## Motley Cagers End Season With Outstanding Record

ENDING the basketball season in a heartbreak defeat, Motley County Matadors nevertheless racked up an outstanding 18-12 record and advanced to regional playoffs. They lost regional championship by only one point!

Backing the Matadors all the way, friends and patrons this week bought signatures on a page ad to show their appreciation of the team and Coach Danny James.

Following is sportswriter Gary Welling's account of the season:

The Motley County Matadors went down in defeat 75-76 to the States No. 1 ranked team in the regional semifinals, held Saturday in Levelland, after achieving the right to advance into the semifinals with a 58-50 victory over the Happy Cowboys in a game played Friday.

The leading scorers in the tourney for Motley was Joe Campbell, who made 48 points in the two games, followed by Larry Pitts with 22. Joe was high point man in Saturdays game with 38, and Larry hit 16 Friday.

The Matadors ended the season with an 18-12 mark. Friday's game proved to be an exciting one as the Matadors held on to be victorious over the Cowboys, winning the game in the last quarter.

The game was neck and neck throughout, with the Wildcats holding on to win in the last five seconds, by the score of 76-75. Although the Matadors were defeated, one has never seen such a display by a team to catch up with the Matadors, exploding for 44 points in the last two quarters.

Percentage-wise the Matadors combined to shoot 50 per cent of their free throws, making 17 of 34 in the two games. From the field, the team shot 49 per cent as they sank 61 of 124 attempts in the games.

Houston cameraman Robert Brandon of KPRC-TV has been named the national newsfilm cameraman of the year by the National Press Photographers Association.

Brandon, 29, was presented the award for a portfolio of his work during the past year - a collection that included film stories on emergency attempts to rescue four persons injured in a wreck, an essay on homemade doughnuts and a feature on a man who built his own airplane and then flew it.

"All I try to do is present on film as honestly as I possibly can what I see with my own eyes when I'm there," Brandon said.

Brandon also won an award from the same association in 1971 for spot news film coverage of a tank car derailment and explosion during which he was injured. Brandon, who is originally from Matador, is a graduate of West Texas State University. He and his wife Donna have two children, daughter Kristi and son Ronald.

## Texas Wildlife Shown In Slide Presentation

An interesting slide presentation on Texas wildlife was shown February 24 at the 39th annual Father-Son banquet, at the school gymnasium.

John R. Hunter, associate professor of range and wildlife management at Texas Tech University, was speaker for the occasion and showed slides of animals in this area, principally coyotes and bobcats, and birds,

including pheasant, quail and prairie chickens. He also showed slides made at a wildlife refuge near Sinton.

The program was educational as well as entertaining. Mr. Hunter is also president of the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, and included in his narration, examples of wildlife experiments in areas where the animals roam.

Gary Simpson served as Master of Ceremonies and Invocation was by Rev. Lloyd Hearn. R. E. Campbell Sr., led the group in singing "America," and Boss Lion J.M. (Sonny) Russell introduced the speaker. The banquet took the place of the Matador Lions Club's regular first Tuesday meeting. The club has sponsored the annual event from the first banquet in 1937.

## Former Resident Claimed By Death

Word has been received here by Mrs. Mike Hoyle informing her of the death March 4, of an uncle, J. E. Eubank of Des Moines, Iowa. Funeral services were on March 8.

Mr. Eubank first came here just after the turn of the century and taught school. He was later a Motley County surveyor. He was married here to Miss Hattie Tatom in about 1903 and they lived here until 1908 when they moved to Snyder, Texas. They came back here after a few years and stayed until 1920.

They lived in Kansas City and then moved to Des Moines in about 1924, where they had lived since Mr. Eubank was a tax appraiser for the county and later the city of Des Moines until his retirement at 86. He enjoyed good health until the past year, and would have been 98 years old on March 15. ## Fire Hazards Continue

GRASS FIRES continued last week to menace property owners in the area and for the second time struck the Matador Ranch.

Thursday afternoon Matador Volunteer firemen were summoned to a range fire on the Matador Ranch about three miles south of town. The fire started about 2 p.m. east of Highway 70 and quickly spread in an easterly direction.

Firefighting units from Matador and Paducah fought the swiftly moving blaze as it

spread east to the Charlie Keith and D. P. Keith pastures. Wind gusts up to 50 m.p.h. hampered firemen in fighting the fire which started from unknown causes. However, the fire had been brought under control by about 5 p.m.

A number of local ranchers assisted in fighting the flames with cattle sprayers as well as county and State equipment. The fire was not as costly as that of two weeks ago which struck the Matador Head-

quarters. Only about 150 acres were lost Thursday, along with about 100 acres of adjoining land.

Fire department officials remind citizens that throwing matches and cigarettes from automobiles can start a costly grass fire. They ask each citizen to help in preventing these fires during extremely dry weather.

Earlier Thursday, firemen were called to the West Texas Gin to fight a burr fire which had started there. The

firemen were still trying to extinguish the fire when the one south of town broke out. There was concern for a while that the high wind would spread the fire to adjoining pastureland.

Saturday, Matador firemen were called to another range fire about 10 miles north of town on the Malcolm Jameson ranch. That blaze was quickly extinguished with a minimum of damage. (The Tribune thanks Rodney Williams for the above story).

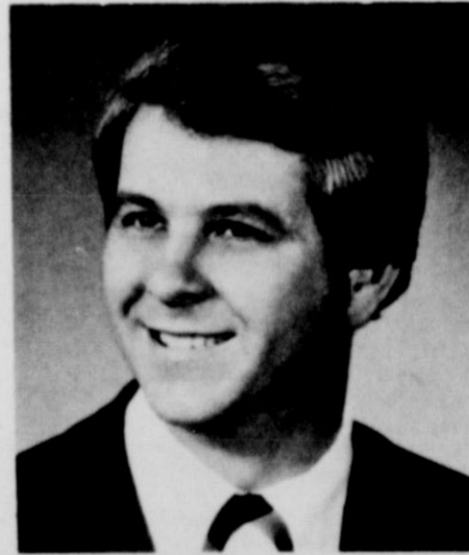
