"My wife pushed me to put in a store," he says. "She wanted to put me to work. I wasn't the type to sit looking at four well."

Spray's change in occupation came after a heart attack and bypass surgery in 1973 - Spray was then 39 years old -- and after a stroke "on January 3, 1976, at 8:30 a.m."

"In the last seven years, Spray says, "there's been a lot of hard work and a lot of persistence, but He (God) is healing me every day in every way. It's been a slow process. When I first opened the store I couldn't even hobble around without

It also, according to Spray, makes a difference in your appreciation levels. Things that might be taken for granted when life seems a forever proposition are no longer taken for granted after a neardeath experience. Even customers get more special.

This is one place, Spray says, "where the customers' business is really appreciated."

# Senate Approves Legislation **Deregulating Cable Television**

and expected to be available in tyear or so.

Bob Packwood, R-Ore., chair-of the Commerce, Science and Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore, chairman of the Commerce. Science and Transportation Committee that sent the bill to the floor, described the cable industry as having just moved from "infancy to adolescence." "It has a long way to go to become an adult," he said, suggesting the deregulation bill would provide a giant step in that direction.

A similar bill passed the Senate last year, but was never taken up in the House. Proponents are optimistic the legislation will clear both houses this year.

Local governments would retain

Other major portions state that no government will have authority to regulate or restrict the kind of service offered by a cable system and that a franchise holder will be entitled to have it renewed unless the city can prove a serious failure to live up to agreements under the expiring franchise.

Although limited in the degree of control over programming, the bill does permit local governments to prohibit "obscenity or other nonconstitutionally protected speech.
