

KEEP HOLIDAY FOOD **GIFTS SAFE...**

With the holiday season comes giftgiving, and food items are a popular choice for many hard-to-buy for friends and relatives. However, a well-intentioned gift can turn into a food safety diaster if

proper precautions are not taken.

Many food gift items, especially protein foods, are perishable and need to be kept at refrigerator temperatures. Others are specially processed and are safe to

are specially processed and are safe to keep at room temperatures. The best guideline to follow when selecting food gifts s to read the product label or ask for storage instructions from the vendor.

If a label says "keep refrigerated," it's a warning that the food is not safe when stored at room temperatures because processing procedures did not destroy bacteria or inhibit bacterial growth that causes food deterioration. For example, turkeys, hams and other meats are smoked for flavor, not preservation. These products still must be stored at refrigeration temperatures. Country hams are an exception. Their high-salt content and dryness prevent bacterial growth and make ness prevent bacterial growth and make them safe to keep at room temperature

Other gift foods -- canned meats, vacuum-packed steaks, sausage and cheese assortments - may or may not needrefrigeration depending on how they needretrigerauon depending on how they were procesed. Vacuum packaging itself does not make a food safe to keep at room temperature. Some sausages and cheese in gift assortments don't need refrigeration. They are shelf-stable due to brining, drying and food additives. These additives, together with processing. help pre-

drying and root adultives. These adultives, together with processing, help prevent spoilage and protect flavor. Look for label instructions for storage.

When sending food gifts, it's important to consider the length of time until they will be opened. For instance, it's nearly always unwise to send a food gift to someone's office during the holiday. nearly always limited to send a food gift to someone's office during the holiday season. They may be out and the gift may sit for days. In some cases, it would be safer to send the item to the home. Still, there would be some risk with perishable foods if the person is out of town, or if the item has to be signed for at the post office.

If the food gift is a perishable item, a personal delivery may be best. This can assure that the item receives proper care

Mail-order foods are often used for long distance gift-giving. When ordering a mail-order food gift, check with the food vendor to be sure that proper storage and delivery procedures will be followed: — Check the cold source. Ask what

kind of cold source will be used with perishable food and how long the package will be in transit. The cold source must last long enough so that food arrives still frozen or firm and cold. Canned or processed foods labeled "keep refrigerated" should also be shipped with a cold

— Check that the package will be labeled as perishable food on the outside. Perishables have a much better chance of

Perishables have a much better chance of surviving if properly labeled.
—Set a workable deliverly date. Once you know how long the mailing takes, call to find a date someone, either the receiver of a neighbor, can be home to receive the gift. Mention that this "surprise" should go straight into the refrigerator. Then call the mail-order house

back and set up delivery. When receiving a food gift, check items for signs of food deterioration and for proper storage and delivery conditions before accepting the

items. The company should guarantee proper delivery.

— Fresh or cooked meat, poultry or fish should arrive frozen or still hard in the middle. If never frozen, it should be cold to the touch.

— With the exception of dry-cured

— With the exception of dry-cured country hams, baked hams and most canned hams need refrigeration and should arrive cold.

 Some hard, dry sausages (pepper-oni, hard salamis) don't need refrigeration; other types (summer sausage, Leba-non bologna, Thuringer) do. If the label says "refrigerate," the sausage should arrive cold. Do not accept sausages with

There should be no mold on cheese except what is part of its nauture - blue mold in blue cheese, for example. "Runny" cheeses are also suspects.

— Cheesecake, perishable becuase of its ingredients, should arrive fully frozen.



Social Security Tips

WHAT EFFECT WOULD

There has been much interest generated by several proposals now before the Congress aimed at changing or eliminating Social Security's "retirement test"—the rules that limit the amount of money beneficial to the retirement test without effective. beneficiaries can earn without affecting their Social Security checks. But what would happen if the test were eliminated? Would beneficiaries be more likely to go

Would beneficiaries be more likely to go back to work and earn more, as most people believe?

A Social Security study completed about a year ago suggests otherwise. The study concluded that 80 percent or more of the 10 million persons age 65-69 getting Social Security would not change their work habits even if carnings limits were abolished The number of individuals also who would change their hours worked and earnings are fairty evenly split among those who would increase, decrease, or have an undertermined decrease, or have an undertermined change in their work effort.

change in their work effort. Under the earnings test, beneficiaries 65 and older can earn up to \$9,720 in 1991 (\$10,200 in 1992) before earnings are affected. Earnings over that reduce the benefits \$1 for each \$3 in excess earning. Beneficiaries under 65 can earn up to \$7,080 in 1991 (\$7,440 in 1992), and earnings above that reduce the benefits \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings. The earnings limits do not apply t beneficiaries 70 and older.

Have little effect on those with no earnings, or earnings below the offset threshold. These beneficiaries are as-sumed to already have the opportunity to increase their hours of work and earnings without affecting their Social Security

Considering the size of these five groups among 65-69 year olds, the overall change in work effort would be expected to be minor, the study concludes. Additionally, since there will not be a substantial increase in the workforce participation by this age group, there would be no significant increase in tax revenues as a result of the elimination of the earnings test.

Classifying the past week as a busy one for High Plains cotton people would be an understatement to say the least.

be an understatement to say the least. Cotton producers found themselves going full speed in an attempt to get the 1991 crop out of the field. Ag leaders were also hard pressed to attend many of the numerous meetings held during the week. At press time it appears that the High Plains crop will be 70-percent harvested by weeks end. An additional 10-14 days of clear weather will allow the remainder of the crop to be harvested. In addition to the harvesting activities of area cotton the harvesting activities of area cotton producers there were also several meet-ings of interest to producers.

One of the biggest events of the past week was the Texas Farm Bureau's Annual Meeting at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. Hundreds of area producers found time to attend the meeting. Also during the week two separate meetings occurred between area congressmen and local Ag

On Monday, December 2, U.S. Sena-tor Charles Stenholm met with area pro-ducers, Ag leaders, and area Soil Conservation Service personnel to look at the question of Conservation Compliance. Tuesday found Congressman Larry

Tuesday found Congressman Larry Combest in a meeting with area Ag offi-cials to discuss some of the important issues affecting the High Plains. Among the topics discussed at the Combest meeting was the necessity of getting a disaster program signed and the funds available to High Plains cotton producers as quickly as possible.

producers as quickly as possible.
PCG has been very active in the effort to get a disaster program implemented that will benefit High Plains cotton producers. Details of the regulations USDA will develop for implementation of the Disaster program are not known at this

It is known that the Disaster provision waiting for the President's signature in-cludes \$995 million in disaster funds. The money is to be available immediately to help compensate producers for disaster related crop losses in either 1990 or 1991. An additional \$755 million in discretionary assistance for 1990, 1991, and 1992 crops was also provided for in

the measure.

Eligibility for the program will be based on provisions of the 1990 Farm Bill. In general producers who failed to make 60-percent of their established yeilds (65-percent for producers who had Federal Crop Insurance) will be eligible to receive payments equal to 65-percent of the terret price for that commodity. of the target price for that commodity. WASHINGTON --A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in

tists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter nor-

mal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of colories.

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
