## Dickens Injunction Bans Rock Festival

### New Location Near Lubbock

THE TENSION is gone out of this area of the Foothill Country after a court injunction granted Monday banned the holding of the Rock Music Festival formerly scheduled to start today on a site 14 miles northeast of Dickens.

A new location has been obtained in Lubbock County, 12 miles south of the courthouse, off the Tahoka highway. The new site is in the only wet precinct in Lubbock County.

Reports yesterday said about 4,000 people had already arrived in Lubbock for the festival. Weather may be an important factor in the attendance, estimated as high as 100,000. A new cold front arrived yesterday morning and below freezing weather was predicted by this morning.

The festival will be held on 160 acres of farm land owned by Floyd L. Reynolds, seven miles south of Lubbock on US Highway 37 and one mile east on FM 41. It is about one mile from the Lubbock Garza County line.

Lubbock and state law enforcement officers were making plans. The Texas Department of Public Safety began moving in 235 officers from across the state to control traffic and provide security for those attending.

### Rumors Stir Citizens

Before the injunction was granted, this entire area was tense with speculations and almost endless circulation of rumors. Matador, less than 30 miles from the proposed site in Dickens County, was apprehensive, as were Roaring Springs, Afton and East Afton. The uncertainty of what to expect increased the tension.

Dickens County citizens, aroused because of the potentials of the three-day festival, raised approximately \$4000 for legal fees in two protest meetings, one at Dickens and one at Patton Springs, which provided the injunction. It has been estimated that the festival would have cost Dickens County as much as \$20,000. The area has returned to its normal tranquility after one of the most exciting periods in its history.

### Pasture Meeting Set for Tuesday

A meeting to supply information on pasture improvement will be held Tuesday night, March 31 in the Motley County courthouse. It was announced this week by County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Al Novosad, Extension Pasture Specialist from College Station will present the program, which should be of interest to local producers, and assist in grass or legume selection, proper management of crops and related topics that will allow for increased returns per acre.

Discussions will also include information on improved grasses and the use of temporary pastures, Palmeyer stated.

The mercury dropped to 30 degrees Tuesday, as the cold front advanced, but rose to 34 degrees during the period of snow.
