Mrs. Pearl Garner Jones, 83, widow of a pioneer rancher and early-day sheriff in Dickens County, died at 5:45 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 18 in a Spur nursing home.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Saturday in the First United Methodist Church of Spur with the Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. John Nay, pastor of the First Christian Church.

Burial was in Spur Cemetery under direction of Campbell Funeral Home.

Mrs. Jones was the widow of Luther Jones, a rancher and one-time sheriff of Dickens County. She was born in Jack County, and her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Garner were pioneers of Dickens County, moving there in 1890.

She was the first graduate of Dickens High School, and later taught in schools in the county, after attending North Texas State Normal at Denton. She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. She moved to Cochran County in 1939, and in 1962 she moved to Kent County.

Survivors include a son, Luther Jones Jr. of Spur; two sisters, Mrs. Maude Morrison of Spur and Mrs. Gay Collett of Dallas; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

### Snow Moisture is .43-inch Here

LIGHTNING and thunder here late Saturday night ushered one of the most severe blizzards to strike the Panhandle since 1964. Sleet, snow and high winds followed the front. Snow measurements here are estimated at about five inches, which produced .43-inch of badly needed moisture.

The full fury of the storm struck early Sunday afternoon after the mercury had dropped to near 20 degrees. Powdery snow and higher winds prevailed during the afternoon. Snow plows kept traffic open on US Highway 70 and most area roads but anykind of driving was extremely hazardous.

It was not weather for man or beast, but some ranchers ventured to pastures to feed livestock. The storm caused the postponement of the annual Youth Union Church Services at the First Methodist Church, as well as other services in the area.

Because of road conditions and the drifting snow, Matador Schools were suspended Monday. One of the highest drifts of snow collected in front of the R. A. Stafford home on Walton Road in south Matador. Other high drifts were at the Tribune and on highways where the snow was removed by snow plows.

In the Amarillo area all roads were closed and hundreds of motorists were stranded. Snowfall there was reported at 17 inches, accompanied by high winds. Heaviest snowfall was reported at Pampa where 22 inches was recorded.

### Tornadoes Hit South

More than 50 tornadoes killed 84 in the Mississippi delta area as an aftermath of the blizzard hitting the Panhandle. Damage was estimated at more than \$8 million, according to newspaper reports.

Bright sunlight Monday quickly warmed shivering West Texas. Almost all streets here were cleared by snow plows by noon. Drifts of snow continue to remain in patches where accumulations were heavy. Warmer weather is predicted to follow the hit and run storm.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law. (c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

## SUPT. HARBOUR OF ROGERS ANNOUNCES HIS RETIREMENT

According to a feature in the Cameron Herald, dated February 8, B. F. Harbour, for 16 years superintendent of the Rogers Independent School District, and a former faculty member of Matador High School, has presented his letter of retirement, effective June 30, 1971, to the Rogers Board of Trustees.

Mr. Harbour had two years to go on his current contract. He went to the Rogers schools on July 1, 1955, after having been superintendent at Ganado, Texas for six years. Before that he was Dean of Victoria Junior College for four years. He was high school principal in several Texas high schools (including Matador) prior to that time. He taught here during the early 1930's. He has chalked up 49 years of teaching experience.

Since 1955 the Rogers school system progressed from one that was at that time under accreditation "warning" by the Texas Education Agency, to a leading central Texas school system. It is now serving as a pilot school in new programs, including the "Shift of Emphasis" program, the newest thing in special education.

Don Roy Hafner, Director of the state project from Austin, recently told a Rogers audience that "the Rogers school system was chosen as one of the 26 schools in Texas in this project because the top leadership here and the teachers have shown on many occasions that they care for their children and they seem to really want to do something about it."

The Rogers school has a well-rounded athletic program and an outstanding band, supported and encouraged by its superintendent.

Harbour has worked with school auxiliary organizations like the

Rogers PTA and the Rogers Band Parents Club very closely and encouragingly because he believes such organizations can do much good for the school system if properly guided and encouraged. He is proud of his fine relationship with these organizations.

Harbour and his wife, the former Imogene Hampton of Corsicana, have four sons, all graduates of Rogers High School, all Eagle Scouts, and all graduates of Baylor University. Mrs. Harbour also teaches.

The Harbours have always been active in church, community and area activities. He is past president of the Rogers Community Service Club and has served and is serving on a number of educational and civic executive committees.

Harbour has also been on the Boy Scout council and is a member of the Board of Trustees of Mary Hardin-Baylor College.

He is a 1927 graduate of North Texas State University with a BA degree in history and English. His MA degree was earned at the University of Texas at Austin in 1934, with a major in school administration. Additional graduate work was done at Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn., and UT.

After retirement the last of June, the Harbours plan to live a more leisurely life, although they plan to keep busy with community and area activities.

Mrs. Harbour, an accomplished artist, will have more time for her art, and Mr. Harbour, who has had some fifteen or twenty articles published in magazines, will resume his hobby of writing.

They also plan to do some traveling. Matador friends hope their trips will bring them this way.

**Area Educators Are Delegates to TSTA Meeting**

DALLAS (Special) - Two area educators will be official, voting delegates at the 92nd annual state convention of the Texas State Teachers Association March 11-13 in Dallas.

They are among the 1,330 certified members of the 1971 House of Delegates which will meet on the last day of the convention to discuss and act on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitution, new policies, recommendations of standing committees, and other business.

The official delegates are elected from the 433 TSTA local associations throughout the state and certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or fraction of 100. Every local association in the state is entitled to at least one official delegate.

With total membership in TSTA expected to hit a record 138,000 this year, attendance at the convention may exceed 10,000. Featured speakers include A. D. (Andy) Holt, president emeritus of the University of Tennessee, and Art Linkletter, the well-known radio and television entertainer.

The Cottle County Teachers Association will be represented by John Brinson, Paducah.

Billy Pierce of Roaring Springs will represent the Motley County Teachers Association.

**Horseshoeing Class Slated in Amarillo**

The horseshoeing or Farriers class at Texas State Technical Institute, Amarillo, has proven to be in such great demand that a third

section will be offered beginning Saturday (February 13), says Bill Holtzapple, head of the TSTI Livestock and Ranch Department.

Cost of the five-week course will be \$15, with each student required to furnish his or her own shoes - TSTI will furnish the tools.

Those taking the course will receive instruction from a veteran horseshoer, Wesley Thomas of 1221 E. Hastings in Amarillo.

Students will be taught the art of trimming and shoeing and also the corrective measures necessary for the improvement of a horse's performance through the proper selection of shoes.

Enrollment will be held at the TSTI Educational Building (across the street from the Bell Helicopter entrance) from 8:15 to 8:50 a.m., Saturday, February 13. The first class will be conducted from 9:00 a.m. until noon the same day. Other classes will be from 9 a.m. until 12 noon February 20, and 27th, and March 6 and 13.

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

Shade trees should be pruned during the dormant season to put them in the best possible form for next summer.

Bare limbs let you see where to prune and how much. Tangled and low hanging branches should be reshaped and for that matter, the shape of the trees or shrubs can be changed through a careful pruning program.

Most trees need thinning as they approach maturity, but corrective pruning is essential when the trees are young. During the period of rapid growth, branches

should be removed that are growing in the wrong direction or position.

Pruning consists primarily of training cuts, but gradually involves more and more thinning out of weak and finally dead wood as the tree matures.

It's good to remember the old adage-"As the branch is bent, so will the tree grow." Make sure the branches or limbs taken off by pruning should come off in a manner that won't allow them to grow back. Thus, the pruning done on young dormant shade trees, to a large measure, determines their beauty and health in later years.

Information relative to pruning and treating of wounds is available in my office.

With all the talk about pollution, these words about how green plants play a vital roll in our survival and well-being should be appropriate.

Green plants are the great air purifiers of the world. They have the ability to take carbon dioxide from the air and convert it to oxygen which is vital to all animal life. In the process of photosynthesis, plants manufacture the basic carbohydrate materials which we ultimately use as food.

In a season of active growth, the grass in a well-maintained 50 by 50 foot lawn will liberate enough oxygen to meet the needs of a family of four day after day.

Estimations by Dr. Karl Boer, University of Delaware scientist, show that each of us requires at least 78 large trees each day to utilize the carbon dioxide given off in the various processes needed to maintain our well-being.

Here is the way he sees it. One tree is needed to take up carbon dioxide from our breathing; 20 for our automobile; 20 for heating and air conditioning our home; 5 for household electricity; 2 for garbage disposal and 30 trees to utilize the carbon dioxide produced in the manufacture of the industrial goods each of us uses.

These estimations do not consider the effects of public transportation, forest fires, and other contributors to the CO2 in the atmosphere. For example, a commercial jet aircraft flying from New York to Los Angeles creates enough CO2 to require the combined efforts of more than 50,000 trees for one day to utilize it all.

Greater use of plants in the home garden, in home and public landscaping, and in community beautification will serve as a positive contribution for reduced air pollution.

In addition to acting as air purifiers and food manufacturing complexes, trees also improve our environment. They cool the air and provide welcome shade.

The foliage serves as a filtering system screening out dust from the atmosphere. They can also serve as windbreaks, reducing the wind velocity; thereby reducing heat loss from homes and farm yards in the winter, and reverse this procedure in the summer. Trees and shrubs also serve as excellent sound barriers against noise.
