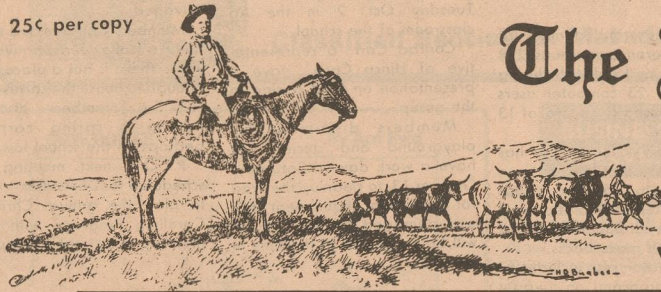


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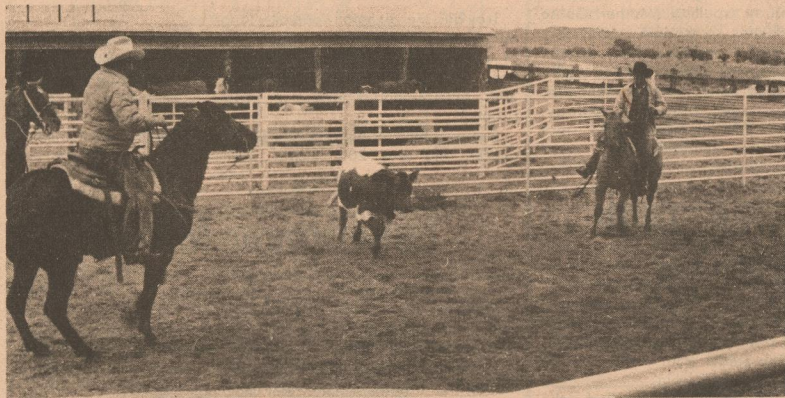

750 Attend Two-Day Burleson Benefit Rodeo

The weather, remaining true to its fickle nature, sent an unseasonably cold and dreary day to commence the activities for the Burleson Memorial Rodeo on September 29. About 750 people attended the two day event, which benefited the Dusty Burleson Memorial Scholarship of the Ranch Management Program at Clarendon Junior College.

Regina Cruse, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Cruse, was awarded a gold and silver belt buckle, the first of the Burleson Memorial buckles to be given, for accumulating the highest point in the youth activities on Saturday morning. Runner-up Cory Franks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Coy Franks, received a headstall made by Alvin Durham of Roaring Springs. Kenzie Burson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Burson of Silverton, won the trophy while other youngsters took home rosettes and ribbons for their efforts.

Ray Minkley, Motley County agent, was assisted by Gayle Thompson of Floydada, in directing the arena events. Participants were from Silverton, Flomot, Roaring Springs, Matador, Floydada and Tahoka.

Matador's own Chig Guinn won the Memorial Buckle in the Open Cutting Horse Contest. Alvin Martin, riding Jack Lackey's mount, came in second and won another specially made, just for this benefit roping, hand tooled headstall made by Alvin Durham.

In the Ranch Cutting, Bandy Bandon of Matador, showed the crowd how to win one of the buckles emblazoned with "Burleson Memorial Roping, Flomot, Texas." Tommy Cooper won a Durham headstall by earning second place. Competitors hailed from Aspermont, Roaring Springs, Matador, Dougherty, South Plains, Silverton and Cooper's Corner.

Under the hay barn, a heated washer pitch battle took place

between the teams of Jack Dempsey - Morris Burkes and B.J. Dempsey - Todd Beedy (Floydada), with father pitted against son in the Dempsey family. About dark the final winning washer was pitched by the more experienced Dempsey and Burkes team, who proudly accepted their buckles.

During the day, the art show presented the work of sixteen local artists and craftsmen at Headquarters, once the home of J.C. and Onie Burleson. One artist painted the ranch headquarters on a windmill blade. Others carried out the western theme with wildlife, Indians, cowboys, windmills, and caprock-type landscapes. Jo Goen of Floydada was coordinator for this show. Artists were Margaret Callahan, Christine Gilbert, Penny Galightly, Barbara Jameson, June Keltz, Terry Keltz, Donna McClendon, Mary Martin, Robert Pyle, John Redding, Elfie Sherman, Jim Word, and Mary Bewley.

In Draw Pot, an event in which ropers drew for partners, Brent Campbell, a Tarleton student, and Ivy Swink of Aspermont won buckles while Kevin Ogle, student from WTU, and Tommy Smith, also of Aspermont, took second place winning headstalls.

Some father and son teams participated in One Over Forty, an event requiring one of the three ropers to be over forty years old. J.E. Waller of Floydada roped with sons Jay and Jim Ed. Button Beedy and son Todd, Laron Fulton and son Chris, all of Floydada, and Raz Ware and son Clifton of Cedar Hill were among those competing against the buckle winners, Raz Ware, roping again with Brett Marble, a Texas Tech student.

Jack Johnson, assisted by Sandy Coleman, announced the Saturday roping events, the last of which was A-B Roping: the more experienced ropers were classified as A while the less experienced, B. Not to be outdone by his father, Clinton Ware and his partner, John

Fortenberry of Lockney won buckles. Winners of the headstalls, placing second in the event, were Wayne Stephens and Tim Washington of Flomot.

Sunday, a much more pleasant day for outdoor events, saw more cutting with Team Penning. The captain of this timed event cuts out three numbered steers matching a number drawn at random by officials. Using team work, the members pen the steers, when the steers choose to cooperate, in a small pen at the opposite end of the arena. Gary Lancaster's team, "Matador," was the winning team with a time of 1.05 while Jay Don Finch's team, "Roaring Springs," came in second with a 1.12.

When open pasture roping got underway, thirty teams were anxiously waiting their turn. Floyd Hardin did the announcing as the steers were turned out to pasture, one at a time. After crossing a 100 ft. barrier, the chase was on. The team of L. Bundy Campbell and grandson Brent Campbell roped their steers amid the cheers from the crowd but winners were brothers, Wes and Kevin Sharp of Clarendon. Kevin is a math and rodeo P.E. instructor at Clarendon Jr. college.

Some of those participating in this wild free-for-all were Lewis Bostick, Travis Jones, J.A. Welch, Kenneth Pitts, S.C. Burleson, Steve Stevens, and Bob Echols (one of the original Flomot Daredevils of the early 1940's) of Roswell, N.M.

The Burleson family, S.C. and Lou, Cararla, and Beverly Brock, expresses gratitude to all participants, helpers, supporters, and rodeo fans for the successful weekend of events. The event is planned as an annual affair.

City Received \$863 Check For Sales Tax

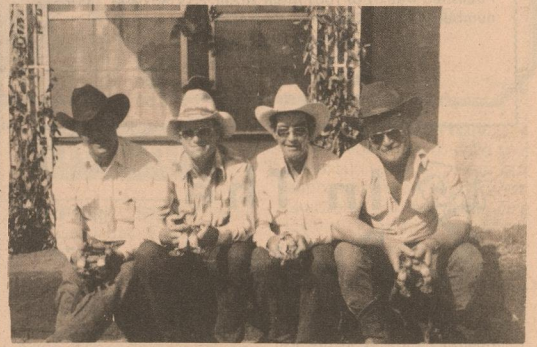
State Comptroller Bob Bullock last week sent checks totaling \$58.2 million in local tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, these payments are running better than 16 percent ahead of last year, and most Texas cities can expect even bigger checks for the rest of 1984," Bullock said. The Comptroller explained next month's checks will reflect payments from sales tax permit holders who report quarterly and the December checks will reflect the first increases from new goods and services taxed for the first time beginning October 2.

Matador received a check for \$863.01, pushing payments this year up to \$15,885.46.

Roaring Springs did not receive a check this period, but has a total of \$7,338.60 in payments this year.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

In order to stay in compliance with the federal guidelines of the grant by which they are funded, beginning October 8, 1984, Motley County Clinic (South Plains Health Providers Organization) will change from 100% pay for services to a sliding fee scale.

So that the clinic may

determine patients' eligibility for a reduced rate, patients will need to take with them, on their next clinic visit, proof of income before deductions.

This applies for services during clinic hours.

Flomot Grocery Robbed And Destroyed By Fire

Disaster hit the Jackie Kendall family in Flomot this week when their grocery store was robbed sometime Tuesday night and destroyed by fire early Thursday morning.

The Flomot Cash Grocery was discovered to be burglarized at 7:00 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 3 when opening the store for business. Mrs. Kendall reported that the meat supply, coffee, cigarettes and snuff, as well as other merchandise, was stolen. Entrance was gained by breaking a glass pane in the door.

The Flomot, Matador and Quitaque Volunteer Fire Departments responded to a fire at the store about 3 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 4. Before the fire was brought under control, the

business was completely destroyed.

The strong south wind was endangering adjacent homes and buildings so the back wall of the store was torn down so the firemen could extinguish flames in the attic of the structure.

SEPTEMBER STATISTICS

661 books were checked out during the month. This included 305 adult, 53 young adult, and 303 children's books. Interlibrary

loan requests totaled nine. Of the 230 reference questions, 218 were filled by local staff during the month. 23 computer users were registered for a total of 13 hours of use.

The library collection now has 6973 books that have been cataloged. In addition, it has approximately 1000 donated books to be cataloged and 2000 uncataloged paperbacks.

The collection also includes 57 computer programs on a variety of topics: computer literacy and programming, memory development, speed reading, the Bible, SAT college entrance exam study, spelling, Mother Goose rhymes, vocabulary development, Spanish, music, math, reading skills, library skills, geography, history, economics, ecology, biology, geology, astronomy, typewriting, stock market investing, and word processing.

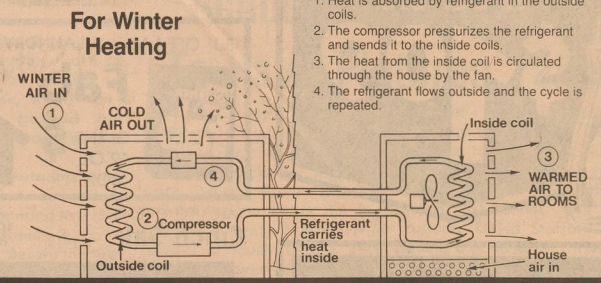
