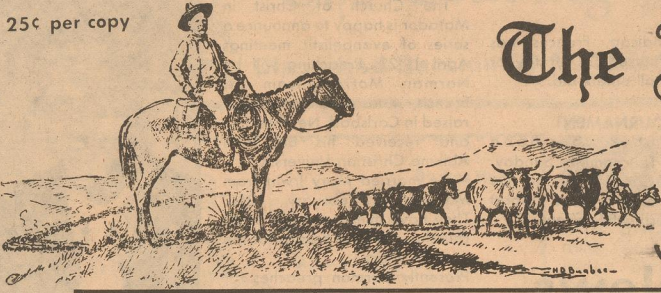

## Public Utility Commission Sets Telephone Hearings

Rex Allen, TV and movie star, helped Rolling Plains PCA celebrate their 50th birthday with a laugh filled program at both sections of the Annual Stockholders Meeting held April 6 in Childress and April 7 in Stamford.

Allen, whose ranching family has had a long affiliation with PCA in Arizona, recalled hard times on their "starvation ranch" during drought and the Depression. Interspersed with reminiscences of his boyhood and life now in Palm Springs, California, he entertained the large crowds with renditions of such favorites as "Up A Lazy River" and "Tumblin Tumbleweeds."

In appreciation of his excellent performances, R.C. Cobb, President of Rolling Plains PCA, presented a gold-plated 50th Anniversary commemorative belt buckle to Rex Allen. Shelley Smith, Executive Director of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center and member of the Association, introduced Allen at both gatherings and was also given one of the limited edition buckles.

B.H. DeBusk, Board Member from Anson, gave the Report from the Board which cited the strength the Association has attained in its 50 year history and especially the growth since the merging of the Memphis and Stamford PCAs creating Rolling Plains Production Credit Association in 1965.

The Nominating Committee Report was presented by Darrell Richards, Chairman from Avoca. Elected to serve on the 1985 Nominating Committee were: Childress office- Ben Teague; Matador office- Stewart Dixon; Munday office- James Albus; Spur office- Bill Young; and Stamford office- Jack Young.

Henard, Jr. of Wellington.

Mr. Cobb introduced many former directors, officers and personnel as well as numerous guests in attendance and discussed the Association's financial report.

The Board of Directors met immediately following the Annual Meeting. For the upcoming year, W.J. Boykin and W.H. Williams will continue as Board Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively. Action of the Board resulted in Matador

## Record Voter Turnout Noted Here Saturday

A record number of voters turned out for the county wide election held Saturday, with 472 voters going to the polls.

Three hundred residents turned out in Matador to re-elect Mayor Gary Lancaster and Councilmen John Briscoe and Doyle Rose, all running unopposed.

Roy Tippin and Roy Hobbs were each elected for three-year terms on the Motley County School Board of Trustees, and

Randy Barton was elected to an unexpired two-year term. All these men also ran unopposed.

Write-in candidate Kenny Barton received 322 votes to be elected to one of the three places on the Hospital District Board and Buzz Thacker received 387 votes to retain his seat on the board. Donnie Jackson received 262 votes to win a seat on the board. Also running were Dude Speed with 202 votes and Robert Dickson with 135.

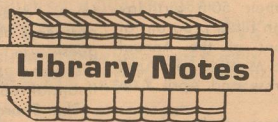

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## Social Security News

People who get Social Security checks and who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages from a job or in self-employment in 1983 have until April 16, 1984 to file an annual report of their earnings.

The 1983 exempt amounts were \$4,920 for people under 65 all of the year and \$6,600 for people 65 or over any part of 1983. In general, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over the exempt amount.

Social Security uses the annual report to decide whether the person received the correct amount of benefits during 1983. If too much or too little was paid, any adjustment necessary is made based on the annual report.

A special monthly test is used during a person's first year of retirement. Under this test, a person can get a benefit for a month in which he or she did not earn wages over the monthly limit and did not perform

substantial services in self-employment. This monthly test can be used only in the person's first year of retirement.

Most people who need to file a report should have received one in the mail. If a person did not get a form, or lost or misplaced the one he or she did get, another copy of the annual report form can be obtained at any Social Security office.

The people at the office will be glad to answer any questions. They also have a leaflet, "How work affects your Social Security checks," which contains more information about the earnings test. The annual exempt amounts for 1984 are \$5,160 for people under 65 and \$6,960 for people 65 or over. A different test applies to people who get benefits because of disability.

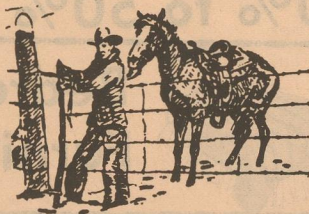

Alexander Hamilton, the first secretary of the treasury, and an aide to General George Washington during the Revolution, was born January 11, 1757, in the West Indies.

He was the son of a Scotch father and a French Huguenot mother.

He went to work as a young boy on the island of St. Croix and later moved to Boston and then New York.

He attended Columbia University and joined in the fight for American independence, having fought at Long Island, Trenton and Princeton.

He was soon recognized as one of the most brilliant leaders of the new nation.

He was a member of the Continental Congress and President Washington's first treasury secretary.

In 1800, he threw his influence behind John Adams, who was tied in the voting in the House of Representatives with Aaron Burr in the presidential election. Adams was elected.

Four years later Burr challenged Hamilton to a duel. Hamilton accepted though he didn't duel, and fired his pistol in the air.

Burr cold bloodedly shot and killed Hamilton. Burr's name has lived in infamy since.

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS AND PERSONS: On or about April 23, 1984, the above-named Motley County will request the Texas Department of Community Affairs to release Federal funds under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended, to be used for the following projects: ACTIVITY: Senior Citizen's Center. ESTIMATED COST: \$98,049.00.

The site for the proposed project is north of the Courthouse bounded on the east by Eubanks Street, on the south by Stewart Street and on the west by Main Street, located in the city limits of Matador, Motley County, Texas within Enumeration District-179.

#### Finding of No Significant Impact

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named Motley County has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

**SENIOR CITIZEN'S CENTER:** The project site is located in the downtown business area north of the Motley County Courthouse. The project site itself is vacant, undeveloped land, and other surrounding land also includes some vacant land. The design of the building will be compatible with surrounding buildings to blend favorably with the environment. No increase in area traffic or traffic patterns is anticipated since the site is in a commercial area.

Construction activities will produce certain amounts of dust and equipment exhaust pollution. However, these effects will be limited in duration, extent and intensity. The completed project will produce certain amounts of air pollution from heating and cooling systems and from automobiles of users of the facility. However, the total amounts of these effects will be insignificant. Any emission producing equipment will meet all Federal and State standards. There are no hindrances to atmospheric dispersal of any emissions that might be produced by the project.

An Environmental Assessment respecting the within projects has been made by the above-named Motley County which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Assessment is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

**Public Comments on Finding**  
All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by Motley County, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at Judge Whitaker's office in the Courthouse on or before April 20, 1984.

All such comments so received will be considered and Motley County, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within projects prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

**Release of Funds**  
Motley County will undertake the projects described above with Community Development funds from the Texas Department of Community Affairs under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Motley County is certifying to TDCA that Motley County and Billy J. Whitaker in his official capacity as County Judge consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied.

The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval of Motley County may use the Texas Community Development Program funds and TDCA will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

**Objections to State Release of Funds**  
Texas Department of Community Affairs will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDCA; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process.

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58.75) and may be addressed to Texas Community Development Program; Texas Department of Community Affairs, P.O. Box 13166, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by TDCA. No objection received after May 11, 1984 will be considered by TDCA. The Chief Executive Officer of Motley County is Judge Billy J. Whitaker.
