Drought Hurts Grazing As Well As Cotton

Between January 1 and September 12, Matador had received 14.43 inches of precipitation, and the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin call the crop moisture excessively dry for this late in the year.

Range and pasture conditions have made little improvement since the first of the summer, and the county remains under drought-like conditions with virtually no significant grazing available. Supplemental feeding has picked up because of the lack of forage.

Cotton harvest is just

around the corner as fields are maturing rapidly. Dryland fields have deteriorated further as recent showers had little effect on relieving stress.

Irrigated fields are in good condition with excellent yields expected.

Other precipitation reports to date include Floydada 10.06, Plainview 7.57, Tulia 15.58, Crosbyton 9.96, Lubbock 7.85, Muleshoe 7.59, Paducah 10.15, Spur 11.41, and Childress 6.51. Wink in Southwest Texas has received only .02 this year.

Lionism Extolled By District Governor

Lionism and the concepts for which it stands and exemplifies were highlights of an address Sept. 20, before Matador Lions Club in regular meeting at the United Methodist Church. Speaker was District 2-T2 Governor Gerald Devault, of Lubbock. He was accompanied by other Lubbock Lions members and a delegation of members from the Snyder Lions Club, headed by Deputy District Governor-at-large Lion C.A. McCowan, who introduced the speaker.

Guests, at the request of recorder Lion Bill McCaghren, introduced themselves. The district governor was accompanied by Lions Duane Howell, Ron Bramlett and Bobby Judd, all members of the Lipscomb Lions Club in Lubbock; Lions C.A. McCowan, Olen F. Bunch, Miller Robinson and Lyle Deffebach, of Snyder; and Scotty Abbott and Tim Ayers of Matador.

Merits and benefits of the Lions Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville were extolled by both Lion McCowan and Dist. Governor Devault in his address.

"Enthusiasm is tremendous all over the district, in our various projects," Devault said. "Our last cabinet meeting at Girls Town in

Whiteface was well attended."

Lion Devault was installed as the 26th 2-T2 District Governor at the 66th International Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, and described the impressive flag ceremony in which 157 flags were flown, representing each country having Lions clubs. "These flags represented different cultures and different religions, yet the basic need was there - to help our fellowman," he declared.

Governor Devault outlined four points initiated and supported by Lions International: Sight conservation (Eye Bank program and providing leader dogs and canes for the blind); Drug Awareness program; Diabetes Program to aid diabetics, described as the 3rd known cause of death and the number one cause of blindness; and last, to build Lionism by new chartered clubs.

He told the club that one of the district goals is to promote Lion Art Cook as an International Director. "If we can achieve this, it will be the first time this district will have had a director on the International level," he said. He concluded with again emphasizing that "helping others is what Lionism is all about."

Gramm Launches Senate Campaign

U.S. Rep. Phil Gramm has launched his campaign for the United States Senate with a four-day swing across Texas in which he urged the people "to look at my record, to gauge the depth of my commitment, to measure my accomplishments and to elect me to represent Texas in the Senate."

Gramm, who has served five years in the House of Representatives, is from College Station, where he taught economics at Texas A&M University for 12 years before winning election to Congress.

In his announcement, the congressman said that he would "ask for the vote of each citizen on the basis of common concerns which deal directly with the well-being of all our people."

"In 1978, I left Texas A&M to go to Congress as the representative of the people of the 6th District of Texas. I did not go to Washington to play the old political game of 'go along to get along,'" Gramm said. "I ran for Congress to make things happen - to get things done."

"I'm proud to say that I have played a small role in achieving that objective," he said. Congressman Gramm, who holds a Ph.D. in economics, co-authored the Gramm-Latta budget bills which formed the core of the President's economic program.

"Under that program," he said, "we have reduced the growth of federal spending by two-thirds, cut the inflation rate by four-fifths and cut the prime interest rate in half. We have dug out from under the economic rubble of a recession which started four months before any budget cut or tax cut went into effect. And, we have ignited a strong recovery which

has created over 1.5 million new jobs this year alone."

Gramm pointed out that when the abstract numbers are translated into real terms, it means that "we have brought down the average mortgage payment for a new home in Texas by \$191 a month."

"A Texas family earning \$20,000 a year has \$3,000 more buying power today than it would have had if the Carter inflation had continued," he said.

Gramm said that throughout his years in Congress, he has consistently applied a high standard in deciding how to vote on spending bills: "On each vote spending the taxpayers' money, I have thought of a hard-working person in my district, like Dickie Flatt, a printer in Mexia, or Eddie Rodriguez, a filling station operator in Bryan, people who work on Saturday and at night if the job requires it."

"I have asked a simple question: 'Are the benefits to be provided by this program worth taking money away from Dickie Flatt or Eddie Rodriguez to pay for it?' According to Gramm, few programs can stand up to such a test.

The congressman said he was "proud to have co-authored the budget which reordered national priorities" to match those held by most Texans. Gramm said he has always felt that his first responsibility was to the people who sent him to Washington.

"I have never allowed partisanship to stand between me and what I believed to be right for the people who elected me," he said. "My first obligation is to those who sent me to Washington, and I do not mean to change that policy as a member of the Senate."

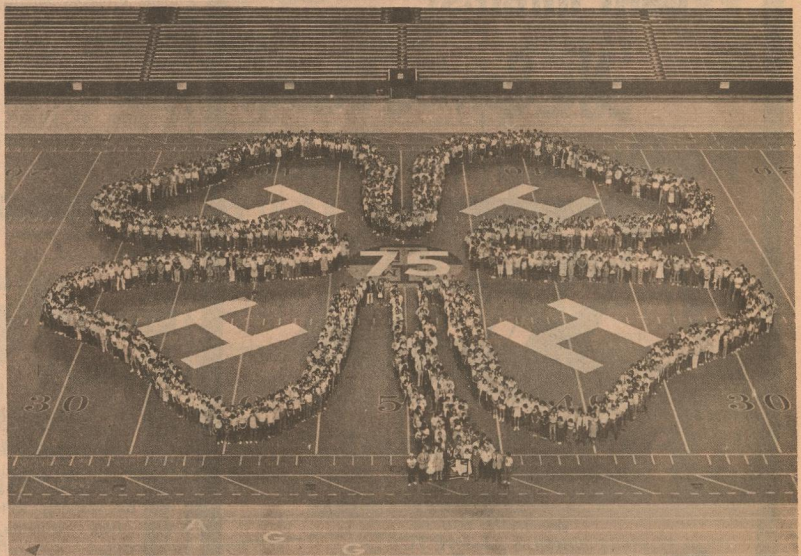

Instant Household Hints

R-PEP TO VIEW MICROCOMPUTER

The 1983 annual meeting of the Rolling Plains Economic Program will highlight the latest information on microcomputer use in management software and hardware selection Thursday, October 6, 1983.

The day-long program at the Vernon Regional Junior College will include workshop sessions on crop management software review and demonstration, livestock management software review and demonstration, and demonstration, farm and ranch accounting application, electronic worksheet application and microcomputers and the family. Officers for the 1984 R-PEP year will be elected during the general business session.

R-PEP is a regional organization sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to promote economic growth and development and improve family living in a 30-county area. Dick Yeager of Vernon, R-PEP Chairman, and Jim Schur of Seymour, Vice-chairman, will preside over the meeting.

Registration begins at 9:00 a.m. in the lobby of the College Administration Building. Those wishing to attend should pre-register at their local County Extension office. The \$6 registration fee includes lunch.

Featured speaker will be Dr. James M. McGrann, Economist-Management, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas. He will speak on microcomputer use. Program participants will receive actual training on the selection and use of microcomputers to meet their needs. Dr. McGrann was in Matador at our computer workshop last spring.

FIELD DAY

The Chillicothe Experiment Station Field Day will be October 29. The Field Day will feature information on cotton, grain sorghum, and guar including reduced tillage, furrow diking, moisture conservation, boll weevil and bollworm control by crop management and spraying. Registration

begins at 1:00 p.m. The Experiment Station is 5 miles Southwest of Chillicothe on FM 392.

4-H PROGRAM BUILDS ON PAST WORK

4-H has a proud 75-year heritage that forms the basis of this Year's National 4-H Week theme: "4-H: Building on Experience."

NATIONAL 4-H Week, Oct. 2-8, is a special time for 4-H members and leaders to promote the nation's largest youth organization and to bring some recognition to its contributions.

Over the years millions of 4-H'ers have gained valuable leadership experiences and learned practical skills that have improved their quality of life.

Today almost five million youth across the nation between the ages of 9 and 19 are gaining valuable learning experiences through 4-H - 187,000 of those are in Texas. The Texas 4-H program reaches boys and girls through more than 2,000 community based clubs and another 900 short-term project groups.

4-H'ers are engaged in some 50 different project areas in which they gain lifelong skills through the program's "learning-by-doing" concept. These projects had their beginning 75 years ago when special Corn Clubs were organized for boys in Jack County. First focusing on such traditional areas as crop and livestock production and canning and sewing, 4-H projects now deal with a wide range of subjects, including Range Science, Career Exploration and Veterinary Science—even the use of computers.

The 4-H program is conducted in each state through the Cooperative Extension Service and is backed by the state's land-grant university (Texas A&M University for the Texas program) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Some 22,000 adult and teenage 4-H leaders shoulder much of the responsibility for the 4-H program in Texas.
