

that there is someone who has the power to solve every problem and who can do so with majestic ease. How many times I fail to remember to call on God's limitless power to create solutions


when man has made a mess.



WORKSHOP OFFERS TAX PLANNING HELP

Ways to reduce a taxable farm or ranch estate and to pass an operating business on to the next generation without burdens on taxes will be explained in a two-day seminar here March 27-

being presented across the state by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Each day's program at the Civic Center holiday Inn, 801 Avenue Q, will begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 4:30 p.m. The \$50 registration fee covers all minar materials, refreshments

and lunches for both days.

"The seminar will explain a wide variety of estate tax savings and estate administrawide variety of estate tax savings and estate administrative features to farmers, ranchers and agribusiness people," said Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension economist and an attorney, who leads three other specialists in conducting the program.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," Hayenga said. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law."


