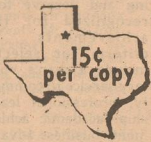

A Second Glance

John Anderson's decision to run as a third party candidate this year brings back memories of 1948 and 1968, when others tried it. It also brings back memories of third party threats of other years.

No third party candidate has made much of a ripple, as far as coming close to election, in over a hundred years. But a split Republican party probably elected Woodrow Wilson in 1912. William Taft, who won only 8 electoral votes, and Theodore Roosevelt, polled more popular votes than Wilson. Strom Thurmond's race in 1948 was closer than Democrats liked to admit. It didn't affect the outcome but had Thurmond carried only two more states (he carried four) it would have thrown the election into the House, where each delegation has one vote.

George Wallace won even more electoral votes in 1968 but didn't derail Richard Nixon. Wallace captured 46 (Thurmond had won 39). But Wallace, like Thurmond, missed. Had he won another 35 electoral votes, from states which went to Nixon, he too could have thrown the election into the House.

Robert LaFollette, in 1924, won 13 electoral votes but had no major impact on the race that year. The 1980 question is whether John Anderson's candidacy can be the first in this century to succeed. Obviously, it can't.

But it has some otherwise sensible liberals euphoric at the moment-talking of possible victory.

The real question--and the only question in one sense--about Anderson's plunge, is whether he will hurt the Democrat or Republican nominee more. Liberals claim he'll hurt the Democrat nominee most, because the Democrat nominee will be the more liberal of the two major candidates. But that seems unlikely.

Being a Republican, Anderson is certain to drain the moderate and independent vote from his party's more conservative candidate--and Republican Washington Senators and Congressmen fear that Anderson could, in this way, thwart Ronald Reagan's bid for the presidency. That's why so many liberal Democrats have been bubbling enthusiasm for Anderson from the beginning of this year's primary competition. They want him in the race, and their encouragement and crossover voting probably had much to do with getting him in the race.

Yet the chance remains that such a strong conservative tide is running in this country that the true conservative candidate will roll over both Carter (or even more liberal Kennedy) and Anderson. Nevertheless, the Illinois Congressman's entry is a blow to Republican hopes of party unity.

Kay Phillips, Sharlene Smith Named WT Honor Scholars

President's Honor Scholars at West Texas State University have been named from 160 schools in a five-station region for the 1980-81 academic year.

The 350 students from Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma and one student from Bloomington, Ind., have been chosen to receive \$100 scholarships.

Honor Scholars from Motley County High School in Matador are

The program was begun with contributions to the President's Development Fund. Scholarships since have been awarded through interest on the fund, \$200,000 from the Harrington Foundation and \$1,000 from Dr. Charles Townsend, WTSU professor of history.

The first group of President's Honor Scholars numbered 216 and 322 were awarded scholarships last year, said Keith Winter, director of development, whose office awards the scholarships.

Students must be members of National Honor Society chapters in high school or a similar honor organization or graduate with honors. Winter's office receives a list of eligible students from NHS

sponsors and high school principals in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains area, eastern New Mexico and other areas. The program also is discussed when admissions advisers visit schools to recruit students.

President's Honor Scholars will be honored at a reception at WTSU on Sept. 9 and parents will be invited to a reception on Sept. 27.

The Honorable John Connally, former Gov-

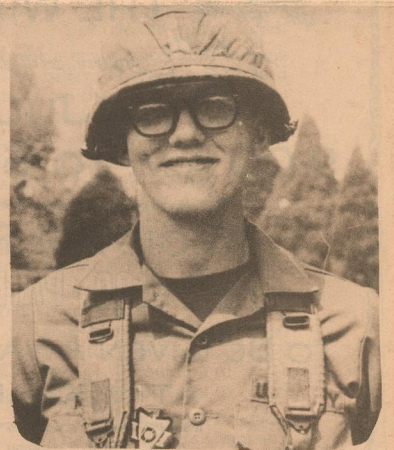

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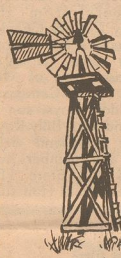

Entomologist Is Lions Club Speaker

An outline of the work being done in Motley County to control grasshopper and boll weevil infestations was given at the July 1 meeting of Matador Lions Club. Speaker was Warren Multer who recently assumed his duties here as county extension entomologist for Motley, Briscoe, Hall and Floyd counties.

Introduced by Lion John M. Russell, Multer explained the pest management program which he heads in the four-county area and the methods of determining the number of pests (insects) contained within cotton squares.

Peak emergence for boll weevils is usually within 45 days of planting, he said. The boll weevil trap program will get underway this month for farmers who have signed for it and paid the required fee.

"Grasshoppers are causing much damage to crops this year and have already reached the adult stage," Multer said.

"They are a one generation insect per year and migrate long distances." He explained the method used in calculating the number of grasshoppers per square yard, and said that "7XLR" was an effective insecticide for controlling such pests.

Boss Lion Alan Bingham presided and named committees for concession stand, scorekeepers and announcers for the softball tournament which the club will sponsor.

Dates for the tournament have been set for July 31, August 1-2, with Lion Bill Durham as general chairman and Ronnie Vandiver as concession chairman.

Lion Bob Stanley introduced Miss Virginia DeWitt, Social Security representative and Mrs. Lila Meador as guests, in addition to the speaker.

Appreciation was expressed for the enjoyable luncheon prepared and served by Lion Walter Jones, for the meeting in the United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

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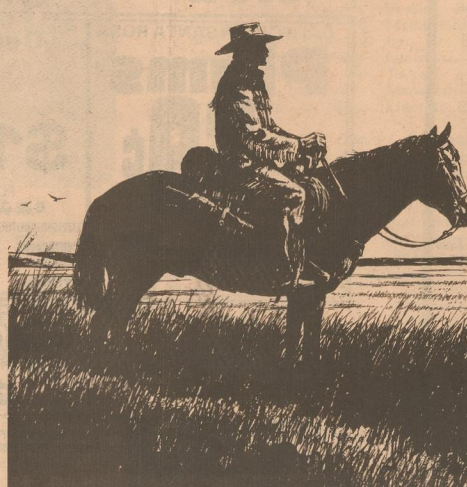
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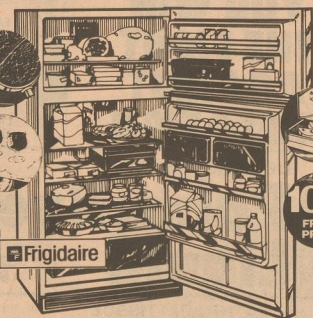
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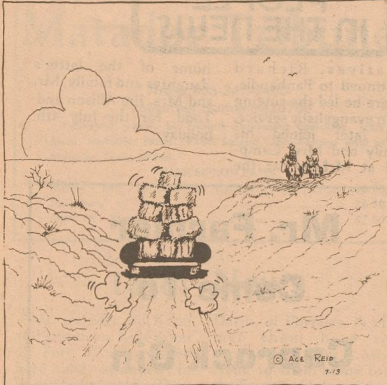
