Matador To Receive \$212,200 For Improvements

The City of Matador has been awarded \$212,200 by the Texas Department of Community Affairs to install water distribution and fire protection improvements in northwest Matador.

Mayor Gary Lancaster Mayor Gary Lancester was informed of the award in a letter dated Sept. 19, from Governor Mark White. Action to obtain such funds was put into motion early last spring and the request had to be processed through several state agencies.

"This award is made available through the second annual competition for funding under the Texas Community Develop-ment Program," the letter states. "A representative of the Texas Department of Community Affairs will contact you concerning the contract agreement." The letter did not specify when the funds could be expected in order for the improvements to be started. "This award is made available





Producers participating in the 1985 acreage reduction programs will be subject to liquidated damages if they do not comply. damages if they do not comply. On September 14, 1984, the 1985 Upland Cotton Program was announced. The target price is \$0.81 per pound. The national average loan rate has not been determined. There will be a cash land diversion payment based on 10 percent of the farms base acreage times the farms eage effective yield times \$0.30 per pound. You can receive 50 percent of the cash land diversion payment if you request

diversion payment if you request it at sign-up. Advance deficiency payments are authorized. You can receive 50 percent of the projected deficiency of 19.8 cents if requested at sign-up. A PIK Program for upland cotton is not authorized. Eligibility for program benefits will be limited to 1985 Upland Cotton Program Participants. The maximum upland cotton acreage to be harvested will be limited to no more than 70 percent of the farms base. farms base

Your base acreage will be computed by averaging your 1983 and 1984 planted and 1983 and 1984 planted and considered planted acreage. You must place 28.57 percent of your farm's 1985 planted upland cotton acreage plus 10 percent of the farm's upland cotton base in the Acreage Conservation Reserve (set-aside). Cross and offsetting compliance does not apply. Grazing of ACR is not permitted during the 5 principal gorwing during the 5 principal growing


