## Plight Of School Still In The Air

On the evening of May 1,
1984, a devastating tornado 1984, a devastating tornado ripped through the community of Matador, completely destroying the Motley County school building, auditorium, and gymnasium along with the new livestock-bus barn. The consolated school building housed all 252 school children in Motley County, grades kindergarten through high school.

school.

It is conservatively estimated that over two and a half million dollars will be needed to restore the district's facilities to the condition that existed before the disaster. The school received slightly more than one million dollars from the insurance coverage, leaving a balance of over one and a half million dollars needed.

Although 82 homes were damaged and destroyed along damaged and destroyed along with the Motley County I.S.D. school and facilities, Matador has not been declared a disaster area, so the community and school was unable to receive federal aid. The school applied for a State grant under section 16, of Public Law 81-815 and Section 7 of Public Law 81-874 which provide for pinpoint disasters such as the one that occured in our community.

However, there are no funds in the account. The school district is also faced with the problem of setting up temporary classrooms

setting up temporary classrooms for the fall but school officials are unable to take any action

The grant is currently on the desk of Terrell Bell, Secretary of Education in Washington, D.C. All Motley County Exes and other interested persons are being asked to write letters to John Tower, U.S. Senate, Washington D.C., 20510, Vice-President George Bush, U.S. Senate, same address, and President Ronald Reagan, 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., Washington D.C. 20510, asking them to encourage Secretary Bell to make available to Motley County the discretionary funds at his disposal. his disposal

his disposal.

The school received other damage and destruction that cannot be replaced by insurance funds. This includes damage to the football field, tennis courts and baseball park. It has been estimated that \$50,000 will be needed to restore these athletic facilities. The Motley County Booster Club and the Motley County Youth Organization is in the process of seeking donations from businesses and corpora-tions throughout Texas, along with exes donations, to help restore these athletic facilities. ## 1985 USDA Loan Rate Certain To Change From '84 Rate

In both 1983 and 1984 the U.S. Department of Agriculture was required by law to set the U.S. upland cotton loan rate for the base quality. Strict Low Middling 1-1/16th inch, cotton at the statutory minimum of 55 cents per pound.

But the situation is almost certain to be different for

1985.
The 1981 Farm Act requires that the base loan level for each year's crop be set at the lower of a "spot market calculation" or a "Northern European calculation." However if the Northern European calculation is below the spot market calculation, the Secretary of Agriculture has the authority to set the loan at the level indicated by the spot market figures or anywhere between the two. This assumes of course that exercising such authority will result in a loan at or above the prescribed 55-cent minimum.

The "spot market calculation" is described by law as

prescribed 55-cent minimum.

The "spot market calculation" is described by law as 85 percent of the average price quoted in U. S. spot markets for the base quality during the median three years of the five-year period ending July 31 of the year in which the loan is announced. The loan level for 1985 must be announced by November 1 of this year.

The "Northern European calculation" equals 90 percent of an adjusted 15-week average of price quotations for 1-3/32nds inch cotton, CIF Northern Europe.

Neither of the two calculations can be completed this year until later. The 15-week period to be used for European quotations doesn't begin until July 1, and

the 5-year spot market figures won't be complete until

There is however a good indication of how the latter There is however a good indication of now the latter calculation will look when finalized. Through March of this year, according to USDA, the weighted average of quotations for the median three of the past five years comes to 67.32 cents per pound. That figure times 85 percent, as required, equals 57.2 cents per pound.

So unless the numbers change, the Secretary will have authority to set the loan level for the base quality in 1985 at 57.2 cents, over two cents per pound above the statutory minimum. Moreover, should the adjusted

the statutory minimum. Moreover, should the adjusted Northern European quotes average above the spot market figure, as well may happen, the spot market figure becomes the minimum for the 1985 loan.

USDA in the June 6 Federal Register calls for comments on the 1985 loan level, what kind of and size acreage reduction program should be announced, if any, the target price and other 1985 program details. Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., began its deliberations on the 25-county cotton producer group's comments at a meeting of the Executive Committee June 14. PCG's program recommendations will

group's comments at a meeting of the Executive Committee June 14. PCG's program recommendations will be finalized by the full Board on July 11.

To be considered, comment must be submitted by August 6 to Dr. Howard C. Williams, Director, Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, DC 20013.
