

Shop At Home Contest Launched By Merchants

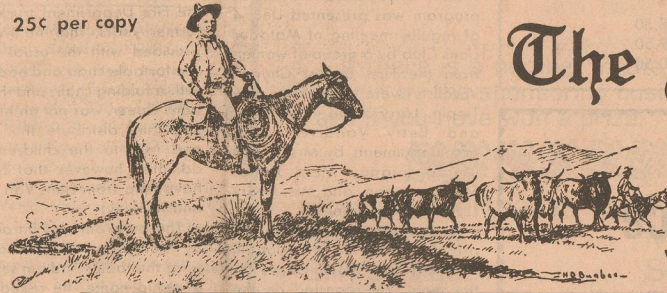
Local merchants have launched a new "shop at home" contest this week and Tribune readers may win prizes if they hold the lucky Santa Numbers.

Matador Tornado Rated Among Worst Of May

The tornado that ripped through Matador in May was one of the nine most devastating storms of that month, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

In a recently issued report, the NOAA states that the storm registered an F3 on the Fujita Tornado Scale. An F3 twister is a severe tornado packing winds of 158 to 206 mph and causing heavy damage, according to the report. Only nine tornadoes reported that month were listed as F3 or worse.

The tornado proved to be more massive than at first believed. The report states the twister was 440 yards wide and traveled along a path eight miles long.

The report also confirms earlier beliefs that early warning provided by the National Weather Service radar and storm spotters saved lives when the tornado hit Matador May 1.

"Due to excellent warnings, no one was killed and only one person was injured," says the report which deals with the tornado and other severe weather phenomena in the United States.

Professor T. Theodore Fujita of the University of Chicago, who developed the scale, said F3 tornadoes usually tear off roofs, destroy some walls of well-constructed homes and have the ability to uproot large trees and lift heavy cars.

Several homes in Matador

were destroyed, many roofs were ripped off and school buses were picked up and overturned. One of the largest structures in the city, the Motley County School, was completely destroyed.

According to the report, the system that spawned the tornado had a long and single life. It developed in northern Hale County and made a wide arc moving through Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, and Motley Counties and then through Cottle, King, Knox and Haskell Counties. During much of its life span it moved at right angles to the upper wind flow.

Hail also was associated with the storm.

Between 7:30 and 8 p.m., large hail was reported eight miles south of Silverton in Briscoe County and also in Floyd County. The same storm produced severe winds to near 60 mph and golfball-sized hail in Dumont in King County at 9:50 p.m. CDT.

The tornado, nestled within the "super-thunderstorm," developed at 8:20 p.m. CDT as the storm crossed the Floyd-Motley County line. The National Weather Services began tracking the twister at that point and followed it throughout its life.

"The satellite pictures showed rather well the tornado signature," the report states.

The first visual sighting of the tornado — five miles northwest of the city — was made at 8:44 p.m. CDT by Matador Fire

Department storm spotters.

During the next eight minutes, residents of the city were warned, and most had enough time to either go to a shelter at the Motley County Courthouse or seek protection in a private shelter. Fifteen residents sought shelter in the basement of the Motley County School.

The report states the tornado struck the city at 8:52 p.m. CDT.

The tornado hit Motley County

School and then made a loop through a residential area before striking the school again. Then it moved into an open field about a mile south of the city where it dissipated. The storm continued to move southeast.

The report says 27 homes were destroyed and 55 were damaged as the tornado moved through the city. Damage estimates were set at \$2.5 to \$3 million.

Cities Receive Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$57.4 million in local tax payments to the 997 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"The border region economy is looking better than it has in three years. Local sales tax collections in the border area are up 13.2 percent in 1984 compared to last year, and we're hoping this improvement will continue," Bullock said. This month's checks are the

first to reflect receipts from taxes on new goods and services collected for the first time beginning Oct. 2, Bullock said.

Matador received \$1,139.84 this period, bringing the total payments to date to \$20,278.87. Roaring Springs received \$572.91, with \$9,634.42 payments to date in 1984.

December checks represent taxes collected on sales made in October and reported to the Comptroller by November 20.

County 4-H News

John Thomas Hamilton, 15, of Plainview, was named one of six national winners selected by the Cooperative Extension Service in the 4-H electric energy program. He will receive a \$1,000 scholarship from Westinghouse Electric Corp., sponsor of the 4-H Electric Energy Scholarship.

Hamilton was presented his award during the 63rd National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 25-29.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hamilton and a freshman at Plainview High School. He has been a member of the 4-H club for six years. He plans a career as an electrical engineer or attorney.

Hamilton re-wired a barn on his family's ranch. "I've helped with some of the wiring and designing of a new back porch and washroom," he said. The barn was used to house cattle and calves. He rebuilt an old evaporative cooler to keep calves cool.

Hamilton and another 4-H'er did research on wind energy and put together a demonstration,

"Wind Energy — It's a Breeze." The two teamed up to demonstrate how wind energy can be used to operate a pivot sprinkler system.

Hamilton made an electric clock and rebuilt an electric edger and lawnmower earlier this year. "Learning the principles of electrical construction, wiring and grounding is interesting to me," he said. "I like to invent things. Right now I'm developing ideas for a new type of electric fence."

Earlier this year, he met with officials of a local electrical utility to plan an electric energy and community service workshop. They also scheduled a tour of a coal-fired, steam generating plant at Muleshoe.

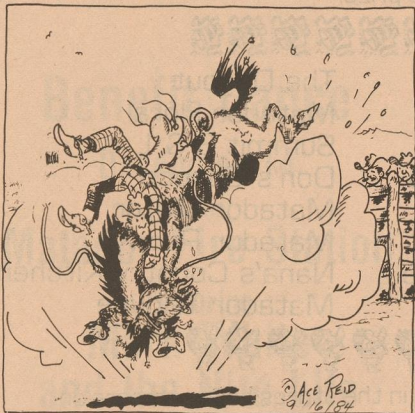

SE RESUELVE Y SE DECRETA POR LA JUNTA DIRECTIVA DEL DISTRITO ESCOLAR INDEPENDIENTE DEL CONDADO DE MOTLEY:

SECTION 1: Que una eleccion tenga lugar en el Distrito Escolar Independiente del Condado de Motley el dia 20 de diciembre de 1984, con el fin de presentar a todos los residentes con derecho de votar del Distrito la siguiente proposicion:

"Debera la Junta Directiva del DISTRITO ESCOLAR INDEPENDIENTE DEL CONDADO DE MOTLEY de los condados de Motley y Floyd en Texas, ser autorizada y otorgada el poder de emitir bonos de dicho Distrito por un total de \$550,000 para edificios escolares, o sea: la construccion y el equipo de edificios escolares en el Distrito y la compra para estos de los terrenos necesarios, y habran de ser caucionados y gravados, tasados y anualmente cobrados los impuestos segun el valor de todas las propiedades imponibles en el Distrito, sin limite en lo que se refiere a la cantidad, para pagar el principal e interes de dichos bonos cuando los mismos venzan, dichos bonos a ser emitidos en una o mas series o emisiones a vencer en forma escalonada o de otra manera por un periodo no mayor que CUARENTA (40) años a partir de la fecha de emision y a devengar interes al porcentaje o porcentajes (a no sobrepasar el porcentaje maximo permitido por la ley al emitir los bonos) a ser determinado a voluntad de la Junta Directiva?"

SECTION 2: Que los lugares para votar para esta eleccion y las personas por este acto nombradas como juez actuante y juez actuante suplente de cada lugar para votar sean los siguientes:

SECTION 3: Que se empleen balotas electorales de papel en dicha eleccion y que se preparen las cuales balotas de acuerdo con elCodigo electoral, V.A.T.S. de manera de permitir a los electores votar "EN PRO" o "EN CONTRA" a la antedicha proposicion que se presentara de la siguiente manera:

"LA EMISION DE BONOS POR UN TOTAL DE \$550,000 Y EL GRAVAMEN DE LOS IMPUESTOS EN PAGO DE ESTO"

SECTION 4: A todos los residentes con derecho de votar del Distrito se les permitira votar en dicha eleccion y durante el dia de eleccion, dichos electores votaran en el lugar para votar nombrado para el recinto electoral del Distrito Escolar en donde tienen su domicilio. Ademas, se dirigira esta eleccion y esta eleccion tendra lugar de acuerdo con las estipulaciones delCodigo Electoral de Texas fuera de las modificaciones hechas por las estipulaciones en elCodigo Educativo de Texas; y como pueda ser requerido por la ley, se imprimiran los materiales de la eleccion y los procedimientos para esta eleccion tanto en ingles como en espanol.

SECTION 5: Una copia fidedigna de esta resolucio y decreto servira como aviso adecuado de dicha eleccion y se publicara dicho aviso, incluyendo una traduccion al espanol de esto, en el periodico de circulacion general en el Distrito al menos una vez diez (10) dias antes de la fecha establecida para la eleccion.

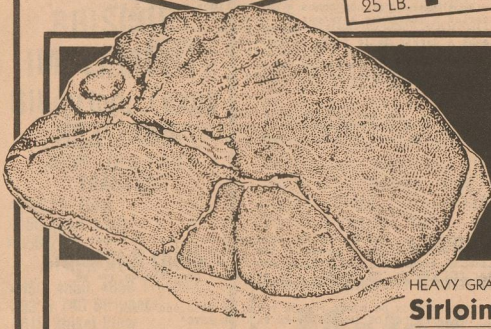
