## WTU Utility Rates Lower Than State Average

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 kWh in September 1983 and 701 kWh in October 1983.

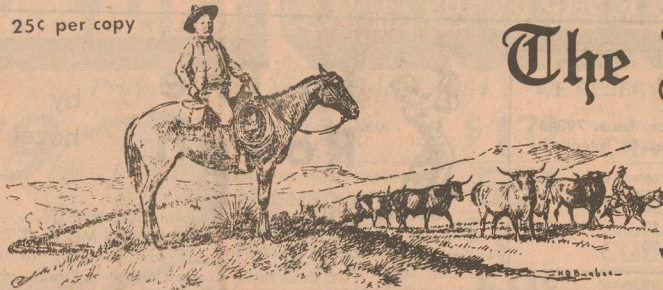
The survey included 19

utilities, among which were 10 investor-owned companies.

Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 kWh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 kWh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

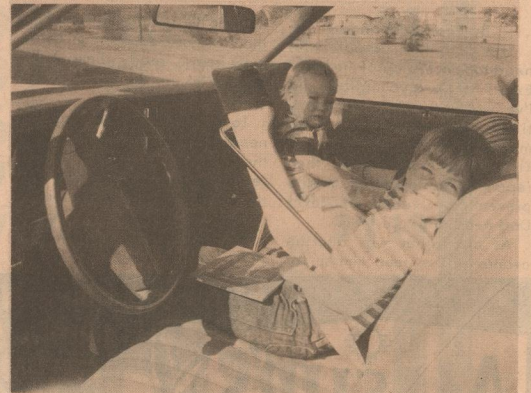
## CPR Course Scheduled For November 5th & 6th

registered 27 students.

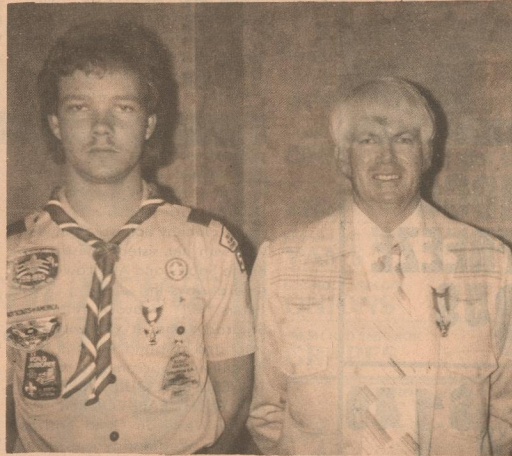
Kindergarten will begin the first week in January. Pupils and parents were informed that a specific location for the Kindergarten class has not been decided upon, although several alternatives are being considered.

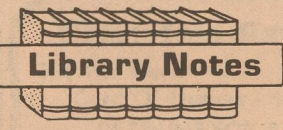

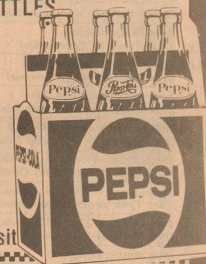

## County Agent's Corner

### By Ray Minkley DESICCATING COTTON MAY DESICCATING COTTON MAY PAY

The drought has contributed to much premature opening of cotton bolls. This means that much cotton will be ready for harvest long before our normal freeze date. Producers may wish to preserve both cotton quality and yield by desiccating the crop to allow early stripper harvesting.

"Once unharvested cotton is mature, the longer it stays in the field, the lower the yield and grade." In a drought year such as 1984, many of the varieties lose much of their stormproof characteristics. On some fields, bolls are already beginning to exhibit a loss of stormproofness.

Extension and research studies at Lubbock, conducted in recent years, indicate that once cotton is open, with exposure to the weather, a 9% loss in lint weight is experienced after four weeks, and a one grade quality reduction occurs after five weeks, even without severe adverse weather conditions.

The decision of whether or not to desiccate must be based on economics. Will it pay? To

answer this, costs of desiccation must be weighed against probable yield and grade differences. The most commonly used desiccants in the Rolling Plains are Arsenic Acid, Paraquat and Gramoxone R. At the recommended rates of application of each of these, total costs of application should be from \$7.50 - \$9.00 per acre. At present cotton prices, a savings of approximately 15 pounds of lint per acre would be required to pay for the operation.

Desiccants such as Arsenic Acid, Paraquat and Gramoxone kill tissue and stop all growth and development of the plant. This means that desiccation should be delayed until bolls are mature. Arsenic Acid may be applied when 75-80% of the bolls are open. Paraquat and Gramoxone are labeled for use after 85% of the bolls are open. Desiccated plants can usually be stripped and moduled or ginned 7 to 10 days following application.

Be sure to follow all label instructions and precautions. These materials can be hazardous if not used properly.

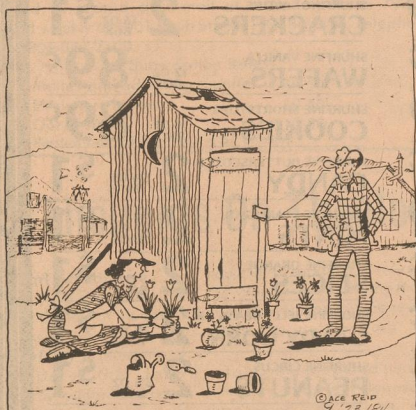
