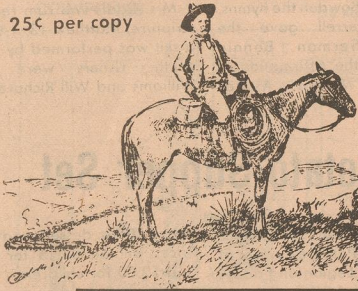


Improvement Funds Awarded City

Matador To Receive \$212,200 For Improvements

The City of Matador has been awarded \$212,200 by the Texas Department of Community Affairs to install water distribution and fire protection improvements in northwest Matador.

Mayor Gary Lancaster was informed of the award in a letter dated Sept. 19, from Governor Mark White. Action to obtain such funds was put into motion early last spring and the request had to be processed through several state agencies.

"This award is made available through the second annual competition for funding under the Texas Community Development Program," the letter states. "A representative of the Texas Department of Community Affairs will contact you concerning the contract agreement."

The letter did not specify when the funds could be expected in order for the improvements to be started.
