## FmHA Disaster Loans Extended To Motley County Farmers

Motley County has finally been added to the list of counties deemed eligible for the FmHA's disaster loans, according to Sen. John Tower.

The decision to add Motley County to the list comes 11 months after a rash of severe weather began repeated assaults on area agriculture.

Motley and eight other counties were added to the 33 counties chosen to receive the loans in January. The other counties are Borden, Denton, Hall, Brooks, Duval, Kent, Martin and Palo Pinto, bringing to 46 the number of Texas counties eligible for the low interest loans.

After a series of complaints and claims of "bureaucratic nonsense" by Texas legislators, FmHA agreed to survey farmers in the shunned counties. That decision led to the redesignation of four counties March 21 and nine more Monday.

It was not known if the list issued Monday is the last of the redesignated counties.

"I am pleased the Department of Agriculture has been able to declare these counties eligible for disaster relief. It will provide

substantial help for farmers," Tower said.

Borden, Denton, Hall and Motley counties were designated by Block because 30 percent or more of the farmers in those counties were affected. Brooks, Duval, Kent, Martin and Palo Pinto counties were designated by FmHA administrator Charles Shuman, applying FmHA

guidelines. Interest rates and regulations will be identical in all counties.

When seeking low interest loans, individual farmers in those counties will have to show that their operations suffered at least a 30 percent reduction because of the disaster. Interest rates will be 8 percent for farmers who request no more than

\$500,000 and cannot secure credit from any other lending institution; 14.25 percent for farmers who can secure credit from another source; and 13.5 percent for farmers who owed the FmHA money as of Dec. 15, 1979, and fall into the "grandfather clause" subsequent annual production category.

## Coin Telephone Users Face Policy Change

As of April 1, 1983, coin telephone users wanting to charge a long distance call to a third number will be subject to having the charges approved by someone at the third number.

The verification procedure is being initiated to help eliminate fraudulent billing of long distance calls and ensure customer protection from having unauthorized charges appear on their monthly statements.

Under the new procedure, if an individual at the third number does not answer and approve

the charges, the caller will be asked to provide alternate billing, such as another third number that will approve the charges, a valid calling card, a collect call or correct change to pay for the call.

Jimmy Bennett, General Telephone Operations Manager in Memphis said, "Customers who frequently use public coin telephone facilities for third number billing may find that the calling card may represent an attractive alternative. Besides being faster

and more convenient than the third number and collect calls, most calling card calls are cheaper." In a growing number of locations, customers can direct dial calling card calls without operator assistance from public telephones. The calling card also provides the customer with a printed monthly statement of long distance calls placed.

Customers can call their local telephone business office to obtain a calling card. There is no charge for the card.
