Charles N. Johnson of Matador was among the 55 administrators who attended the Special Education Conference May 20 in Lubbock.

The meeting was for school administrators serving in local school districts throughout the region. Sponsored by the Region XVII Education Service Center in Lubbock, the meeting was held to outline proposals for special education for the upcoming school year.

The proposals were divided into three main categories of discussion: (1) Assistance in the development of expanded pupil appraisal services; (2) Provision for consultant services for special education and (3). Creation of a special education materials center to support regional special education programs.

Meador concluded by reading "Thanatopsis" by William Cullen Bryant. "This is my favorite prose," he said, "I think it expresses everything I would want to say on an occasion such as this."

Edgar Lee served as master of ceremonies for the Veterans-sponsored service. Raising of the Flag was by Matador Boy Scouts and J. R. Whitworth led in singing "America," and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Charlie Johnson gave the Invocation, and benediction was by R. C. Giesecke. Ward Rattan presented Taps to conclude the program.

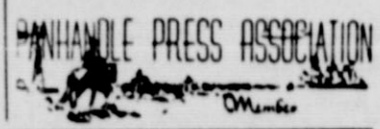

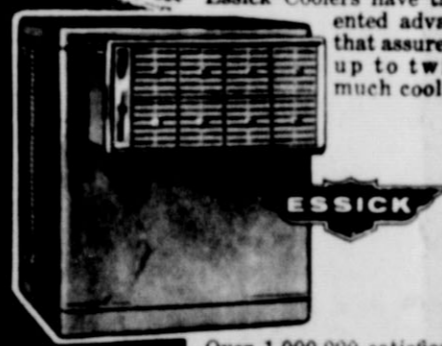

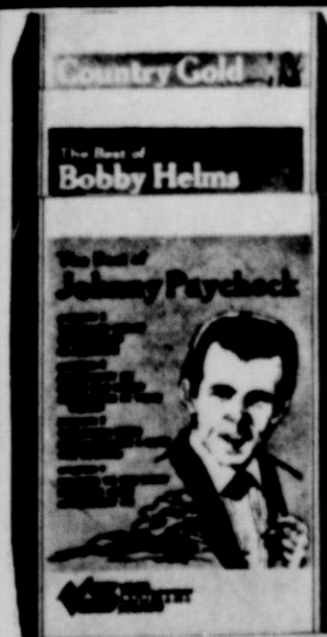
