40th Scout Charter Renewed by Lions

SCOUTING started in America 61 years ago and it came to Matador 40 years ago under the sponsorship of the Matador Lions Club. Tuesday, at the regular luncheon meeting of the civic club, the 40th charter was presented to Scoutmaster Freddie Welling.

The presentation was made by Warren Green of Lubbock, program director of the South Plains Council of the Boy Scouts of America. He said, "Matador has had a Scouting program for 40 years because Lions care about what happens to boys... Scouts are taught duty to God, to country and to themselves..."

The Scouting program was one of the first projects of the Matador Lions. The Matador club was chartered in 1929. The Scout project started in 1930 with Rev. Joe E. Boyd, then pastor of the First Methodist Church as the first Scoutmaster. In July 1930, the club contributed \$300 to Scout work. County Judge Forrest Campbell was a member of the first Boy Scout troop here.

In the Tuesday meeting Miss Charla Wason, newly elected Lions Queen, gave a report of activities of girls participating at the Berger district convention and expressed her appreciation to the club for the gift of luggage received at the previous meeting.

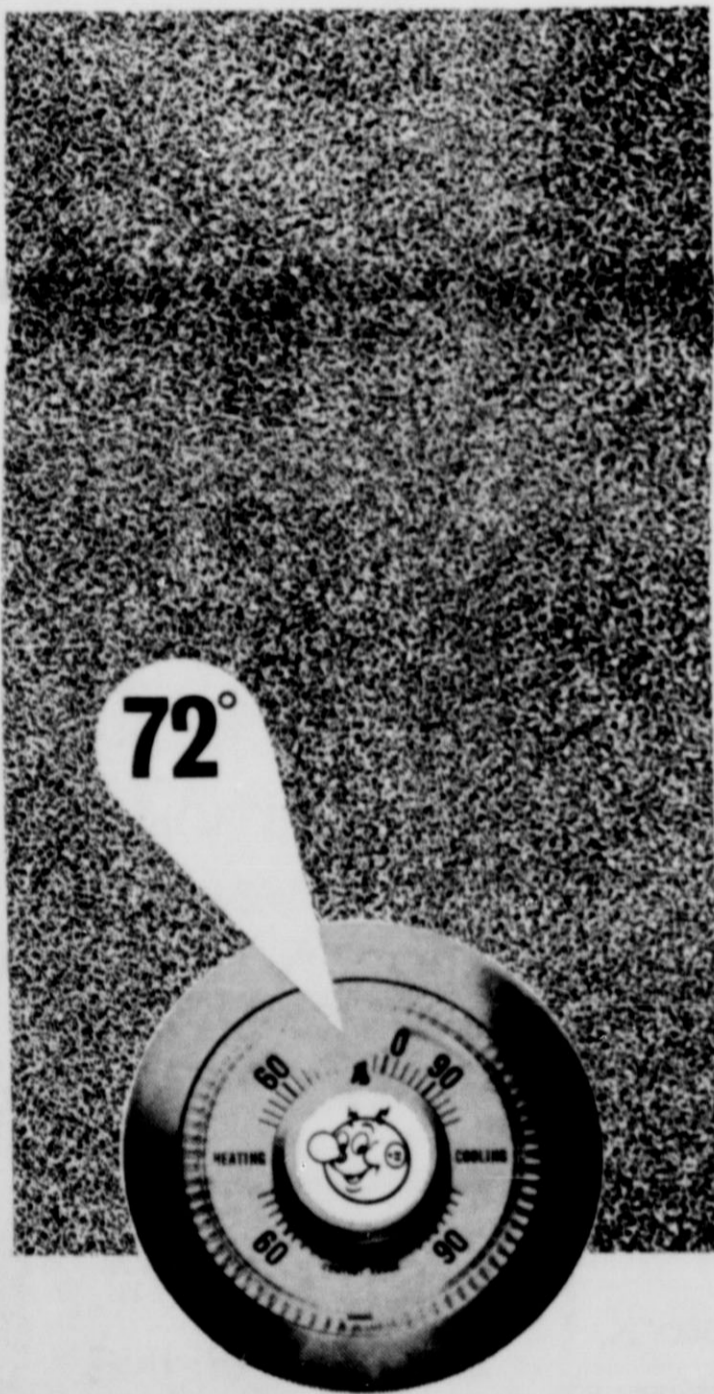

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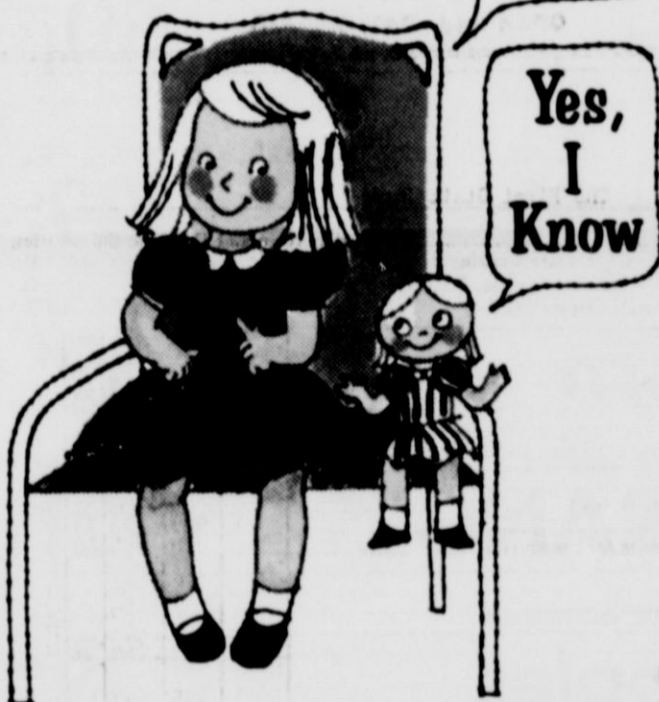

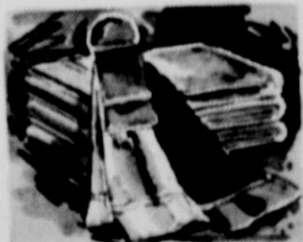

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From A to Izzard We Had Our Own Rally Saturday

Another Monday morning — and another cheerful thought to start things off:

While a mass of slogan-chanting peace protesters strolled through springtime Washington Saturday, 15,000 or so visiting young people thronged Amarillo, bent on business more constructive than that of the one-note crowd along the Potomac. Our visitors were high school musicians, Boy and Girl Scouts, and spelling bee champions. And there was not a revolutionary gesture in a busload.

We were pleased to observe that even David Brinkley, along with other TV network newsmen, treated the Washington invasion with commendable calm and objectivity. Brinkley even noted openly that the "same old faces" were evident in the mob — the same faces, we presume, that show up at one peace rally after another, as long as the chartered buses keep running, and somebody is willing to pay for them.

The demonstration was peaceable. The NPAC and the PCPJ (the National Peace Action Coalition and the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice) planned it that way — and they plan two more weeks of varied demonstrations.

The piece de resistance is programmed for May 5. This will be an "encirclement" of the Capitol to compel Congress to ratify a document called the People's Peace Treaty, something negotiated by a group of radical young Americans with some third-level Hanoi officials, and which is simply a fresh blueprint of the old worn-out North Vietnam demands.

The whole thing has been meticulously arranged — beginning with the cautious and effective use of conscientious objectors who served in Vietnam as the spearhead.

In fact, the planning has been going on for months.

Who says so? One source of the information is Rep. Richard Ichord, Democratic congressman from Missouri and chairman of the House Committee on Internal Security. He told Congress that the NPAC and the PCPJ are the prime movers behind the rally, and that both "are known to be operating under substantial Communist influence."

As for the PCPJ, which the congressman says was organized last June in Milwaukee as an offshoot of the New Mobe, the Ichord report continues:

"Among the top leadership of the PCPJ are such well-known Communist party functionaries as Gilbert Green and Jarvis Tyner, members of the Communist Party's national committee."

In other words, what appears to be spontaneous and appealing on the tube may have been planned that way for dark and devious reasons. Hanoi knows what's going on, and approves.

But getting back to our cheerful Monday morning thought:

When busloads of young people invade the Golden Spread we can count on nothing more formidable than a band contest or a high school track meet.

For this we should be grateful.

Where in the world is there less revolutionary upheaval and more normal living than right here? Let's keep it that way.
