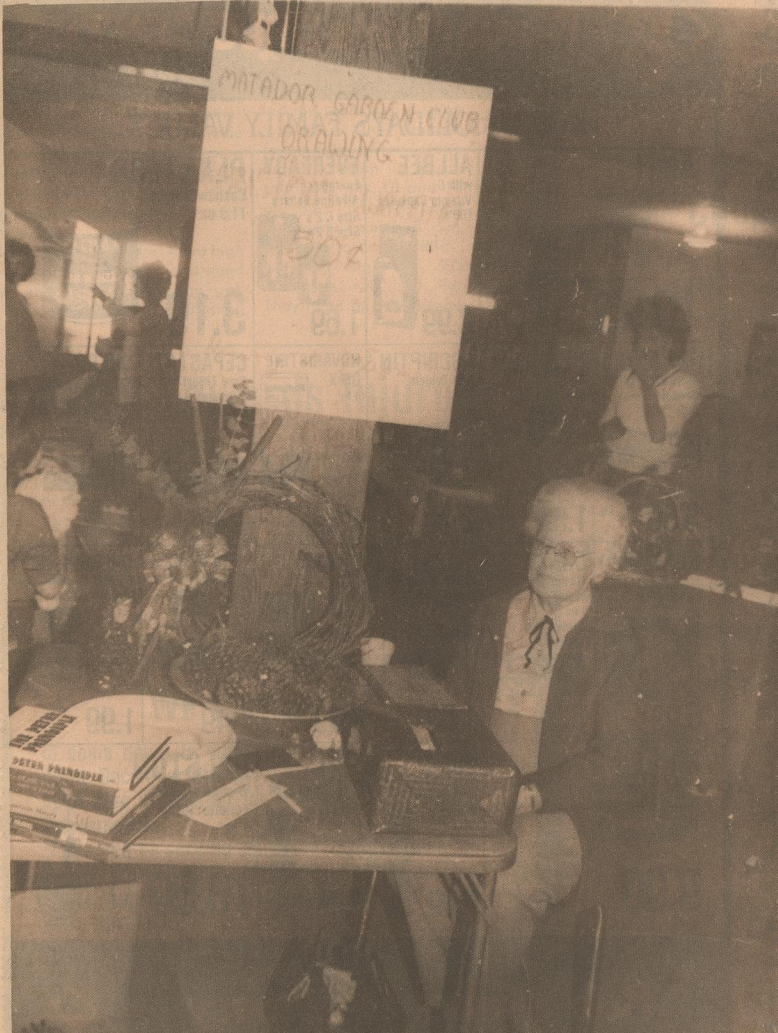

Local Funeral Home Sells To Ward-Mynatt

Pat and Ann Seigler have announced that they have sold their funeral homes in Matador and Paducah to Roy L. Ward and Dee Mynatt. The transaction became effective December 1.

Ward is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Roy L. Ward and Company, Inc., a company which owns and operates several funeral homes in West Texas. Ward, for the past eight years, was President of Resthaven of Lubbock, Inc., a funeral home and cemetery company in Lubbock.

Dee Mynatt is a native of Dangerfield, Texas, and has been associated with Ward in the funeral home in Olton. He has been a resident of Olton for the past nine years, and has

been active in civic and community affairs, including the Lions Club, Olton Volunteer Fire Department, and the First Methodist Church. He and his wife, Michelle, have two daughters, Michelle and Kristie.

The Seiglers purchased the Matador funeral home from Bill Seale and Lewis Eudy in June 1963. The Paducah facility was bought from the J.E. Norris family in 1978.

The facility will be operated as Seigler-Mynatt Funeral Home for the present time, with Dee Mynatt supervising both locations. Other personell will be

added in the near future.

Ward will be at the business on a regular basis, while overseeing the company's other locations and interests. The new owners stressed that their primary emphasis will be to continue the tradition of quality service to the residents of Motley and Cottle Counties.

Seigler has stated that he will remain to assist the new owners for the present time, to help them become acquainted with the residents of Motley County and with local funeral customs. His future plans are undecided at this time.

The library collection now has 7133 cataloged books, 750 books to be cataloged, 2000 uncataloged paperbacks, and 57 computer programs.

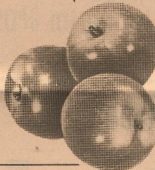

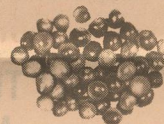

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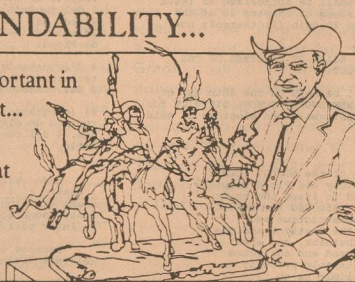

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Crop growing seasons, year after year, are a lot like snowflakes. No two are alike.

This year has been a much different year than last year, a better year taking the U.S. as a whole, although there still have been problems in some areas.

Comparing this year to last year, most people would say that 1984 has been a more normal year. This brings up a good point. What is a normal year?

Sometimes we consider a normal year the kind of year we'd like to see. Sometimes we consider a normal year a year that has no problems or crop stresses. And often we say normal year when we really mean average year.

If you lay on the table ten completely different ears of corn, or heads of wheat or heads of sorghum, which one is normal? If you average the characteristics of the ten, the result is unlike any individual.

That's the way it is with crop seasons. There nearly always is something that stresses the crop in the way of disease, insects or climate.

An absence of problems and stress really would not be normal at all. It would be most abnormal. A corn hybrid, sorghum hybrid or wheat hybrid bred and developed to be super under optimum weather conditions and an absence of disease and insects would not perform well at all in most years.

Ask agronomists and crop spec-

ialists what a normal year is and you likely will get one or the other of three answers:

- (1) I've never seen one;
- (2) There is no such thing; or
- (3) It depends on where you're from.

Rather than normal conditions, it is better to talk in terms of average conditions, the moisture and temperatures and the level of disease and insect pressures that prevail most of the time. That's what a normal year really is, not perfect weather and an absence of problems.

It is important to get this point squared away because as this year's good crops move to maturity and are harvested there will be evaluations of hybrid performance and decisions made about what to plant and test next year.

We all tend to react to what affected us most, and most recently. And we compensate for that. But maybe this latest thing we are reacting to is very abnormal, not at all average and not likely to be repeated.

A good motto is: "Don't select next year's variety to cure this year's problem."

Not unless that problem is a recurring one on your farm or in your area.

When evaluating harvest results and planning for next year, it is better to select from hybrids that have a history of doing better most of the time under average (normal?) conditions.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the MOTLEY COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT has determined that an election should be held to ascertain whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said District under the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Texas Education Code, including Section 20.04(b)(1) thereof; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE MOTLEY COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That an election shall be held on the 20th day of December, 1984, in the MOTLEY COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors of said District the following proposition:

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the MOTLEY COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT in Motley and Floyd Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of \$550,000 for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or interest to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY(40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates (not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law at the time of issuance of the bonds) as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECCION 4: A todos los residentes con derecho de votar del Distrito se les permitirá votar en dicha elección y durante el día de elección, dichos electores votarán en el lugar para votar nombrado para el recinto electoral del Distrito Escolar en donde tienen su domicilio. Diricksons Tour Greek Islands

Mr. and Mrs. L.H. Dirickson returned recently from a 15 day cruise of the Greek Islands and visits to Greece, Turkey and Egypt.

The trip was sponsored by Republic Bank Leading Ladies, of which Mrs. Dirickson is a member, ably assisted by the very eminent Dr. Dudley Strun, ex-pastor of Broadway's First Christian Church for over 20 years, and Rita Wallace, assistant vice-president of Republic Bank, as our couriers. They were 36 in the tour.

We left Lubbock on Wednesday morning, arriving in New York's J.F.K. Airport that night, then the flight to Athens. After arriving in Athens the next day at 11:00 a.m. there was a drive through the city on the way to Pireaus to board the ship, World Renaissance, for a "Golden Fleece" cruise of the Greek Islands and Turkey.

The ship is equipped with ballroom and dining room, each seating 500 passengers, theatre, library, two heated swimming pools, two bars, Finnish sauna, chapel and lounge grill.

The third day we arrived at Santorini. This was the old island of Thera, buried 3500 years ago in volcanic ash, now the "black pearl of the cyclades" due to the black volcanic soil. On top of the cliffs is the gleaming white city, very steep, with elevators (recently installed) or a mule ride to reach the top.

The next island is Crete. In Greek mythology, this is the birthplace of Zeus. It is regarded by scholars as the birthplace of all western civilization. The chief town is Heraklion, the center of Minoan civilization which came into being around 3000 B.C.

The fourth day we arrived in Rhodes, known as the "Island of Reses" by the ancient Greeks. This was the high point of our travels in the islands from the standpoint of beauty. It is the largest of the Dodecanese Islands, dominated by the Colossus of Rhodes, one of the Seven Wonders of the old world.

The Colossus was a 100 foot statue of the sun god Helios in bronze. It was destroyed by an earthquake.

Patmos was our next island. Spiritually, it is dominated by biblical associations; visually it is dominated by the famous Monastery of St. John on its hilltop, overlooking a landscape of stark beauty. We went to the Gratte of the Apocalypse in which St. John was exiled, and where he wrote the Book of Revelations - an unforgettable experience.

Later on the same day we arrived at Kusadasi, Turkey, where we went by bus to the old city of Ephesus. According to legend Ephesus was built by the Amazons in the second millennium B.C. and was later seized by the Ionians, who built the great temple of Artemis, another of the Seven Wonders of the ancient world. Of course Ephesus is of particular interest to Christians as a spot where Paul lived and preached for three years, where John was imprisoned before his exile, and where Mary, the mother of Jesus lived. Ephesus has been dug up and rebuilt three times.

Days six and seven, we were at sea for a good while, crossing the Bosphorus, then arriving at Istanbul which is the old city of Constantinople, famous for the Church of St. Sophia and the Blue Mosque, with its six Minarets. The Grand Bazaar in Istanbul is the world's most famous shopping center. Did we ever shop!

Our last Greek Island to visit was Mykonos, sometimes called the "Capri of the Aegean". It has 360 white chapels and windmills. Rough water all night and next day kept us from going ashore. We then returned to Pireaus, Oisembard and began a sightseeing tour of Athens where crowning glory is the Parthenon on the Acropolis.

Our hotel was the new Astr Palace located downtown on Constitution Square. On this our last night in Athens, Wayne Finnell, Republic Bank executive

and wife Emily gave a cocktail party. After that the group visited a tavern to get a good look at night life in Greece.

It is evening now and our flight on Olympic Air takes us directly to the Meridian Hotel, to city's finest, located right on the famous Nile River. Morning comes and we fly to Memphis and Sakara, where much of Egypt's culture had its beginnings. The step Pyramid here (in Sakara) is the oldest man made monument in existence today. We see an old statue of Ramses lying flat - it looks longer than a tennis court. Memphis was one time a capital of Egypt.

The next day we flew air Sinai to Luxor and into the Valley of the Kings. Luxor was one time completely submerged in mud and sand and in 1883 it was unearthed by Mospero, which was begun by Amenophis III, continued by King Tut, and Ramses and Alexander the Great - all contributed with statues, pylons, obelisks, temples and inscriptions (really hieroglyphics) on the walls. Here we saw the fine avenue of the Sphinx (40 or 50) entering Karnak Temple.

That night we witnessed the

sound and light program - an unimaginable experience. After crossing the Nile we went down in the Valley of the Kings, and into the tomb of Ramses and King Tut as well as visiting the Temple of Hatshepsut, the bearded female pharaoh.

Day 13 and an hour flight, we were back in Cairo to do our sightseeing and an excursion to the Pyramids (many of them) and the Sphinx. The Great Pyramid was built by a pharaoh named Khufu, whom the Greeks called Cheops, about 2900 B.C. One Greek historian related it took 200,000 slaves 30 consecutive years to complete this gigantic pyramid, the base covering 13 acres. Nearby is the Sphinx with a human head and a lion's body.

Next stop was the Egyptian Museum where everything found in King Tut's tomb is on exhibit. The Citadel built in 1175 and the Masque of Mohamed Aly were viewed.

Several birthday parties were celebrated during the two weeks. The last one in Cairo was Gene Alderson of Alderson Cadillac in Lubbock.

Day 15, we left Cairo on Egypt Air at 9:45 and were in Matador at 1:00 a.m. the next day.

Green Thumb Committee Meets

More than 50 representatives from government, agriculture, and social service organizations participated recently in an all-day tour of project sites that utilize workers from the Green Thumb senior employment program.

Sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, Green Thumb employs more than 1,000 rural, low-income persons aged 55 and older, in 109 counties across the state. The senior workers are placed with non-profit

organizations such as libraries, schools, senior centers, and municipalities to provide services that might not otherwise be available.

Projects toured included stops in Elgin at the Adult Day Health Services Center; Doak Springs Senior Center, Fayette County Fairgrounds, LaGrange; and the Combined Community Action Program in Smithville. Each of these organizations utilize the abilities of Green Thumb workers

to assist in providing needed services for their rural communities.

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller, told the group that in talking with Green Thumbs across the state, "I have come to realize how much the opportunity to work means to them." He further commented that "the jobs this program provides are important not only as a source of additional income, but even more importantly as a source of self-esteem and

personal fulfillment."

Special guests on this year's tour were Walter Tibbetts, representing Governor Mark White; Sam Gorena, representing Lt. Governor Bill Hobby; Richard Raymond, representing U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen; Quinten Woomer, Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture; Dan Stewart, Texas Dept. on Aging; and Bob Girard, Director, Senior Texans Employment Program.
