Irrigation Changes North County Area

THE MAGIC of irrigation water has brought vast changes in a large area of north Motley County, including Flomot and the Folley communities where more than 80 wells spread life-giving moisture to the rich soils.

It all started in 1938 when Ike Reed put down a well for irrigation and operated it with a gasoline engine, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. But it was many years later (the late 50's) before irrigation became general, and the search for irrigation water became more intense. A number of years ago natural gas was

brought to the Folley area by a spur line and now most of the wells use the fuel.

Peanuts is the big money crop according to records. Last year the county produced 3,255,314 lbs. of peanuts, an average of 2,672 lbs. per acre, but this included 682 lbs. per acre from 66 acres of dryland crops. The county had a total of 1,219 acres in peanuts.

Of the total of 165 irrigation wells in the county, 82 are in the Flomot and Folley areas. A few wells produce as much as 8-inches, but most are smaller.

L. W. (Junior) Crowell is typical of the farmers in the irrigation belt. He has three irrigation wells (5-inch) from which he waters 160 acres. He has 36 acres in Bermuda grass, 22 acres in peanuts and 53 acres in cotton, with the balance in hay. He runs 50 mother cows and has a total of 430 acres in farms and grassland. His three irrigation wells are served by underground pipe.

Because of the sandy, rolling land, irrigation is done by sprinkler. County Agent Pallmeyer said only six farms use the furrow system to water crops.

Last week end a Tribune reporter went to the Folley community to make pictures of sand dunes reported in the area from Thursday's storm. The sand did blow in the area, but the farmers and stockmen took it in their stride. Cattle were grazing on the young growth of Bermuda grass and well-tilled fields were awaiting planting time. Sprinklers were going in fields and in the yards of modern well-kept homes. Irrigation has changed the picture in an area where blowing sand once prevailed.

X-Ray Here Next Week

Sponsored by the three Lions Clubs in Motley County, the mobile chest x-ray machine will be here at the American Legion, Friday, May 7. The sponsors hope to x-ray all residents of the county over 12 years of age.

The Christmas Seal mobile x-ray unit is operated by the West Texas TB & RD Association, of Lubbock, and covers 23 West Texas counties.

The three Lions Clubs, Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador, guarantee \$200 in the cost of operation. A charge of \$1.50 per person is made and usually pays the guarantee.

The chest X-rays have located many cases of emphysema, and other chest conditions, as well as heart conditions. A postal card is mailed to each person with a normal chest film. A first class mail letter is mailed to those whose films indicate complications.

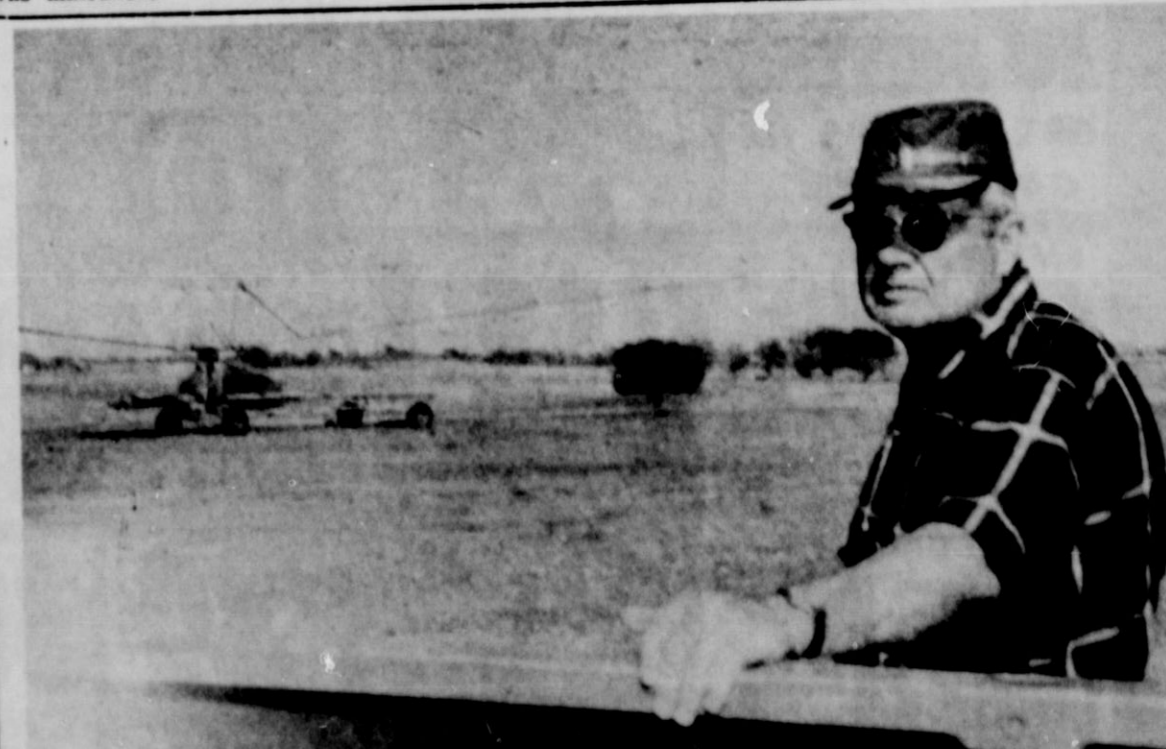
Dinner At Church
