A TRANSACTION will become effective Friday morning whereby Doyle Riddle, formerly of Wichita Falls, will acquire the ownership and management of Matador Parts Co. The firm was established here in March 1944 and operated in the business of Matador parts and accessories. 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Matadors Vanquish Bulldogs By 25-21

VETERAN FANS said it was the most exciting game they had ever witnessed when the score changed four times as the unscathed Matadors nipped the Spur Bulldogs 25-21 at Spur Friday night. It was the sixth straight homecoming loss for the Bulldogs. After a scoreless first period the heat of action intensified when the Matadors recovered a fumble at the Spur 6. Fullback Chip Smith banged across from the one yard out on fourth down and Ronnie Cox kicked the conversion. Spur tied it on a 52-yard drive with wingback W. L. Patterson scoring from the nine and Larry Powell booting the PAT. In the third quarter the Bulldogs moved ahead, taking a fumble recovery at Matadors' 11 to set it up. Fullback Junior Hightower plunged two yards for the tally and again Powell kicked the conversion. The Matadors made it a 14-13 game as halfback Larry Bynum broke for a 55-yard scoring run, and the two-point PAT try failed with 5:30 left. The Matadors regained the lead early in the fourth period as Bynum tossed a 28-yard touchdown pass to end Danny Davis. Spur countered after a fumble recovery on the Matadors' 31. Hightower lanced over from the one and Powell again kicked the PAT, giving the Bulldogs a 21-19 margin with three minutes to go. The Matadors had one drive left and halfback Luis Moore ended it with a 53-yard touchdown gallop as two minutes remained. Spur went to the air again, but Bynum intercepted a pass to kill the final Bulldog threat. The win gives Spur a 2-2 mark and Matador is now 1-2. The Matadors gained 245 yards rushing and completed one of two passes for 23 yards. The Bulldogs gained 148 yards rushing and went 0 for 8 in the air. Moore had 107 yards on 12 carries to pace the offense. Garrison and Bynum led the defense with 13 tackles and assists each. In a homecoming game here on Burleson Field at 8 p.m. Friday, the Matadors will meet the Jayton Jaybirds, in what promises to be an outstanding game.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Loss from poisonous plants is one of the major economic problems in livestock production. A compilation of numerous reports indicates that the annual loss from poisonous plants in Texas is between 50 and 100 million dollars. Approximately 80 species and varieties of poisonous plants grow in pastures and on range areas in Texas. Some species described

seldom cause trouble but are included since they have proved toxic and may bring about livestock losses.

The effects of these plants when consumed by livestock may vary from mild sickness to death. Plants that interfere with growth in weight are also included. Frequent cases of poisoning occur when hungry animals are turned into new pastures or are given access to poisonous plants near pens, water or along trails. Most poisonous plants are eaten because the animal is hungry and the plant is readily available. Poisoned animals should be treated as soon as the condition is recognized. Poisoned animals should be removed from accessible poisonous plants and provided with feed, water and shelter. Some animals need hand feeding and watering. Specific antidotes are available for some poisons but others require symptomatic treatments such as laxatives, stimulants and good nursing.

B-1028, Texas Plants Poisonous to Livestock is available for additional information. This publication which gives treatments for many of the poisonous plants may be had for the asking.

If conditions are favorable, it will pay to leave peanuts in the ground as long as practical. Date of harvest has a definite effect on grade and yield, according to tests made at Yoakum. Peanuts harvested 102 days after planting yielded 2,101

lbs. ac., while peanuts harvested at 113 days yielded 2,110 lbs. ac. and harvest at 127 days yielded 2,807 lbs. ac. Grades increased from 57% at 102 days, to 67% at 113 days and 68% for 127 days.

Peanuts in the test were treated with terracot and a foliage treatment of sulfur and copper oxide. They were also irrigated.

As long as the peanuts are sound and the foliage is good, the longer you leave the peanuts in the ground, the higher the yield will be and the higher the grade.

Don't lose money by a poor job of defoliation. Choose the correct chemical and apply properly.

Defoliants cause mature leaves to shed in about 7 to 9 days and should be used on cotton that is to be mechanically picked. In cotton to be stripped, a desiccant which causes all of the leaves to dry and become crumbly should be used. Five defoliants are recommended, but only one desiccant, arsenic acid, is recommended under normal conditions.

Desiccants should not be applied unless 75% or more of the bolls are open under dryland conditions and 80% on irrigated cotton. Plants are considered suitably mature if the young bolls cannot be dented by pressure between the thumb and forefinger or cannot easily be cut through with a sharp knife.

Thorough coverage of all leaves is essential. Consider all weather information such as dew and humidity forecasts, temperature, wind velocity and rainfall. For additional information, ask for L-145, Cotton Defoliation Guide.

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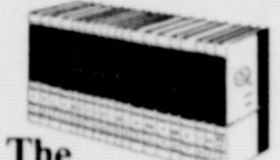

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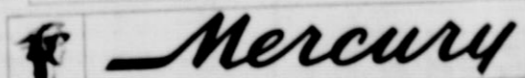

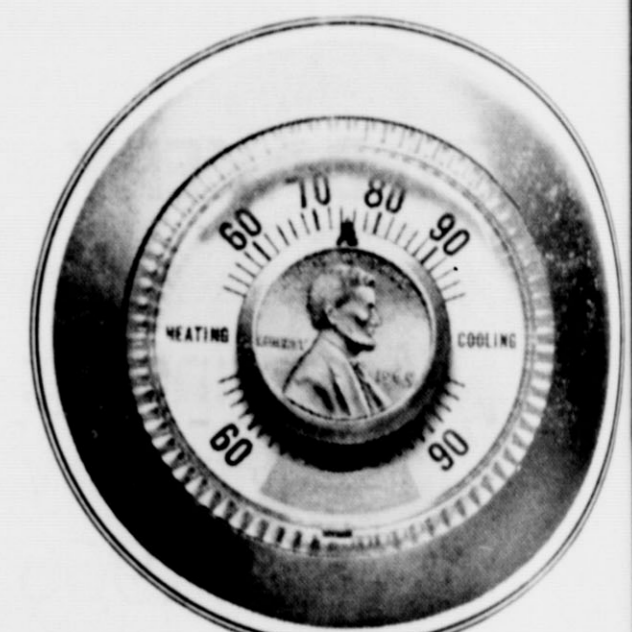
