Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

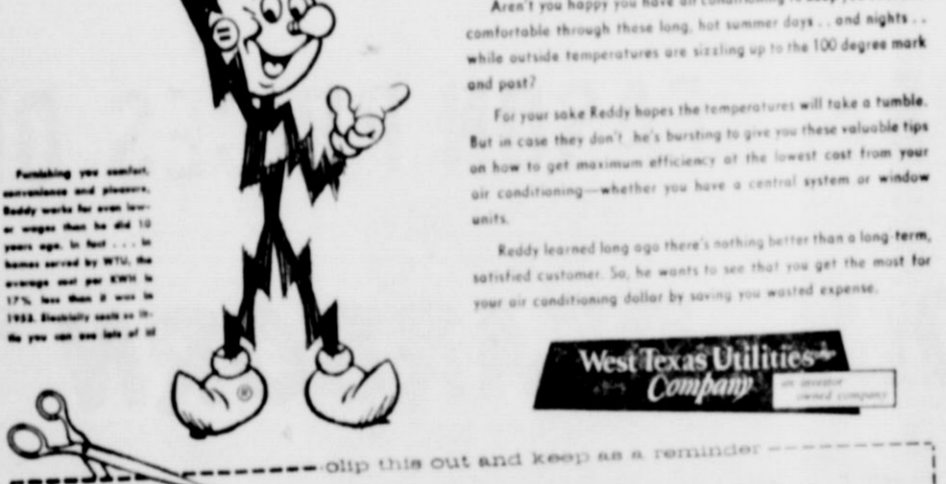

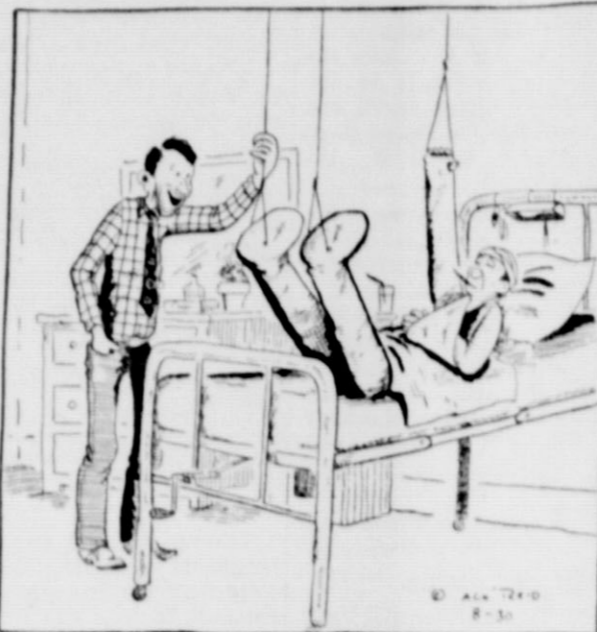

Mr. Paul J. Sibenman, Educational Secretary of the Texas Alcohol and Narcotics Education, Incorporated, presented a very interesting talk on alcohol and narcotics to high school and grade school students, April 28.

In his talk there were several important facts given concerning alcohol and narcotics. "There are more alcoholics than dope addicts because alcohol is easier to obtain, cheaper, and legal. About one fourth of the homes in America have alcohol available, and there are more alcoholics from beer than from any other beverage," he stated.

"There are generally three main steps in becoming a dope addict: imitation, association, and experimentation. In many cases the mother and father both work so the child is free to roam the streets. The cities having the major population of dope addicts are New York City, Los Angeles, and Chicago. There are seven million alcoholics in the United States and seventy thousand dope addicts; therefore, there are one hundred alcoholics for each dope addict."

"There are hospitals to cure dope addicts in Fort Worth and in Lexington, Kentucky; but for

every ten people entering, nine return to their old habits and only one is cured," he further stated.

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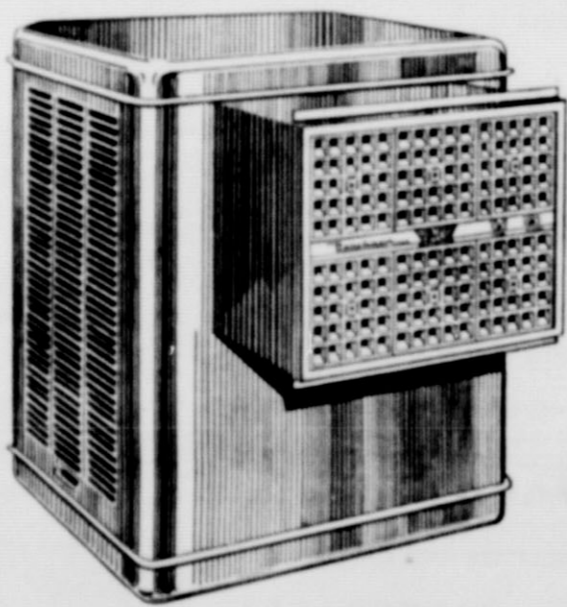

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

From time to time reports of screwworms keep coming up, but when you ask "Did you send in a sample?", the answer is NO. This is the best way for the program to fail, for unless the sample is submitted, no flies will be released in the area, providing they are screwworms. This happened in 1963, and until a collection of worms was submitted, no work was done, resulting in several cases in the county. When treatment was started, the screwworm was stopped.

To date I have received a report on 3 samples submitted of which all were maggots. Thanks for sending these in.

It is possible for maggots and screwworms to be in the same wound, so as a safety measure, be sure to get some of the worms from the bottom of the wound, and not all from the top near the surface. Screwworms feed in live flesh, while the maggots feed in the dead flesh.

I am sure that most of you are aware that checks show approximately 90% reduction of boll weevils going into hibernation as a result of the dia-

pause control program. Later checks show that from 25 to 85% of this 10% were killed during the winter. This still leaves enough weevils to present a problem, unless steps are taken by the producers before the diapause program is started this fall. These were outlined at meetings held at Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador.

Wildlife meetings were started by Game Warden Jerry Noles for 4-H club members and parents on March 8th. Films on the Bob White Quail and the Sea Rim Bird Sanctuary were shown.

The next meeting is to be held Tuesday night May 11th, starting at 8:00 PM in the district courtroom in Matador.

Rites Held For Victim Of Fire

Funeral services for George Delivan Wolfe, 54-year-old truck driver, who died Monday, April 26 in a Kermit fire that destroyed his trailer home, April 28, were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Apr. 28, at the First Baptist Church, Matador. He had formerly lived here.

The Rev. James Hancock, pastor, officiated and burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Kermit firemen said Wolfe's trailer was enveloped in flames about midnight before an alarm was sounded. Justice of the Peace S. C. Calloway ruled death by suffocation.

Police Chief Melvin Bartley said the trailer was in flames when the first squad car arrived at the scene. Heat was so intense that police could not enter the house trailer until firemen arrived, according to a news item.

Wolfe's body was found lying beside a couch on the floor of the heavily damaged unit. Investigators theorized the victim had been sleeping on the couch and fell to the floor trying to get out of the blazing trailer.

Mr. Wolfe was born on May 21, 1910 at Farmersville, in Collin County, Texas. He moved to Matador in about 1926 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Elmer L. Wolfe. He resided in Matador until about 1940 and moved to Kermit about four years ago. He was a truck driver for A-I Construction Engineering. He served in India with the U. S. Army during World War II.

Survivors include his two sisters: Mrs. J. B. Barrett of Graham, Tex., and Mrs. George Leach, Salinas, California.
