

Hereford man injured in one-vehicle accident near Roaring Springs

A Hereford man was injured in a one-vehicle accident, early Saturday "First victim of Polio in Motley morning, January 10, at approximately 1:07 a.m. Victor Zavala, 23, was conveyed by Motley County Am-Lance Jameson, 6-month-old son of bulance to a point of destination at Hwy. 82, west of Dickens, where he was met by the Aerocare helicopter and transported to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

Zavala was driving a 1985 Ford Escort, at a high rate of speed, while evading arrest, when he veered off

the road near Roaring Springs at the Buzz Field Airport, and lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle flipped end over end and rolled two times. Zavala was ejected from the vehicle. He was not wearing a seat belt. Alcohol was a factor in the accident.

Charges are being filed against Zavala for driving while intoxicated, evading arrest, and reckless driving.

Lila Meador to be honored for 90th birthday

Lila Meador, longtime resident of Matador, will be honored on her 90th birthday, Saturday, January 16, 1999, 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church of Matador.

Mrs. Meador, along with her husband, Douglas 'Ben' Meador published the Matador Tribune for over

Lila and her sister, Opal, moved to Matador in 1928 to join their parents, Andrew and Aletha Tipton, their brother, Burrell, and little sister, Mary, who had moved to Motley County the year before, in 1927. Lila and Opal had stayed in Caruthersville, Missouri to finish high school before coming to Matador. The Tipton family moved to Motley County to be near family. Mr. Tipton had family in Northfield, a brother, Jim Tipton, who owned the Post Office and Grocery Store. Mrs. Tipton had family in Flomot, a brother, Leonard Crowell, who had come to Motley County in 1900. Lila's father began working as the Jailer for the Motley County Jail in Matador.

After moving to Matador, Lila's First National Bank as secretary. Meador said. Later, she was employed at the First

State Bank, also as secretary. In the interval between jobs, I was employed for a year in the office of Agriculture Agent Frank Buckley at the

Ben was working at the local drugstore. He had just recently returned to Matador, having been in California, trying to pursue a writing career. Lila and Ben were married June 22, 1929.

At the end of World War II, Lila resigned her job at the First State Bank, and joined her husband at the Matador Tribune, continuing until his death, and for three years longer until she sold the business in 1977.

Douglas Meador began his newspaper career working for the Childress Index and then the Roaring Springs News. He printed the Matador Tribune from 1933 until 1974. Mr. Meador died September 27,

The Tribune succeeded the Roaring Springs News and later combined with the Motley County News. Mr. Meador's column, "Trail Dust" was a regular feature in the paper. He won his first award for the paper in 1934, when the column was named Best Column in Texas at the State

Lila was left in charge of the Matador Tribune during a time when Mr. Meador owned the Morton Tribune for one year. He commuted by bus every weekday.

"I always had a lot of help at the Tribune," Mrs. Meador said, "mostly volunteer help."

Mrs. Meador said "During the War women with husbands overseas would help me get the paper out."

Sometimes the Tribune would not have a printer working for them, but it seemed that when one left, another would show up to replace him.

These printers, sometimes called "tramp printers," wandered around the country, working for newspapers along the way.

"Ben used to always say that God first job, in the fall of 1928, was at the watched over the Tribune," Mrs.

Meador's owned the paper, Mrs. Meador wrote and proofread copy, and took care of the books. She also had her own column, "Pied Pinions", which was printed somewhat sporadically from 1940-1960. Mrs. Meador quit her job at the bank in 1945 to devote more time to the pa-

Besides having help from women of the town and vagabond printers, the Meadors always hired young people, usually seniors from the local high school. "We took them to press conventions with us," Mrs. Meador said. "We always learned a lot at the press conventions, such as front page formats or ways to write a

One, now famous, young person the Meadors hired was Karen Elliott House, a Pulitzer Prize winner.

The Meadors had many people come and go during their 40 years at the Tribune, and many events were chronicled by the paper. Mrs. Meador said one thing Mr. Meador realized was the impact the paper had on the

people of Motley County.

Lila's home was Matador for 71 years, and for seventy years she has been a member of the First Baptist Church of Matador. She was actively involved in various organizations of the church, until that was curtailed by a stroke which she suffered four years ago. In November, 1994, after hospitalization and therapy, her youngest sister, Mary Crider, came to Matador and took Lila to her home in Odessa, where Mary and husband,

Jack, welcomed her. Another sister, Opal and Nolan Fulkerson, of Lubbock, had ministered to the needs of Mr. Meador during his ill ness and death and had taken care of Lila during the following years until illness took its toll in

A brother, Burrell Tipton of Dayton, died a few months ago, and a half-sister, Virginia, who lived in community and the lives of the Louisiana, died two years ago.

Livestock Assistance sign-up extended

Motley County has been approved for the extension for the Livestock Assistance Program (LAP). Applications will be taken through February 5, 1999. This program provides payments to eligible livestock producers who suffered losses from natural disasters in 1998. LAP assistance is based on the lessor of the feed value of available grazing land, or the feed value required for eligible livestock. When you file an application, you will be required to provide the following information:

> * Number, type, and weight range of livestock owned during the year.

* Acres, location, and type of grass or forage on which you experienced a loss in calendar year 1998.

* Percent of grazing loss.

* Information about changes in livestock numbers and dates when changes in livestock numbers occurred.

Remember your application must be filed by February 5, 1999. Please call the Farm Service Agency for an appointment today at (806) 347-2671.
