## Snyder Woman Remembers Gunshot When She Was A Miracle Survivor

In October 1948 a tragedy struck the Coy Guthery family when their three-year-old girl was shot through the head, but the child survived the wound, and doctors across the country called it a miracle.

The girl, Gary Jacqueline (Guthery) Chaney, now married and living in Snyder, was holding to the slender thread of life in Stanley Clinic, partly because of her mother's faith that she would live.

The Gutherys lived in Dickens County, just south of the county line. The accident occurred Saturday October 23, 1948, at 2 p.m., while Mrs. Guthery (Peggie Durham Guthery) was busy with her housework. The little girl and her small brother were playing through the house.

Mrs. Guthery heard a gunshot and rushed through three rooms to find that the children had been playing with a .22 target gun believed to be unloaded and out of their reach. A .22 bullet had passed entirely through the child's head.

Grasping her child in her arms, Mrs. Guthery hurried outside to an automobile which required her pushing it to start the motor. She drove to the home of a neighbor, Mrs. W.H. Rigsby, who took the girl to the hospital.

Mrs. Guthery telephoned Dr. J. S. Stanley who began preparing for the arrival, then followed in her car.

It was believed the girl's death would be only a matter of hours.

Relatives attempted to console Mrs. Guthery the next day when it was believed the end was at hand for the gunshot victim.

"They said only a miracle could save her," Mrs. Guthery declared, "and I told them God would perform a miracle, if it was His will. I prayed for my little girl and He told me she would not die. I had faith."

Dr. Stanley gave the Gutherys little hope for the girl's recovery. "It would be a miracle if she survives," he told them. On the second day after the tragedy, Mrs. Guthery was approached by friends and relatives when it was believed the child was dying. "I was not afraid," she declared. "I had prayed most of the night."

The miracle was accomplished. Apparently normal, except for a slight paralysis in her right side, Jacqueline's recovery seemed certain. She was removed to the Scottish Rites Hospital in Dallas and later moved to the Dallas Baylor

Hospital for surgery.

The surgeon said that fortunately the rifle ball pierced the right lobe of the brain and did not disturb the functioning of her mind. It was necessary to remove pieces of shattered skull from the sensitive brain tissues, clean out the wound and repair the skull damage with plastics.

For a time she had paralysis of an arm and leg, but a week after surgery she regained 60 percent of the use of her limbs.

Now, 36 years later, Jacqueline Chaney enjoys all kinds of needle craft, cooking and gardening. She also enjoys helping the less fortunate.

She lived in Lubbock from 1949 until 1964. She married Fred Chaney in 1964 and they moved to Snyder.

"We still remember all the wonderful people who came to our aid in the time of our need," her mother said. "Joe Campbell, we remember you gave your blood for Jacqueline to live."

## Volunteers Move The Library

Despite threatening skies and intermittent rain, a host of volunteers loaded up Gale Stafford's covered 18-wheeler with books, furniture and equipment to move the Motley County Library to its new location, the American Legion Building in downtown Matador.

In a show of community spirit, young children, teenagers, housewives, teachers, preachers, senior citizens, farmers, and cowboys put their shoulder to the wheel. The complicated move was completed on the first day, with much of the books and shelving in place by the second day.

A real morale booster for the volunteers was the transformation of the children's room, which was previously a storeroom for hospital equipment the Legion loaned out, into a cheery, inviting place for the children to read. Mr. and Mrs. Buzz Thacker receive much of the credit for this transformation with their donation of an attractive kitchen carpet. Jeff Thacker, assisted by Pam, donated his time in laying the floorcovering. Pam and Donna Hoyle, with their paint brushes added their decorative touch to the room.

To see the children help with this move was a heart-warming sight. Some of these young volunteers swept, mopped,

and toted book boxes and shelving until ready to drop. Their pride in their library was apparent as they stood back and surveyed their work.

Some wiring and lighting must be added, and when funds permit, partitions will be erected between the school cafeteria area and the library area. The airconditioner must be mounted (and perhaps one more secured), open space heaters must be replaced by vented wall units, and perhaps a wall repaired where a window is loosely mounted. This remodeling is being done entirely by donations; the people's help in accomplishing these goals is most appreciated.

The Motley County Library Board thanks all of those people who helped in any way, whether by lifting or donating, by painting or mopping, or by smiling and encouraging.

A special thanks to the librarian and her husband, Beverly and Robin Darsey, the library aid and her husband, Joan and Keith Patton, and the youth worker, Carlene Lockett. Without their untiring efforts, none of this could have been accomplished.

The American Legion members are to be commended for their continuing service to their community in letting the library use their building. The

## Opinions On Three Issues

Dear Friends,

The Matador Tribune for August 9, 1984 is worth the price of a year's subscription. First is the heart-warming news that the Library has been offered a home. It is gratifying to see that some folks still "put their money where their mouth is." A recent issue notifying us that Stanley Hospital had been bought for \$1.00 wasn't too exciting, because some of us remember when our loved doctor offered to give it to us.

The LIBRARY is the most valuable thing in Motley County at the present time. The librarian is also valuable. I remember a time when her great grandfather stood outside the lot fence on his wooden leg and watched me bridle a huge red mule. It was necessary to persuade the mule to stand in the corner while I climbed the board fence with the bridle in order to get it over his ears. I used a slat from the fence as a persuader. A huge grin spread over "Uncle Britt's" face and he remarked, "By Jesus! She can bridle a mule as good as a man can!" I never forgot that compliment.

As I remember, bridling the mule was easier than learning to "boot" the Apple Ile on which I am writing this letter, but once in gear, errors are easier corrected. So here I stand in ovation to those brave souls who signed names to three great messages of wisdom in this week's issue of the Tribune, and to those citizens who took time

and interest enough in their homeland to appear and plead for those things that matter.

I am a Believer. You know, one of those people who believe in a Creator, and a Master Plan that is still in operation. I stood and looked at the devastation in South Matador, and wondered, "An act of God? WHY the entire school plant and leave the library?"

Have you ever read of a "runcible spoon?" My granddaughter who will be six tomorrow listened with interest to Aesop's Fables at the age of three months. Only three at a time, and granted she only enjoyed watching the reader's facial expressions, but she grew up with a love for her books and the habit of hearing a story read every night before going to sleep. Now, her expanding mind wants to know what is a runcible spoon.

You should have seen the expression of accomplishment and wonder on her face when her mother showed her that she had only to go to the library and do enough research and she could find the answer to any question and most problems. Now, she can tell you what is a runcible spoon, but you go and find out for yourself and experience the joy of adding to your knowledge through research. It is the pleasure of your librarian to anticipate the peculiar needs of her community and provide for you the answers to your needs, and it is the duty

of the community to provide funds and a place to house this collection.

In response to Mrs. Bearden, I would like to cite an article in TEXAS MONTHLY for August, 1984 - the story of Bobby Morrow who "was America's most celebrated Olympic athlete in 1956. Today he wishes he'd never left the starting blocks." I know the value of "play" in school, but I regret that Matador has a reputation for "teaching football and playing school." This is not funny; it is a tragedy. I applaud your efforts to get back into the business of providing recreation for your children, but does it necessarily have to be part of the educational plant? Texas is now in the throes of placating an unhappy citizenry by appropriating money to improve the school system, when there is actually no plan for improvement.

Also in TEXAS MONTHLY for August, page 104, is a "Letter from the Petroplex," the story of Midland and Odessa. I quote from the second column on page 106. "The hot issue in Midland that year was whether the city should seek more Federal funds. (Mayor) Akins' view prevailed ("We see absolutely no reason why citizens in Newark, New Jersey, should be helping finance our sewer plant")." Along with Charlie Long, I "consider it a total waste for such facilities (as the Roaring Springs school plant) to remain unoccupied when there is such

dire need by so many within such a small area."

The independent enterprising pioneer spirit of our forebears is being abandoned. The return to sack lunches, and not putting a small child on a bus to go miles from home to school would be a wonderful thing to see. While I am on the subject, I would like to propose that one improvement in our educational system would be to require at least one parent to ride every bus to or from school. And I know that one parent should sit in every classroom every day. It is gratifying to a teacher to see a letter so carefully researched and impartially worded as Charlie's. I would like to see this debated from the other side, if indeed there is any other side. Thanks, Charlie, for expressing the views so well of so many. I am not a resident, but I am a taxpayer and a Texan.

I must also agree with Ava Crump's position. We need to be honest with ourselves and with each other. I remember when Jinx Wilson and I used to discuss the merits of the "Playhouse." We used to have to clear the premises occasionally before the neighbors were up and about, but we agreed that was preferable to having our children on the road or somewhere in a pasture doing their drinking. We may not live long enough to know whether we were right, certainly he won't, but at least we thought the situation out and did the best we could. The kids knew we loved them and wanted them around. We were not ashamed for them to know us; are you?

No telling how long this letter is, the monitor scrolls, but I know I have said enough, with the exception of expressing inadequately the pleasure that having a Pulitzer prize winner, a hospital administrator, a prospective aerospace engineer, and all the other things we can be proud of about our hometown. See you at Old Settlers!

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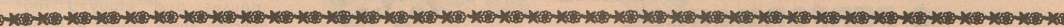

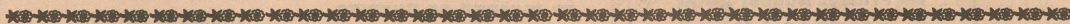

A 1957 graduate of Texas Tech University, Jones joined Conoco, Inc. in 1960 and, except

for a three year period spent in Albuquerque, has been with the company in the South Plains area ever since.

After joining the Littlefield Lions Club in 1964, Jones served three terms as treasurer, then was a 100% president in 1968-69. He has also served District 2-T2 in such capacities as Zone Chairman (72-73), Deputy District Governor (73-74, 74-75), DDG At-Large (75-76, 78-79), Director of District 2-T2 Lions Eye Bank (74-75), Crippled Childrens Camp Director (76-78) and Lt. Gov. (83-84). He has received four Club Presidents Appreciation Awards, a Club Extension Award, Key Member Award, and an International President's Certificate of Appreciation.

Jones and the former Jane Ann Whitfield were married in 1956. The couple has two children: Diane Jones Shank of Dallas and Alan, a sophomore at Texas Tech.

Jones has served the Littlefield community in various capacities also, including Quarterback Club, Chamber of Commerce and Methodist Men, holding many positions at the First United Methodist Church. He was named Littlefield's Man of the Year in 1979.

## Matador still seeking aid following twister

AUSTIN — If an appeal from Gov. Mark White fails to win reconsideration of a federal ruling denying designation of Motley County as a major disaster area, only the state will be able to help the area's tornado-stricken school.

Jim Nelson, deputy executive assistant to the governor, said Wednesday that if the appeal is denied, "that's it, in terms of federal aid."

The Motley County School was destroyed by a tornado May 1 and replacement costs have been estimated at between \$2 million and \$3 million. The building was insured for less than \$1 million.

The county is trying to get assistance to replace the school. Classes for the 1984-85 school year will be held in makeshift facilities in Matador because schools in surrounding districts are at least 30 miles away.

Motley County Judge Billy Whitaker asked White to appeal to the Federal Emergency Management Agency after being notified that Motley County would not be declared a major disaster area.

The first request for emergency funding was sent by the governor's office of emergency management to the U.S. Department of Education,

Reagan, FEMA, and the Secretary of Education Terence Bell. Please urge each of these people to reconsider their stance on our request for federal aid. The more pressure that can be put on these officials, the better chance we will have of receiving federal money. We must not let them forget about our disaster.

## County Agent's Corner

The results of the Bollworm moth trap catches have been completed and the entomologists are predicting the next increase in egg laying to begin around August 20. The trap in Motley County is kept by Clois Shorter in the Flomot area. Traps in other parts of the district are showing very similar results. The egg and worm counts have been

low in most fields for the past 2 weeks, but it looks like we are not through with them yet. Fields should be thoroughly checked twice a week to determine if spraying will be needed. For more information contact the Extension office.

Wheat producers that grow wheat mainly for grazing should be interested in some research work being done at Chillicothe. The research has been done

from 79-84 to determine the better forage producing varieties. The top four in order are: Lancota- averaged 6703 Lbs. per acre, Improved Triumph- 6678 Lbs. per acre,

Rall- 6551 Lbs. per acre, Tam 105- 6490 Lbs. per acre. Tam 105 was the highest of these in grain produced and Lancota was second by around 5 bushel difference.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO DICKENS-MOTLEY COUNTIES OLD SETTLERS REUNION

##### Present - Article VIII - Officers

Section 4. The President, Vice-President and Secretary shall be elected for a four year tenure, not to exceed two consecutive terms, or eight years.

##### Proposed Amendments: Article VIII
