#### Bill Barnhill Receives Degree

Bill Scott Barnhill graduated June 7, 1980 from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School of Dallas. He is the son of John L. Barnhill of Matador and Billie Barnhill of Lubbock.

Bill was ranked 12 out of 209 students graduating in the 1980 class. In addition to this accomplishment, he was selected into the honorary medical society Alpha Omega Alpha. Membership in the fraternity is based on high achievements and grade point averages; and consists of

the top 13% of the class.

During his junior year in medical school he was awarded the Texas Merit Scholarship.

#### Drivers Urged To Prepare For Trips and Vacations

Drivers should prepare themselves for summer driving, according to Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. With summer approaching many people are planning vacations and hewarned drivers that accidents spoil vacation trips.

He said, "Summer driving is different because the motorist is trying to get away from it all and this means getting into an unfamiliar environment."

multilane mix of car and pedestrian city traffic."
Bell said, 'Fatigue and lack of alertness is a serious problem on long freeway trips." He advised the motorist to stop every two hours to rest and never drive more than ten hours each day. He suggested that motorists get at least eight hours rest each night.

He stated that motorists entering large cities should plan their trips to avoid rush hour traffic, keep their speed down, stay with the traffic flow and be patient.

## Federal Land Bank Loan Rate Decreases

Ted D. Jordan, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, announced that effective June 1, 1980 new loan will be closed at the variable interest rate of 9-¼% on farm loans and 10-¼ on rural residence loans, the same rate now being charged existing borrowers on the variable rate. This is a reduction from a 12% fixed rate on farm loans and 14% on rural residence loans which was put into effect arlier this year. The Federal Land Bank of Texas introduced the variable rate loan in

1969, which allows the billing rate to increase and decrease with variables in the money market. Earlier this year, faced with unprecedented high money cost, a fixed rate loan was offered on a temporary basis. Improvement in the money market in recent weeks makes it possible to return to the variable rate on new loans.


