch of rain along with marble size hail.

Motley County 4-H Camp To Be Monday, Tuesday

According to County Agent Jerry Cummins the annual Tri-County Camp for Dickens, Kent and Motley County 4-H Club members will be held at Roaring Springs, June 23-24, 1980.

Registration begins at 10:00 a.m. Monday, June 23. Camp will be dismissed on Tuesday, June 24 at 11:30 a.m.

Parents are responsible for transportation to and from the camp. A camp fee of \$5.00 will be charged to overnight campers and \$4.00 for one day campers. This is to cover the cost of insurance and meals. Bring extra money for drinks, candy and food, which are sold at the pool. 4-H'ers can bring a sack lunch and drinks for noon June 23.

Activities will include swimming, softball, and volleyball games. You must participate unless excused by parents. A square dance party will be held Monday night. Any parent who does not want their child to swim or participate in square dancing should notify their county agent. Any boy or girl who wants to go to swim will be given a special instruction. The following items should be brought to

camp: \$5.00 for camp fee and extra money for drinks and snacks (overnight campers), \$4.00 camp fee for one day campers, sack lunch for Monday if desired (hamburger can be bought at Roaring Springs), swim suit and towels and extra clothing, cot or bedroll (if you plan to stay overnight), and a ball glove. Parents should attend the entire camp. If parents come for the night meal only, the child should register for the parent and pay \$3.00 for each person who will be at camp for supper. Parents must sign a release for each child and state who their leader is.

Activities will include a track meet and swim meet to be held on Monday. Ribbons will be presented for the first five places.

There will be one adult for every five 4-H'ers. A 4-H'er must have an adult sponsor and the sponsor's permission in order to get in the gate. The permission slip must be turned in. Extension Service programs are available to people of all ages regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

On the Curtis Ozborn farm south of Afton the roof of a chicken house was lifted off and wrapped around an old pickup. It is assumed that a small tornado did the damage.

In a strip to the Southeast of Afton marble size to baseball size hail was reported along with 1 1/4 inches of rain. Several roofs were reported damaged by the hail along with some crops in that area.

One and one-half inch of rain and some marble size hail was reported on the Robert Forbis farm North of Afton.

Vandalism Is Reported At East Mound Cemetery

A rash of vandalism has been reported recently at East Mound Cemetery. A number of residents who have placed artificial flowers and arrangements on the grave of a loved one, have reported that the arrangements were missing several days later. This has been happening for a number of years, but has gotten especially bad during Mother's Day, Memorial Day, and Father's Day week ends according to reports.

To remove these flowers without authorization is a misdemeanor and charges will be filed

against anyone caught. Sheriff Alton Marshall has been contacted by Joe Freeman, local funeral director, who has promised his full cooperation to try to stop these thefts.

Fresh flowers arrangements are removed by cemetery workers after they have wilted and are no longer pretty. But artificial arrangements can be left for six months to a year before needing to be removed.

One family who has relatives buried in East Mound Cemetery, recently placed a silk flower arrangement on the grave. They returned to

the cemetery several days later to see if the flowers were all right after being outside, and discovered that twelve of the best flowers had been removed from the center of the arrangement, ruining the looks of it. They reported the vandalism to Pat Seigler, owner of Seigler Funeral Home here.

The removal of these flowers from various graves has caused unnecessary pain to the families who placed them on the graves.

It is again stressed that anyone caught taking these arrangements will be prosecuted.

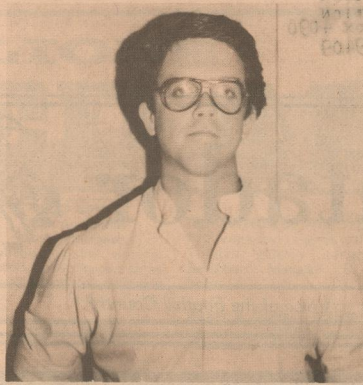



