Community To Honor Miss Verlin Reeves

Appreciation for a lifetime friendship and the influence of a dedicated school teacher for half a century will be ex-pressed here Saturday,

when a communitywide open house
honoring Miss Verlin
Reeves will be held at
the home of Mr. and
Mrs. Ward Rattan.

The reception will be from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. and everyone is invited.
The occasion will not be an especially joyous one, since Miss Reeves plans to move to Plainview by the end of the month to make her home at West Ridge Manor, an apartment complex for retired

"Miss Verlin," as she is called by longtime friends, taught school for 38 years before retiring --- the first time retiring --- the first time --- in 1956. She taught Matador children 24 of those years, first for two

terms, 1922-24, and again from 1934-46. She graduated from Matador High School in 1914, and began her long teaching career in 1918, at Fairfield in a six-months school. After finishing at Wayland Baptist Junior College and Baylor University, she taught schools in Dalhart, Mineral Wells and Abilene. Not content with retirement, Miss Verlin

retirement, Miss Verlin accepted teaching positions in Idalou and Petersburg before again returning to Matador. She was then persuaded by local parents to teach their pre-school children, and concepted the pre-school children and pre-school and converted a room at the back of her garage, into an garage, into an attractive kindergarten classroom. After eight more years she "defi-nitely" retired.

Upon her first official retirement, Miss Reeves was presented with an engraved plaque of appreciation from the Matador School trustees, "For 38 years of service in the Public Schools of Texas."

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County Agents Corner

FERMITE SWARMING SEASON

Spring is the time when many home-owners discover they have termites because winged forms appear

Winged termites
outdoors are a natural occurence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions. Quite often termites

and certain ants swarm and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, ter-mites are much more destructive and require different control

measures. Termites have a broad waist - ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape -- winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads) - ants have elbowed

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that sood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termites entry into the home.

over wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about ¼-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete ome, these may be een on foundation and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found an piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab. and termite tunnels may be found in this area. Although a thorough

inspection is best done by a professional, o homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer," emphosizes Dr. Phil Hamman, Extension Entomologist. Com-mercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

The State Library anticipates that out of the \$50 million dollar appropriation, Texas' share should be in the neighborhood of \$2


