Raby Webb Honored With Retirement Party

One of Motley County's most familiar businessmen for the past 30 years has been Raby Webb, manager of the Higginbotham-Bartlett Company in Matador. Monday a surprise party was given for him by friends to honor him upon his retirement from the company.

Raby, and his wife Dorothy, were honored with the presence of Marvin Fraley, general manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett, and Bub Dier, manager of Lubbock Sash and Door.

The Webb family came to Motley County in 1920, when Raby was four, and settled in the Flomot area. He finished high school at Matador in 1936.

During World War II he served on a bomber crew in the Army Air Corps, was shot down and spent a couple of years in a German POW camp.

He was discharged from the army on November 2, 1946, and went to work for the lumber company at Matador January 1, 1946. He was made manager of the Matador store upon the death of the manager Henry Ford in 1958.

In 1965 he bought a farm in the Flomot area and plans to work the land and manager an alfalfa business.

Donnie Jackson assumed the manager's chair at Higginbotham-Bartlett on Wednesday.

Buffalo Added To Burns Ranch

A ranch near Matador is the temporary home of some unusual shaggy creatures. Leroy Burns recently brought eight buffalo, one bull and seven cows, to his ranch. He plans to take them to property near Floydada "when they are more used to us and us to them."

The herd originated in Oklahoma where Burns purchased them. He had to obtain permits to bring them

from Oklahoma into Texas. They were tested and inoculated to assure they were disease free and would not contaminate or be contaminated by other animals.

Burns said, "The once nearly extinct animals are pretty to look at and are pretty tame. Once they get used to you and your pickup, they will come right up to you."

"Buffalo are hardier than

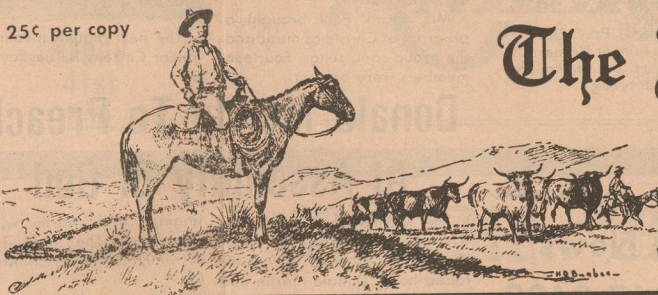
cattle and weather doesn't bother them like it does cows. They live longer than cattle, they don't eat as much as cows, and they hardly ever lose a calf." He added, "The meat from a buffalo is very lean and very low in cholesterol. It tastes very much like lean beef. That is what first interested me in them."

A buffalo bred with a cow produces a beefalo. This cross breed is "larger than cattle and

still has the lean meat of the buffalo," according to Burns. "If all this works out, I hope to raise and sell buffalo," said Burns.

Burns went into the purchase even though buffalo are more costly than cattle to buy, "because they are less costly to keep in the long run." He liked the idea of owning buffalo because "of the kids," he said. "They really love them."

Roaring Springs To Receive Grant

The City of Roaring Springs is expected to receive \$425,000 in community development block grant funds to provide a low-interest, long term loan to the Quail Plastic Corp. to build a polyethylene pipe manufacturing facility in the area, Gov. Mark White said last Thursday.

The proposed 37,000-square-foot facility is contingent on the city's assistance in obtaining partial financing on a low-interest, long-term basis at 4 percent for 10 years, according

to the governor's office.

The \$425,000 in funding, to be administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, will lead to the creation of 94 temporary jobs, the governor's office reports.

White said the award - one of six grants totaling \$2.25 million statewide - constitutes the second quarter of funding under the 1984 Texas Community Development Program's economic development project fund.

FACTS & FANCIES

Photographing Children

Photographing children can seem more like child's play if you follow a few helpful tips from experts:



If children are accustomed to seeing you with a camera, they'll act more naturally.

- Composition—Look before you shoot. Get close enough to the child to fill the frame. Then, determine whether a horizontal or vertical format will be best to fill the frame. Plan the background to eliminate distractions and photograph the child from his own eye level. Place the child off center and don't be afraid to experiment.

- The right equipment can help you to be more creative. Today, there are compact 35 mm cameras that are easy to use and small enough to take anywhere. 

County Agent's Corner

By Ray Minkley

The combination of drought followed by abundant rainfall this fall has set the stage for a serious weed problem in 1985 for most of the state. Loss of grass cover during the extended drought has provided an opening for many weed species. Rainfall received during the fall will provide sufficient moisture for germination and growth of weeds. Winter annuals have germinated and are currently in the rosette stage.

Most of the troublesome annual weeds are easy to control with herbicide if application is made at the proper time and growth conditions. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist tells us, annual weeds such as annual or common broomweed, camphorweed, bitter sneeze-weed and others are easily controlled with 2,4-D when the plants are small and growth conditions are good.

Herbicide mixtures are available for plants that are more difficult to control. These mixtures are available as the commercial formulations Weedmaster (1:3 mixture of dicamba; 2,4-D) and Grazon P—D (1:4 mixture of picloram; 2,4-D). Also, Banvel (dicamba) and Grazon PC (picloram) may be

tank mixed with 2,4—D.

A dense infestation of weeds will significantly reduce production of desirable forage on rangeland. Control of weeds with herbicides is a practice that will produce substantial returns. Results from research and weed control result demonstrations have shown that grass productions will increase when unwanted broadleaf plants are controlled.

In most cases a pound of grass has been produced for every pound of weeds controlled. If a weed problem is identified early in the season, herbicides may be applied at a time to provide most efficient and economical control. Thus, ranchers should be encouraged to check their rangeland for weed infestations in January and February.

Certain weed seeds are important food for some wildlife. Herbicides may be used in a manner to leave some weeds for wildlife food. An early application of 2,4-D will control early germinating annuals such as annual broomweed, but will allow later germinating croton and snow-on-the-mountain to survive. These plants are valuable for wildlife. Also, herbicides may be applied to leave untreated strips.

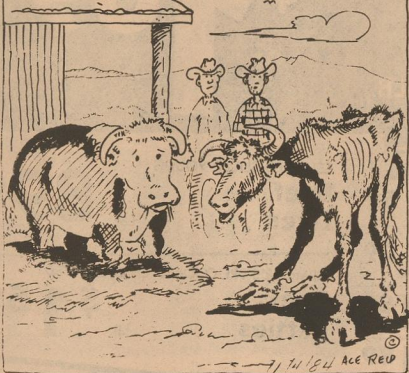

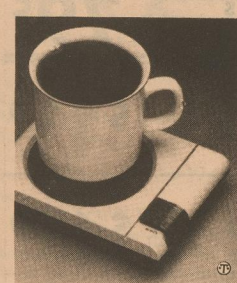

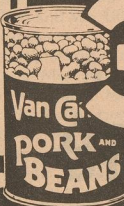
