THE CLIMATE OF MATADOR, TEXAS

Matader, county seat of Motley County, is one of Texas' most western towns. It was named for the famed Matador Ranch, whose headquarters is at Ballard Springs. When Motley County was organized in 1891, there was no town in the new county. A townsite was designated, and the necessary 20 business houses were supplied by cowboys from the Matador headquarters who set up one-day businesses so a patent could be granted by the General Land Office. Today, Matador is the commercial center and shipping point for Motley County. Agribusinesses and oil, field supply firms contribute to the town's economy

Motley County is rough terrain, broken by tributaries of the Pease River. Elevations range from 1,900 to 3,000 feet above sea level. One-half of agricultural income is derived from cattle one-half comes from farm products, chiefly cotton, sorghums, wheat and pea-nuts. About 4,000 acres are irrigated. Motley County produces oil, gas, sand and gravel. Approximately 100,000 acres are leased annually for hunting.

Matador has a warm-temperate, subtropical climate with dry winters and humid summers. Mean total annual precipitation is 20.22 inches with four-fifths of this amount falling during the warm season, April through October. Rainfall occurs most frequently as a result of thunderstorms with monthly and annual amounts extremely variable. Maximum precipitation usually occurs during May and June when warm, moist Tropical Maritime air is carried for inland form the Gulf of Mexico. This air mass produces moderate to heavy afternoon and evening thundershowers that are sometimes accompanied by strong gusty winds and hail.

The Gulf of Mexico source region is cut off rather effectively during the colder months, November through March, by frequent surges of drier polar air invading the area from the north and northwest. Consequently, wintertime precipitation is realtively light. Snow falls occasionally during the winter months but is generally light and most often melts rapidly. Because of drift-ing of the snow by strong winds, the snow melt is unevenly dis-tributed. The mean monthly snowfall data are biased by rare, but

exceptionally heavy snows such as occurred in January 1966: February 1968; and March 1969. Thus, the mean value over estimates expected enowfall.

Temperatures, like rainfall, are extremely variable, especially during the colder months of the year. From November through March, cold fronts are frequent, bringing rapid and pronounced changes. However, cold spells are of short duration, rarely lasting more than 48 hours before southwesterly winds bring rapid warming. Strong, fast moving cold fronts of late spring may follow several weeks of mild weather. The range between summer and winter extremes of temperature is large, characteristic of a continental type of climate. While most summer days are not uncomfortable, a few hot days do occur. Evaporative-type home air conditioners are effec-tive for cooling more than 90 percent of the time in the Matador climate.

Prevailing winds at Matador are south to southwesterly throughout the year, although northerly winds are frequent during the winter months. The strongest sustained winds occur during the late winter and in the opring

The mean relative humidity at noon, Central Standard Time is estimated at 51 percent in January, 43 percent in April, 45 percent in July, and 46 percent in October. The area receives approximately 66 percent of the total possible sumshine in winter, 70 percent in spring, 77 percent in summer, and 72 percent in the fall. Mean annual free water (lake) evaporation is 68 inches, while evaporation exceeds rainfall by 48 inches in an average year.

The mean length of the warm season (freeze free period) at Matador 1. 218 days. The mean dates of the last occurrence of 32°F or below in the spring, and the first occurrence of 32°F or below in the fall, are April 3 and November 7, resepctively.
