

## New Rates Become Effective For Local WTU Customers

New rates for West Texas Utilities Co. customers became effective Friday, November 16, by order of the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The Commission earlier had approved a settlement agreement reached by WTU, the intervening cities and the PUC staff. The agreement gives WTU an annual base rate increase of about \$12.4 million and a fuel charge decrease of about \$13.3 million. This would result in a net decrease in revenue for WTU, to allow for an expected decline cost of boiler fuel during the coming year.

The new rates, which include a winter-summer differential, will raise average residential rates by about 4.2 per cent. The rates will be slightly lower than current rates during the November-April period, but higher during the rest of the year. This feature was insisted upon by the PUC staff to encourage conservation during the peak usage months.

Bills for all electric meter readings recorded after Friday will reflect the new rates, according to Holman King, WTU vice president and director of corporate relations.

### Profitable Farming

Like riddles? Try this one. Who is always ahead and always behind at the same time?

A good answer would be the plant breeder. Always behind. Yet always ahead too, or at least trying to be.

Take the "always behind" first. The plant breeder, in developing better varieties, is always behind in one respect because he is always in a contest with Mother Nature. We are admonished, "Don't fool Mother Nature," but nevertheless we spend a good deal of time trying to do just that. At least we go to great lengths to interfere with Mother Nature's plant diseases and insects. Trouble is, winning isn't easy and Mother Nature keeps getting the upper hand.

Consider the greenbug. The greenbug comes on strong, and we get busy and develop a new insecticide to control the pest. But then the greenbug mutates, changes bio-types, and comes on strong again. We can't develop a cure until we first have the problem. It is a never-ending battle and in a sense we are always behind. The plant breeder is behind in the development of new varieties in another sense. There is an increasing economic link to agronomic research. Economic conditions are changing, producers are reacting to those changes, and they are demanding varieties with new and different characteristics.

The high cost of energy connected with drying grain is a good example. Producers now want shorter season hybrids, ones that mature in fewer days and that are drier at

harvest. But they still want yield. There is an urgent research and testing push to develop hybrids with these characteristics. When important changes affect the farmer, it is up to research to try and meet his changed needs.

There is, of course, an "always ahead" side too. There is a constant effort to anticipate future changes and demands, and to have something well along in development that can be brought on quickly to meet new needs. Some trends can be anticipated. Others can't be.

Research and development, and the plant breeder, is ahead also in the sense that intensive monitoring and broad-scale testing goes on all the time to screen all new genetic material for known plant threats (insects and diseases) as well as the "fringe" or exotic threats that never have been major in importance but which conceivably could be.

A good place to check up on all this is the test plot. Thousands and thousands of test plots are placed strategically in fields in major producing states. Even if you miss the scheduled field day, the plots are still there for public inspection and observation. New varieties with new characteristics can be seen side by side in comparison to one another and to established performers.

The opportunity is there to see and compare. A smart move is to select a couple of promising newcomers and try them on your own farm next year. This will help you be ahead.
