Hance Introduces Bill To Stop Phone Increases

Rep. Kent D-Texas, has introduced legislation in the House of Represen-tatives that would help stop massive telephone

The Hance measure, entitled the "Telephone Equity Act of 1983," repeals a Federal Communications Commission ruling on longdistance access charge that would have added more than \$9 billion annually to telephone bills throughout the country by 1990. The charges would have translated into rate translated into rate increases of nearly \$8 each month for the next several years for each American home with a

telephone.

The access charge to use long distance lines would be placed on monthly bills, even if the consumer did not make a long distance call.

In anticipation of the FCC ruling, telephone companies have re-FCC ruling, companies have re-quested rate increases of more than \$8 billion from state regulatory mmissions through-

ern Bell originally asked for more than \$2 billion in rate increases, but reduced that request in the past few weeks to \$1.2 billion.

telephone service was seriously threatened by the actions of the FCC," Hance said. "We needed to take steps to make sure everyone would still have access to phone service at prices that didn't cut maintain reasonable rates as well as protect rates as well as protect the poor, the elderly and those in hard-to-reach rural areas from losing telephone service, either because of price or location." In addition to dealing

with the potential increase in consumer telephone bills, the telephone bills, the Hance legislation creates a "Lifeline Service" which would guarantee service to those families unable to afford telephones.

to afford telephones.

"Everyone should have access to a telephone for emergence," Hance said. "The 'Lifeline Service' will give the elderly, ill and low-income people the assurance that they will be able to contact emergency fire, police, emergency fire, police and ambulance services when they need them."

Hance believes his legislation will find favorable review from other Members Congress and is hopeful for a quick resolution of problems now facing consumers because of telephone rate increas-

Texas cotton growers have an opportunity to control their own destiny as fars the 1984 cotton program is concerned.

Several provisions of the program are still "up in the air," and farmers have until Oct. 4 to offer suggestions and comments. At stake is next year's cotton production and its ultimate influence on market prices.

"A number of provisions that will bear heavily on the market supply -- demand relationship next year are still unresolved," says Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "So, farmer input is needed to enable policy makers to make better informed

He points out that

industry are needed on the following: -- Whether or not USDA should establish an acreage reduction program and at what level.

-- The appropriate national program national program acreage and voluntary reduction percentage if no acreage reduction

program is announced.
-- Whether or not
USDA should establish a paid land diversion program, the percent-age of diversion and level of payment.

-- Whether or not there should be a PIK (payment-in-kind) pro-gram and the provisions

of such a program.

-- Whether or not to require offsetting compliances if an acreage reduction

program is established.
-- Methods for determining 1984 crop acreage bases for

ocreage bases for upland cotton.

The base loan rate for upland cotton will be determined by statutory formula according to domestic and world price data.

-- The '84 target price is currently set at a minimum of 81 cents per pound by the 1981 farm
