## MATADOR'S SCALP KAMAY WARRIORS

The Mighty Matadors won a decisive victory over the Valley View Warriors here, at Burleson Field, Friday night.

The Matadors took a quick lead over the Warriors in the first quarter as quarterback Larry Bostick passed to Dick Moss for the first score of the game. The try for two failed.

The Warriors took the ball to the Matador 15 yard line on a long run. Swift half-back Luis Moore moved up to make the tackle and stop what could have been a touchdown for Valley View. The Warriors finally scored, however, tying up the score 6-6.

Moore took the kick and made a run to the Valley View 38 yard line before being brought down by a hoard of Warriors. The Matadors lost the ball, but Valley View didn't go anywhere either.

Matadors' Larry Bynum took the punt and pushed the ball to the 40. Soon afterwards, Joey Meador barreled up the middle for another 6 points. Bynum ran the extra points to make it 14-6 for the Matadors.

In the third quarter, Matador had a pass intercepted and fumbled twice. Valley View scored again, narrowing the Matador lead to only 2 points.

With 1:38 left in the ball game Meador salted the game away for the Matadors with a 12 yard run up the middle. The kick for extra points was no good and the clock ran out with the score 20-12.

Joey Meador was again the workhorse with 94 yards rushing. Moore racked up 82 and Bynum had 34. Bostick passed 19 yards outstanding on defense with 10 tackles, followed by Meador, who had 9.

Matador plays the Rochester Steers here, for the Homecoming game tomorrow night at 7:30. The Steers have a 4-1 standing and promise to be a rugged opponent.

A flag-raising ceremony at the beginning of the Rochester-Matador football game, will further accent Armistice.

## Two Last Minute Candidates Emerge To Bring Out Record Vote in County

AN EXCITING POLITICAL week end in Motley County simmered down a couple of hours after the polls closed Tuesday night. Two write-in candidates in the race for County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent, failed to change the voters for the Democratic nominee, Forrest Campbell.

A letter in the mails Saturday morning asked voters to consider Judge Elbert Reeves as a write-in candidate for re-election. Saturday afternoon circulars were distributed showing voters how to write in the name of former Judge Vance Gilbreath for the office. The circulars were also distributed in the mails. The result was to bring out a record general election vote in the county.

Forrest Campbell was elected with a total vote of 383. Elbert Reeves received 216 votes and Vance Gilbreath received 184 votes.

Mrs. Velma Fuller received the largest vote in the county, 851, for re-election to the office of County treasurer. Her vote was over 60 more than the combined total of three men in the judge's race.

Motley County gave a slim majority to Waggoner Carr and Dee Miller, but both lost their races to Republicans in state and district.

Total vote for Carr, attempting to unseat US Senator John Tower, was 402 to 351 for Tower. In the Congressional race Dee Miller received 292 to Bob Price's 309. Voters crossed party lines at will in all five county boxes and used the write-in space freely. Voting was heavy here during the entire day and 501 ballots had been cast in the Matador box when the polls closed.

In Matador, Campbell received 232 votes, Reeves 131 and Gilbreath 96. W. W. Clements received 478 votes for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1. Carr received 225 votes and Tower 205. Miller 212 and Price 181.

At Roaring Springs Campbell received 70 votes, Reeves 41 and Gilbreath 39. Milton Brooks received 172 votes for Commissioner of Precinct 4 and J. D. Mitchell received 172 for Justice of the Peace, Carr 86 and Tower 70. Miller 98 and Price 51.

At Fomot, Gilbreath received the largest vote, 36. Reeves 27 and Campbell 23. Malcolm Turner received 95 votes for Commissioner of Precinct 2, and A. J. Barron 61 for Justice of the Peace, Carr 55 and Tower 36. Miller 46 and Price 38.

At Northfield, Campbell received 19 votes and Reeves 8. Carr 9 and Tower 12. Miller 9 and Price 13.

At Whiteflat Campbell received 31 votes, Gilbreath 13 and Reeves 5. Malcolm Turner received 50 votes for Commissioner of Precinct 2. Carr 20 and Tower 25. Miller 21 and Price 21.

Absentee votes showed Campbell 8 and Reeves 4. Carr 7 and Tower 3. Miller 6 and Price 5.

Complete returns on the Constitutional amendments showed: 1-259 for, 197 against, 2-354 for, 264 against, 3-175 for, 236 against, 4-153 for, 259 against, 6-268 for, 180 against, 7-299 for, 208 against, 8-243 for, 202 against, 9-201 for, 217 against, 10-218 for, 200 against, 11-308 for, 146 against, 12-218 for, 209 against, 13-166 for, 255 against, 14-392 for, 89 against, 15-315 for, 143 against, 16-277 for, 131 against, 17-175 for, 274 against.

## Rewards are Rich Says School Supt.

To see one of your "boys" become successful in a school superintendent can have, believes Garland Rattan, Superintendent of Boys Ranch Independent School District, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Rattan of Matador.

His association with Boys Ranch since 1956, (and as superintendent since 1962) has placed Mr. Rattan in a position of compassionate understanding.

And if he had not been a dedicated teacher from the beginning, he probably could not have remained at his post, witnessing the arrival almost daily, of forlorn, homeless boys, to observe the fruits of his labor.

"When you work with these boys, helping them with their problems as they strive to 'be somebody,' and they leave after finishing their education here, and go into the world, then come back, good citizens, with wives

and children... these have been the most rewarding experiences of my life... I could not ask for more."

The boys seem to be more proud of their families, than their positions, he said.

### Haven For The Homeless

Cal Farley's Boys Ranch at Tascosa, near Channing is known over the nation as a haven for homeless lads. They are not all from broken homes. Some are handicapped, some are orphaned by the death of a father, leaving a helpless widowed mother to try to make a living for her brood.

They all have one thing in common. As Cal Farley himself has said repeatedly, they need a "shirttail to hang on to."

Once three young children were placed on a bus in a distant city with tickets to Boys Ranch, Amarillo, as their only passport to the future. Another youth was sent to the ranch by wealthy parents of Hollywood fame, who had other interests to pursue. The boy was admitted and given a home, under the family name, and his associates were never aware that his parents were famous.

Records are kept on the boys, and when an adult first assumes a position at the ranch, he or she has a curiosity about the youngsters. But this soon is absorbed by the work itself, and one soon ceases to wonder, Rattan says.

### Reared in Matador

Garland Rattan is "almost" a native of Matador. His parents moved here when he was one month old, from Lamesa, where he was born, June 15, 1933. (His father, incidentally, is a native of the county).

After graduating from Matador High School in 1950, he attended West Texas State University, receiving his Bachelor of Science Degree in 1954 and his Master of Education Degree in 1962.

While working on his Master, he was employed to finish out the school term as principal at

retary-treasurer; and Hazel as reporter... Officers were elected by acclamation as named.
