## Ray Farabee Named Legislator of Year

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls was named "Legislator of the Year" by Tex. Junior College Teachers Association at a Houston banquet last month.

After accepting the award, Farabee said, "It is a great pleasure to be honored by an association so dedicated to the higher education of our citizens. Junior Colleges provide important educational opportunities to every student within his/her community, excellent vocational training, and a strong transition to senior college. In addition, the colleges help keep the community vital and alive. It is my hope that the Legislature can continue to assist you in your important work."

The award was given in recognition of the Senator's "effective leadership and outstanding service in behalf of the community junior colleges of Texas, and in sincere

appreciation of his support of the legislative goals of the Association." The Association's Executive Committee voted unanimously to give the award to Senator Farabee.

"I am pleased to say that there are four junior colleges in the Senate District I represent. Cooke County College in Gainesville, Grayson County College in Denison, Vernon Regional Junior College in Vernon, and Western Texas College in Snyder serve the people of the 30th District in an excellent capacity. 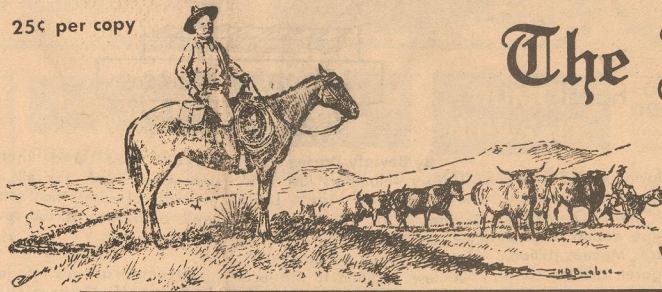
party dresses.

## Annual Livestock Show Set For Monday, March 26

The 44th annual Motley County Livestock Show will begin Monday, March 26, at 7 a.m. with the weighing in of the animals. Twenty-one steers, 25 hogs, and 5 lambs will be entered in the show.

A breakfast furnished by Billy Wason and prepared by Walter Jones will be served in the School cafeteria for exhibitors and others helping at the stock show.

Starting show time is 10 a.m. with hogs first, then lambs and heifers. After a lunch break the steers will be judged. The sale will start right after the steers are shown.

Trophies will be awarded in

all classes. The W.E. Burleson Estate will furnish the Rate-of-Gain and the Hereford class trophies. Matador Nursery, Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Cross will furnish the trophy for Best Steer Bred in Motley County. The other trophies will be given by the Motley County Livestock Association.

Showmanship buckles will be awarded to steer, hog and lamb exhibitors. They will be sponsored by Rolling Plains Production Credit Association, Caprock Gin in Flomot, and Plainview Co-Op Compress, Inc. Ribbons will be furnished by the Motley County Farm Bureau.

Judges for the show will be Syd Conner of Post and Nelson Adams of Vernon.

A concession stand will be run by the 4-H leaders. They will be serving hamburgers for lunch.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the show and sale, and support the young FFA and 4-H exhibitors who have worked hard raising and preparing their animals for the annual show.

## Fire Damages Home Of Local Resident

A late evening fire gutted two rooms of the home of Mrs. Lila Meador, Saturday, and heavily damaged the rest of the house. Everything may be totally lost due to smoke and heat damage.

The fire, believed to have sparked from an electrical short, started in the kitchen and quickly spread through the dining area and into the living room and back porch. The kitchen and livingroom were completely destroyed.

The house, located at 820 Hackberry, received about as

much damage from smoke as it did from fire, Mrs. Meador said Tuesday. The home was insured.

Mrs. Meador said she heard what sounded like an explosion and thought the noise came from outside. She started down the hall from her bedroom and saw flames coming from the kitchen area. She rushed to a neighbors house to call the fire department.

Insurance investigators were on the scene Tuesday, but no estimate of total damage had been made by news deadline.

## Conference On Parenting Offered At Wayland

A one-day conference on improving parenting skills will be offered next month at Wayland Baptist University.

Sponsored by the Division of Christian Ministries in Wayland's College of Christian Leadership, the conference is slated for Friday, April 13, and will convene in the Llano Estacado Museum.

Dr. Myron J. Beard, staff psychologist for the Crossroads Samaritan Counseling Center in Lubbock, will lead the one-day meeting.
