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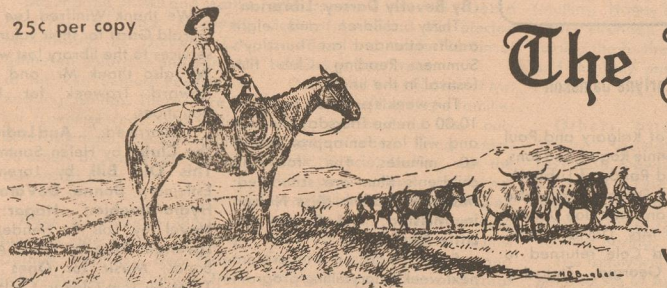

City To Buy Hospital Building

The hospital building in Matador will be sold Friday to the city of Matador for the total sum of one dollar, according to Gene Whitney of the HUD office in Lubbock.

Maurice L. Barksdale, assistant secretary of Housing and Urban Development from Washington D.C., will be in Matador at the courthouse at 1:30 p.m. to make the transaction official. He will present the necessary documents

to Mayor Gary Lancaster.

Also on hand will be I.L. "Smokey" Sanchez-Davis, regional administrator for HUD, and Congressman Jack Hightower, of the 13th Congressional District.

The transaction is being made to help in the disaster relief of the Motley County school system, so part of the building may be used as classrooms, should school officials choose to do so.

Equal Access Bill To Be Voted On

The Equal Access Bill is a bill to give public school pupils the same free-speech rights to talk about God and religion as they now have to talk about any other subject. Why should pupils be prohibited from talking about God and religion when they can discuss anything else on school property?

Specifically, the Equal Access bill would allow student-initiated prayer meetings and Bible studies to meet in public schools, just as other types of student clubs and organizations now do. The meetings would have to be completely voluntary, student initiated, and NOT sponsored by the school. Schools would be prohibited from discriminating against such meetings just because of the religious content of their speech.

The Equal Access Bill was brought up in the House several months ago under a Suspension of the Rules that required a 2/3rds vote. It narrowly failed. Then, it passed 88-11 in the Senate. The Senate bill went back to the House, and Speaker Tip O'Neill tried to bury it by sending it to a very liberal committee.

However, Congressman Carol Perkins has announced that he will bring up the Equal Access Bill in the House on Wednesday, July 25, using a procedure known as "Calendar Wednesday." This procedure has been used only once in the last 25 years. This amounts to a defiance of the Speaker O'Neill by a faithful Democrat who believes that something just must be done about the schools.

The Lubbock Eagle Forum urges everyone to contact all U.S. Congressmen immediately and ask them to vote for the BONKER-PERKINS EQUAL ACCESS BILL. This is one of the most important actions of the present Congress. It is urgent that you act immediately.

Legislature Completes Session Farabee Reports Reforms

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls reviewed changes made during the recent legislative special session called to consider education reforms and highway funding.

"The Legislature passed an education bill that will raise teacher salaries, help recapture the school day for academics and return accountability to the education system at all levels. The bill will strengthen the focus on primary education and will work to improve discipline in the classroom. The education reforms will be a positive and important change for the future of our children and will put Texas

in the forefront of public education reform," Farabee said.

State aid to Motley County will be increased by \$108,600 under the new bill. The total aid increase for the 30th District will be nearly \$30 million.

In other matters, highway funding was increased by \$433 million. A tax bill was passed that expanded the tax bases by including previously exempt items. It also raised taxes on tobacco and alcohol and increased the sales tax by one-eighth of a cent.

Finally, the Legislature passed a bill requiring that farm and

ranch laborers be covered by workers' compensation. The compromise bill included amendments by Senators Farabee and Sarpalius (D-Hereford) that exempt small family farms and ranches.

"I was pleased that we were able to complete the full agenda of the special session within thirty days. We had a productive session that will improve education and highways in Texas, and which cleared up a controversial court ruling on farm and ranch laborers while preserving the exemptions for small family farms and ranches," Farabee concluded.

Historical Marker Missing And Feared Stolen

The historical marker at the roadside park topping the caprock west of Matador on U.S. Highway 70, honoring Henry H. Campbell has been removed, supposedly by vandals.

The marker honoring the founder of the Matador Cattle Company, was erected about 17 years ago by the Texas Historical Society, and was mounted by local Texas Highway employees.

Discovery that the marker was missing from its pedestal, was

made several months ago by highway workers in that area. Although it is presumed that the theft might have been the work of passing travelers, "it might well be hanging on the wall of some area resident," one Highway Department employee said. "There are no clues as to who took it, or where it is now." The incident has been reported to the State Department of Highways and Transportation in Austin, he said.

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FARM & RANCH NEWS

Cotton Board Holds Meeting

A higher loan, an increased target price and more effective acreage control got major emphasis at a meeting July 11 in Lubbock when the 50-man Board of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. finalized its recommendations for the 1985 cotton program.

By law the base loan must be set by a formula which takes into consideration past domestic and world market prices, and PCG will urge Secretary of Agriculture John Block to "set the loan rate at the highest level permitted by law." Although all figures are not yet in, PCG calculations show the possibility of a loan between 57 and 57.5 cents per pound, which would be up from the 55-cent statutory minimum in effect for both 1983 and 1984.

The target price, used to determine the amount of each year's deficiency payment, for the 1984 crop is 81 cents per pound. The 1981 Farm Act mandated an increase to 86 cents in 1985, but Congress this year in the Budget Reconciliation Act "froze" the 1985 target at 81 cents.

However, authority remains in the law for the Secretary to raise the target price if he determines it necessary based on the increase in average cost of production. So PCG will ask that the 1985 target price be restored to the 86 cents that would have been in effect automatically without the freeze put on by Congress this year.

USDA figures received on the day of the PCG meeting project the August 1, 1985 cotton carryover at over 3.7 million bales, up 500,000 from the previous month's projection and about 800,000 bales above expected stocks on August 1, 1984. Under the Budget Reconciliation Act a 3.7 million-bale 1985 carryout would require USDA to announce a maximum 20 percent voluntary acreage reduction program and a paid diversion program (at the rate of 27.5 cents per pound) of at least five percent. Percentages would apply to the national base of approximately 15.6 million acres and participation in the combined program would be a prerequisite to eligibility for program benefits.

But the PCG Board doesn't think such a program would attract the broad participation necessary to prevent excess production and price-depressing supplies in 1985. The organization therefore is calling for a program which will offer producers a payment for idling 10 percent of acreage bases and requiring 15 percent additional diversion.

Recalling the problems experienced the past two years with regulations on the care and use of acreage taken out of crop production, the PCG group's comment to the Secretary also will include two recommendations in that regard. First, the Board voted to suggest that grazing of such acreage be permitted except during the six-month principal season as in the past, but that there be "allowances for (1) extended grazing and haying under unusual weather conditions and (2) haying of cover crops to be used exclusively for feeding of the producer's own livestock."

Second, PCG wants to see all regulations relating to the program's "acreage conservation reserve" come from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service instead of the Soil Conservation Service as was the case in 1984.

The originally announced signup dates for the 1984 cotton program were January 16 through February 24. The ending date was later extended to March 16, but PCG directors consider even that date too early for final decision-making. They are recommending that signup be required no more than 45 days prior to the final planting date established for each county.

Also on program signup, the Board agreed that requiring producers to sign binding contracts, as was done this year, increases program effectiveness, but will ask that "county ASCS committees be allowed to void contracts when there is a change of tenant and/or landlord after the signup date, or when initially planted crops are destroyed by an act of God and producers wish to plant an alternative program crop or crops.

In other action the Board approved a 1984-85 PCG budget of \$322,500, just over 1.5 percent above the \$317,250 budgeted for 1983-84.
