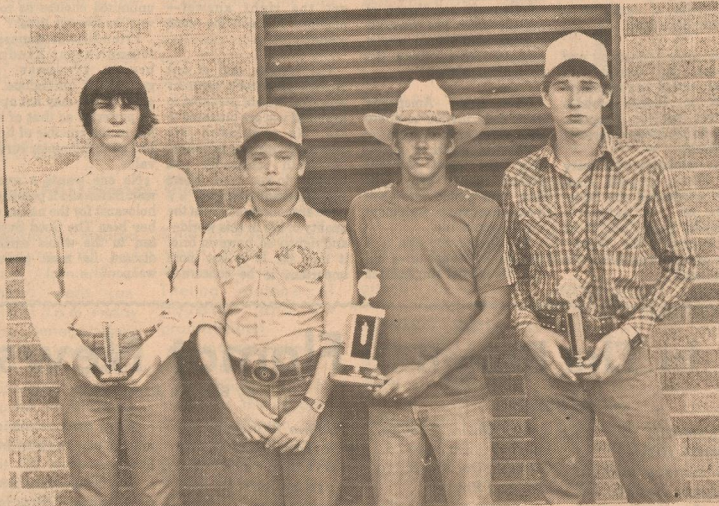

Mayor Outlines Projects For City Development

Mayor Gary Lancaster, guest speaker at the May 12 meeting of El Progreso Club, outlined the several proposed projects under consideration for the city of Matador under the \$190,000 grant which the city received recently through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

A local community planning and development committee had been named to perform a study for target areas in the city, for use of the funds, the mayor explained.

Mrs. Frank Pohl, program leader introduced Mayor Lancaster, who is a native of Matador and well known locally. He is a Vietnam veteran and attended Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. He is a Certified Public Accountant in business here.

New paving, drainage improvements and new sewer lines, and the construction of a 20 unit apartment building are among the priorities in the planning stages.

After commenting on the declining population during the years from 1930 to 1980, the mayor said one concern now was to attract new businesses here, and in order to do that, good housing facilities must be provided. "The housing shortage has always been a problem in Matador," he pointed out.

The improvements will be carried out according to HUD regulations, he said. "The target area has to be designated by HUD regulations, as to the

part of town, what needs are to be met and how many people it will benefit. Under these requirements, the Southeast section of town will be the starting point."

A private group of investors from out of state has made a survey and looked at locations for the apartment building and engineers were here several weeks ago to make a preliminary report to conform with an environmental review.

"There is a two year time limit in which to use the funds," Mayor Lancaster said. "It may

be possible for the city to apply for more funds this fall. We have as good a chance to receive these grants as other small towns in this area who have taken advantage of the opportunity."

Mrs. John Hamilton, president, opened the meeting, held at the Summit Savings Community room. A report on the State convention of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs last month in Corpus Christi was given by Mrs. Harold Campbell. She announced that Mrs. Robert Dickson, District Poet Laureate and an El

Progreso Club member, had won a first award in poetry for children, and Mrs. Dickson announced that Mrs. Campbell's program on Texas Heritage had also received a first place award in that category.

Inspirational Thought was by Mrs. W. D. Lipscomb, who read a poem titled "Life's Weaving."

Lest We Ever Dare Forget

TODAY AMERICA hears the verse for "Taps":

"Day is done -- Gone the sun -- Goeth Day -- Cometh night.

"And a star -- Leadeth all -- Speedeth all -- To their rest."

"And a star -- Leadeth all -- Speedeth all -- To their rest."

Today we pray that the rolls of our war dead will not grow longer. For theirs is the democracy of the dead. THE SAD DUST of our heroic fallen is sacred, deep among the never-to-be-forgotten on this Memorial Day, Or any day.

They fell in Europe and on the islands of the South Pacific, on the bleak high ridges of Korea and in the sodden paddy fields of Vietnam.

Aboard the sunken

battleship "Arizona" a tablet listing Pearl Harbor casualties reads: "May God make His face to shine on them in lasting peace."

Loving hands have brought them home from many lands, across many seas, our young soldiers dying. Today we wonder if they hear, for eternity, our hail and farewell.

IF ONLY WE could erase the memory of war. It is the fact of death and suffering that carries the meaning of war. Everything else seems so far away.

Death, twisted lives, the torture of blindness and/or cruel wounds that tear men to pieces. These are the realities of war. And only these.

How much death and agony there is that man can cause: how little he is able to cure.

AMERICA IS not made strong by her factories, railways, highways and libraries. Her real strength is her inner spirit. A nation can be well armed but it cannot be stronger than its beliefs. And those beliefs cannot be fabricated to suit a moment, a policy or a person.

"Courage is a virtue because it combines with most other virtues in any man or nation," wrote Winston Churchill. But courage also is a private thing. Perhaps it can be defined as doing what conscience dictates, but doing it because - no matter how hard, painful or dangerous -- you believe it is right.

MAY AMERICA'S search for peace remain everlasting. Humanity cries out for peace. This is the cry of decency and hope that comes as one voice from the deepest heart and soul of our nation.

War is not a triumphant thing. It is cold and cunning death that triumphs in war, takes each man suddenly as his eyes grow cloudy and his chin drops. Or as he strains against a harness and his arms quiver, alone in the sky.

One man, lest we forget. Lest we forget. One man. He is lost to everyone who loved him, and to the world -- a world he might have lived to change.

HE WILL NEVER see morning again, feel the warmth and vigor and companionship of a wife, write a note or sing a song, or come home.

Death takes a man standing within inches of other men who are saved. No one knows why. Not even the fortunate ones who do come home to the arms of those they love.

How difficult it is to see any pattern in life when one can see no selection in death. It is especially hard when death has come and that it is, as the British say:

"Goodnight, forever."

No nuke protests held in Russia

THE EARTH is literally crawling with people who seem to be frightened out of their wits of dying in a nuclear holocaust.

All over America and Europe, the fearful risk abuse, arrest, and imprisonment in illegal protests against nuclear weapons. They do not, however, protest in Russia.

The ministers who decry our defense program must have overlooked the Scriptures on the subject -- especially Prov. 21:31. If we fail to prepare the "horse,"

The protest had its official beginning November 12, 1981, when students and faculty members on 151 U.S. college campuses staged a teach-in on the threat of nuclear war. The featured speaker at Harvard was a consular official from the Soviet Embassy.

How many Americans have been invited to share their views at the Kremlin? Physical death is inevitable; the most militant atheist cannot deny that fact. And people who have lived a hundred years lament the brevity of life.

So whether one dies in a nuclear holocaust or of old age, life is brief and death is

certain. That being true, what about our priorities?

The principle of life is much like the principle of mathematics: You always get the right answer -- provided you add the sums correctly.

The favorite text of one famous preacher's sermons was: You are not prepared to live until you are prepared to die. He concluded his message with the question, "If death comes for you tonight, do you know where you will spend eternity?"

We are concerned about the quality of life in this world -- and rightly so, however brief it may be. Is it not more important to be concerned

about life in the next world, where we will live forever?

We had no choice about being born into this world, but we have almost unlimited choices as to the way we live our lives.

Friendliness generates friendliness. Kindness breeds kindness, and goodwill is contagious. The germ of love may not appear as powerful as that of hate, but in the crucible of time it has a much greater survival value.

No one wants a nuclear war. But would it prevent the holocaust for the nation that has been The Good Samaritan to the whole earth to discard its most powerful weapon?

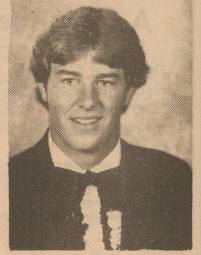

County Agents Corner

Pecan growers in Motley County as well as homeowners with backyard trees need to be on the lookout for casebearers -- those perennial pests that can completely destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models as well as trappings and scouting reports, casebearers should be showing up on pecan trees in Motley County about June first.

Because of cooler spring temperatures, the casebearer is emerging a little later than normal. Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a two-week period in May -- from the first week of May in southern and coastal areas to the last week of the month in northern sections.

To time spray applications for casebearer control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pen.

The eggs are white when first laid, then turn red over a three-to-five day period before turning white again after they hatch. Apply an insecticide the third day after the first egg hatches so as to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or more, a second spraying may be necessary.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include diazinon, Guthion, Pydrin, Malathion and Zelone.

Two leaders have volunteered to help 4-H'ers with roping. This also could be discussed at the clinics. Please call if you are interested.

Calvert is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Calvert of Flomot.

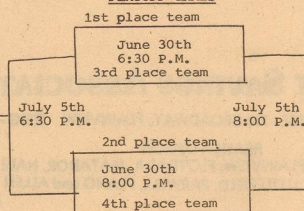

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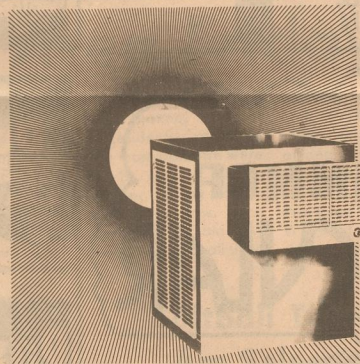
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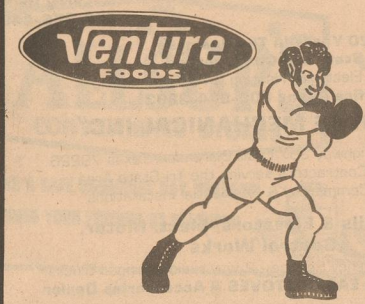
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
