ability to grow is performance and progeny testing.
Dr. L.R. Sprott, beef cattle specialist with the Texas
Agricultural Extension Service Agricultural Extension Service
and Waller County Extension agent David McGregor worked with the Four $G$ Ranch at
Hempstead in a demonstration regarding the use of progeny testing to increase herd productivity. They started in
1978 on a herd improvement
program using seven differen sires. Records showed that two of the sires were consistently producing superior performing calves. Using these calves as replacement heifers and
through selection of through selection of other
superior sires, herd weaning weights were increased almost 100 pounds increased almos period.
The Matador Ranch here in Motley County is in the process of a similar program, numbering individual herefords cows so that With these records, selection of heifer replacements and sires can be done based on performance along with visual appraisal, thus increasing herd and
