## Hospital Decision Gets Delay Action

FATE of Motley General Hospital has been delayed in the hope that the ruling of Medicare requiring 42 registered nurses in every facility can receive another interpretation.

An important move in the direction of making it possible for small hospitals to operate with one Registered Nurse is the result of efforts of a former resident, J. W. (John) Jackson of Wichita Falls. He is financial secretary and business representative of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, and read in the Tribune of the hospital's problem.

In a series of telephone calls to the newspapers and Fred Wallace, administrator of the Motley General Hospital, he brought the problem to the attention of Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who was in Wichita Falls Saturday.

An excerpt from the Wichita Falls Sunday Times, quoting Sen. Yarborough, is as follows: "... we in Congress are trying to get the HEW to interpret the law correctly which requires one registered nurse to be on duty 24 hours daily in order for medical care facilities to receive federal funded programs." He noted that in many cases this is being misinterpreted and resulting in the closing of many needed medical care units vital to communities.

Board of directors of the Motley General Hospital had previously set tonight for the regular meeting in which it was generally believed the decision to close the hospital would be announced. The meeting has been postponed in view of the fact that if the release should be granted to allow

operation with one registered nurse, it will be necessary for the facility to be open before it can be acceptable to Medicare.

At the termination of his leave he will report back to Brooks Hospital, and will be given his new assignment, which will be in the states.

## Showers Bring Aid To Most of County

COOLING SHOWERS to good rains Sunday and Monday brought relief to most areas of Motley County. Of almost equal value to the badly needed moisture was the relief from 100 degrees plus searing temperatures. Ranges in most areas of the county remain in need of sufficient moisture to revive the grass.

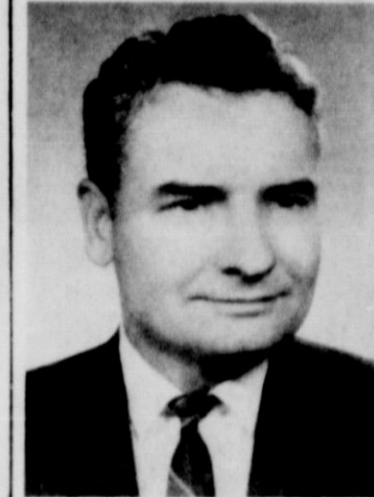
Farm crops in most sections have been greatly benefitted by the rains, especially in the Flomot, White Star areas. The rain was lighter south of Matador some sections south of Roaring Springs received only a trace. Parts of Northfield received over an inch.

Three unofficial reports indicate two inches or more. They include Furman Vinson, "Cotton"

Perkins and Ed Whitaker. Other reports received by the Tribune are France Barton 1.60, and W. R. Tilson 1.04. Bob Stanley's gauge here in Matador registered 53-inch while Fred G. Simpson Jr. caught 61-inch. Roaring Springs reported 40-inch.

Cooler air blanketed the area Monday and early Tuesday, however, the mercury rose to 90 degrees Tuesday afternoon.

Farmers say crops have been greatly benefitted in most areas, but that more rain is needed before the drought can be considered broken. A crucial situation at this time is the condition of grass land which has suffered because of the prolonged dry weather, and needs penetrating moisture.

## FLOMOT CHURCHES SPONSOR COMMUNITY TENT REVIVAL

Services will be held under the tent each evening at 8:00 o'clock during the week. Sunday services on the 23rd will be held by the individual churches in their own buildings, with final services in the tent that night.

Rev. Billy Hudnall of Rotan will be the revival evangelist. Rev. Vance Zinn of Floydada will lead the singing and will also preach in the Methodist Church Sunday morning, the 23rd, with Rev. Hudnall preaching at the First Baptist Church.

The community will join for the noon meal the last day of the revival, in the basement of the United Methodist Church.

It was further announced that a portion of the parking area will be reserved for those who are unable, because of disability, to leave their cars and attend services in the tent.

The men of the community will be working together on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 14-15, preparing the grounds, setting up the tent and hooking up the electricity.

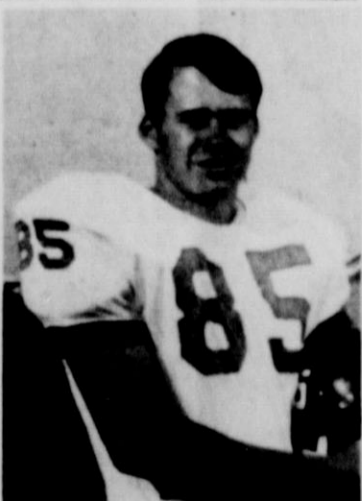

**New Book Describes Tornadoes In Texas**  
Tornado... Texas Demon in the Wind. By Dudley M. Lynch. Waco, Texas: Texian Press, 1970. 153 pages plus 24 pages of photographs. \$7.95.

Much of the mystery of the tornado will be dissolved for readers of this book. Scarcely a question that can be answered about nature's most vicious storm remains unanswered after the exhaustive research of this ex-newspaperman, now an Arizona magazine writer.

The heart of the book is four narrative chapters that carry the reader through four disastrous tornadoes as seen, heard, and felt by the victims. The four are the Tri-State, April 9, 1947 (in-

volving the Texas Panhandle); Waco, May 11, 1953; Dallas, April 2, 1957; and Lubbock, May 11, 1970. Publication of the book was delayed so the Lubbock chapter could be added.

The book contains 24 pages of photographs, several of historic interest. One is a rare photograph of the Tri-State funnel of 1947, still the most deadly ever to strike the Southwestern United States. Also the book contains several valuable charts on major and early Texas tornadoes.

Details of the weather conditions that produce tornadoes are numerous enough to attract the interest of weather students, but are not couched in technical terms. Laymen will find themselves intrigued as they begin to understand, perhaps for the first time, what is at stake in a tornado and why.

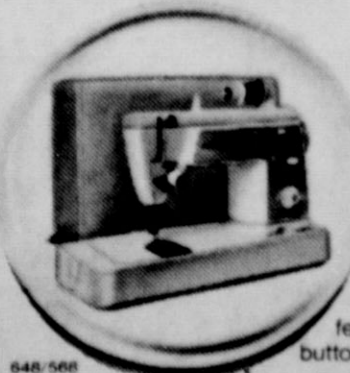

**HOSPITAL**

**NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY**

Policy for Motley General Hospital.

It is the policy of the Motley General Hospital to admit and treat all patients without regard to race, color or national origin. The same requirements for admissions are applied to all patients assigned within the facility and any room transfers are made without regard to race, color or national origin. There is no distinction in eligibility for, or in the manner of providing, any patient service provided by the hospital, or by others in or outside of the hospital. All facilities are available without distinction to all patients, employees, and visitors regardless of race, color or national origin. All persons involved in the referral of patients to the hospital or assignment of patients within the hospital are advised to do so without regard to the patient's race, color or national origin.

### Seven Proposed Amendments

Texas Citizens will be asked to vote their preference in the Nov. 3, 1970 general election on seven proposed Amendments to the Texas Constitution. These proposals will be listed on the General Election Ballot.

The 1876 Constitution of the State of Texas has been amended 195 times with the first amendment approved in 1879. There have been a total of 320 proposed amendments submitted to Texas voters since 1876. Sixteen amendments were approved by the 61st Legislature in 1969 with nine of them voted upon last year and seven to be submitted to voters this year.

Only four of the proposals presented to the voters last year received approval: the so-called clean-up amendment, which removed obsolete superfluous, and unnecessary sections of the constitution; the amendment giving the legislature authority to increase the ceiling on state assistance for the four classes of need; the amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of certain governmental officials and employees, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve or auxiliary units; and the amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan.

What are the seven proposed amendments for consideration this year?

No. 1. Amending Article V, Section 1-a, of the Texas Constitution, relating to removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges, and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2. Amending Article XVI, Section 20, Subsection (a), to authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.

No. 3. Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment on ranch, farm and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4. Amending Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), to reconstitute the State Building Commission as a three-member appointed commission.

No. 5. Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions.

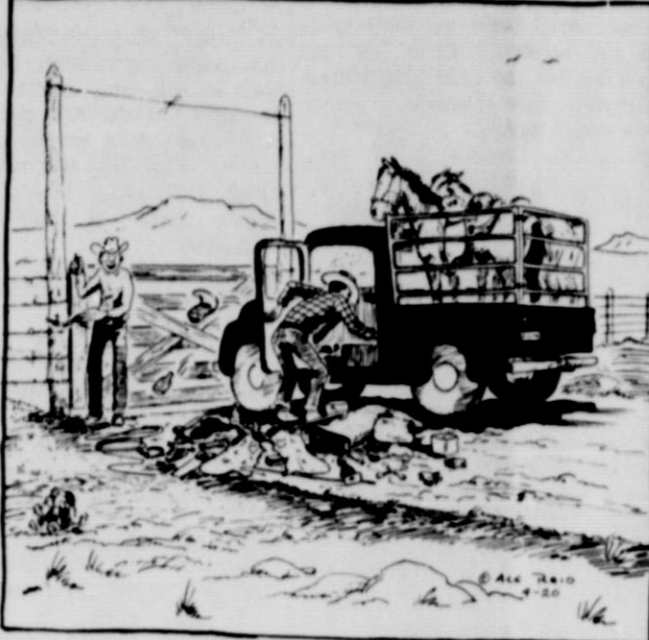
No. 6. Amending Article XVI, Section 51, to increase the value of the homestead exemption from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

No. 7. Authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

Proposed amendment No. 2 which would authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis and the proposed amendment (No. 3) providing for a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands are both controversial issues with voters.

### Crop Forecast Is 4,500 Bales

In a release dated July 31, Plains Cotton Growers forecast a 1970 production of 4,500 bales from Motley County's 24,000 acres standing. Last year the county produced 6,129 bales according to the information.

The estimate which includes 25 counties, says that about 30% of the over 2 million acres, is dry-land cotton. It says all the dry-land area is badly in need of rain.

Lubbock County is estimated at producing 230,000 bales. Other large cotton producing counties in the irrigated region are Dawson, Terry, Crosby, Lamb, Hockley, Lynn, Hale and Gaines. Low-est cotton acreage county in the list is Deaf Smith with 5,000 acres. Only four counties have lower cotton acreages than Motley.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointed commission."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

"Section 1-d. Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR25)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation, whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns or villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

"(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

"(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court."

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission."

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence, and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed."

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall act as a member of the Commission or the Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal."

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

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
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
