

THE FATE OF COTTON'S FUTURE may well rest in the hands of the grower between Dec. 5 and 9, when he votes on the marketing quota referendum, and at the same time vote on the cotton research and promotion program which would be financed by \$1 per bale uniform assessment. Voting will be done by mail by two (green and blue) bal-

Bringing the importance of the election into closer perspective, it will mean that if the marketing quota referendum is vetoed the grower (less than 2 3rds of all growers) the price support and diversion payments will cease. In Motley County in 1966 more than \$909,000 was paid to growers.


