Albert Ellis Terry, 60, died about 10:30 a.m. Sunday at his home in north Matador, the victim of an apparent heart attack. He had suffered a heart ailment for several years.

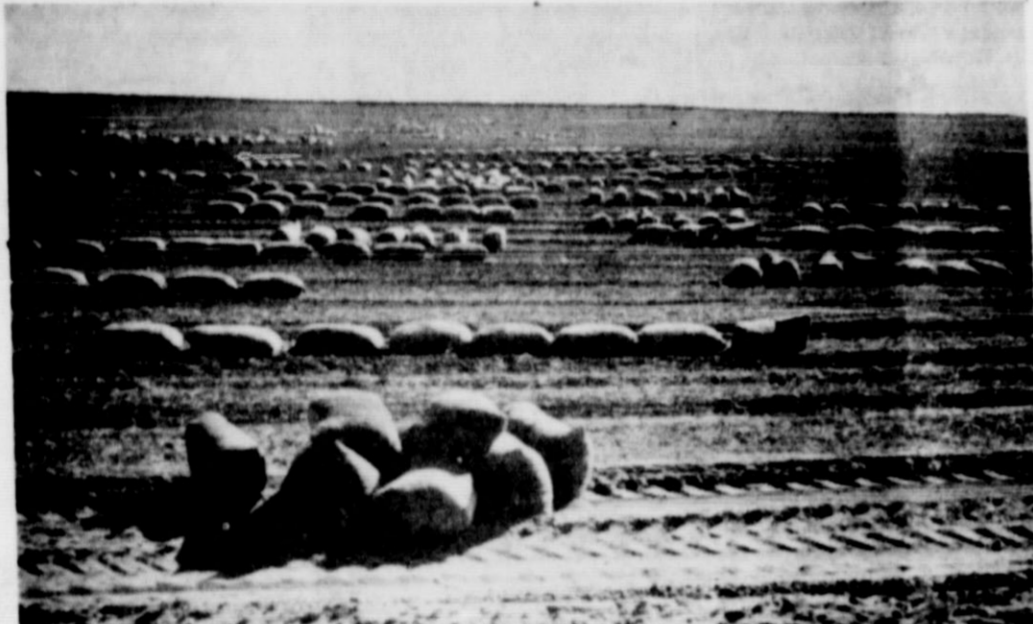

At one time four peanut combines were going in the north part of the county which produced about 1,500,000 pounds. The goobers were produced on 681.4 acres and average sale price was about \$225 per ton. Gross income from the 1966 crop was approximately \$170,000 according to County Agent Bill Palmmeier.

## Regrowth Shoots Endanger Cattle

Cattle and other livestock may be poisoned by regrowth shoots from maize, according to County Agent Bill Palmmeier. He has issued a warning to all livestock owners.

Mr. and Palmmeier called Dr. C. M. Patterson A&M Extension veterinarian, who said the shoots may be very poisonous and cautioned producers to hold off grazing fields until the shoots are over 24 inches in height, or killed by frost. Palmmeier said the previous frost was not enough to kill the crown of plants.

## Farmers Will Mail Vital Cotton Vote

THE FATE OF COTTON'S FUTURE may well rest in the hands of the grower between Dec. 5 and 9, when he votes on the marketing quota referendum, and at the same time vote on the cotton research and promotion program which will be financed by \$1 per bale uniform assessment. Voting will be done by mail by two (green and blue) ballots.

Bringing the importance of the election into closer perspective, it will mean that if the marketing quota referendum is vetoed the grower (less than 2 3rds of all growers) the price support and diversion payments will cease. In Motley County in 1966 more than \$900,000 was paid to growers.
