RITEs HELD AT SILVERTON FOR MRS. GARRISON

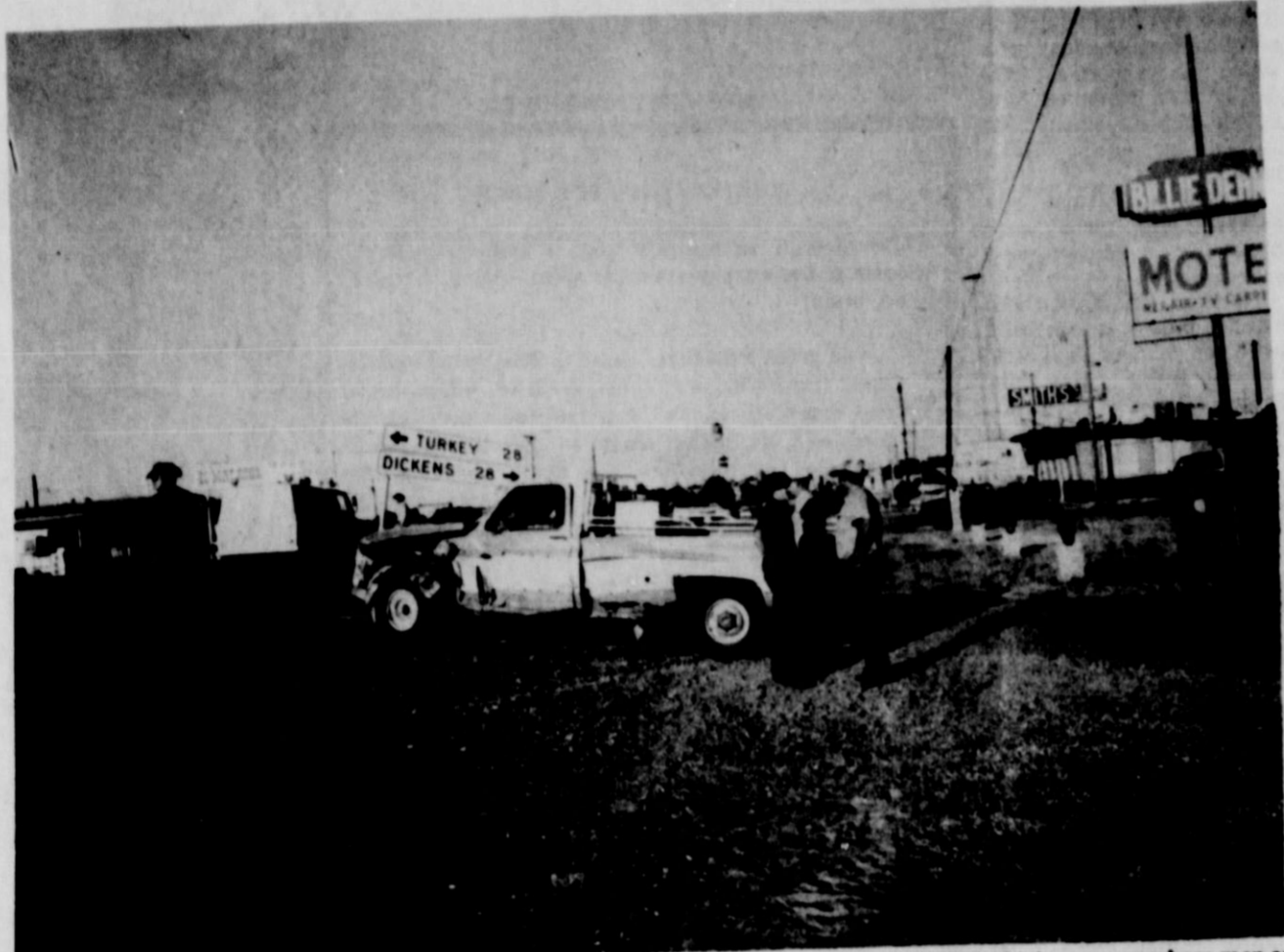

She was born in Pendergrass, Georgia and came to Texas with her family, and on to Motley County in 1900, living in Matador and Plainview, except for two years spent in Washington, D.C. during World War One.

Mrs. Metcalfe was a graduate of Wayland Baptist College and taught school in Plainview and in Dickens County before going to Washington, where she worked for the National Geographic magazine. On returning to Motley County she was employed in the County Judge's office. She was married March 26, 1924 to the late Pryse Metcalfe, who was County Agricultural Agent at the time. They later moved to Weatherford, Texas and then to Franklin, where they made their home.

She is survived by one son, Pryse Metcalfe Jr. of Franklin; one daughter, Mrs. R. E. Smith Jr. of Dallas; her sister, Mrs. J. L. Woodruff, Matador; five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He said the meeting was held in the San Francisco Civic Center and that 27,000 Lions Clubs were represented. He said the total Lions membership worldwide is now over one million.

They registered June 30 and the convention opened on July 3. Memorial services for deceased Lions during the past year were held July 4. Breakfast was served Friday morning in the famous St. Francis Hotel.

President Smith said he was only giving the "side-lights" of San Francisco and not "highlights" of the convention. He admitted knowing that other conventions were in progress in the Golden Gate City but said he did not attend any of them.

He made a comprehensive report and kept the chair open for several minutes, to answer questions. Two new members, Coach Ray Sefcik and Rev. Lloyd Hearn, new pastor of the First United Methodist Church were welcomed into the club. The luncheon meeting was catered by El Matador Restaurant.

Groves is a member of the Matador United Methodist Church. He served many years as Chairman of the Official Board and at present is secretary of the Board of Trustees. He served about ten years as Scout Master in the community and has served on the City Council.

He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Lubbock Scottish Rite Consistory, and of Matador Chapter and Council. He is a Past Master of Matador Lodge No. 824 AF and AM and has been its secretary for about 10 years. He is a Past District Deputy Grand Master of the 112th Masonic District of Texas.

He has been married since 1935 to the former Rita Nichols of Roaring Springs and they have three sons, James Truman, an insurance executive of Arcadia, Calif., Dr. Patrick Groves, employed in the Electronic Defense Laboratory of Pennsylvania's Western Division, of Saratoga, Calif., and Michael Groves, an employee of and member of the Board of Directors of Evans-Monical of Houston.

Algie does not plan to hunt, fish, or travel; he plans to retire when his employment terminates July 25. FORTUNATELY no one was injured Saturday after two wrecks almost on the same spot only 105 minutes apart. The wrecks occurred in front of Billy Dean's Drive Inn on US Highway 70.

Will Pallmeyer, headed west started to cross the south line of traffic when he was struck by a pickup driven by A. C. Piper of Paducah. They were headed east, with Mr. Piper driving and accompanied by Mrs. Piper.

Both vehicles were almost totally wrecked, according to local patrolman Neil Haralson, who investigated the accident and remained long enough to investigate the second one, 105 minutes later.

The pickup which Pallmeyer was driving, was owned by Don Cox. Pallmeyer was working for Cox. Front wheels were so badly bent in that a wrecker was required to loosen them. The pickup was then pulled off the roadway.

L. M. Cox, father of Don Cox, had heard about the accident and came to the scene. He parked his pickup (headed south) well off the highway. At 8:20 an east bound car driven by Mrs. Joan Alexander, of Chickasha, Oklahoma, and accompanied by her son, Todd, skidded off the road and struck the back of L. M. Cox's pickup.

Mrs. Alexander had set her brakes to keep from striking Algie Groves who was apparently entering the south, east-bound line of traffic.

Front end of the Oklahoma car was damaged, but Cox's pickup required only slight repair since it carried a heavy-duty bumper.

Cox, who is a farmer and rancher, said after the accidents, that if he ever comes to town again, he will come horseback.

Porter said that Watson had purchased the pistol from Kirk and Sons about 2:30 Thursday afternoon.

He said he wanted the gun to shoot some stray dogs that had been bothering his horses.

Omer Watson was born April 10, 1912 at Avery, Texas. He married Oleta Valentine December 22, 1929 at Roaring Springs. They moved to Floydada in 1961 where he was a trucker.

Survivors include his wife; one son, W. B. (Son) Watson of Canyon; one daughter, Mrs. Oma Sue Patterson of Dickens; four sisters, Mrs. Lillie Pierce, Roaring Springs, Mrs. Susie Sain, Lamesa, Mrs. Eudria Holcomb, Crosbyton and Mrs. Roberta Russell, Floydada; and seven grandchildren.

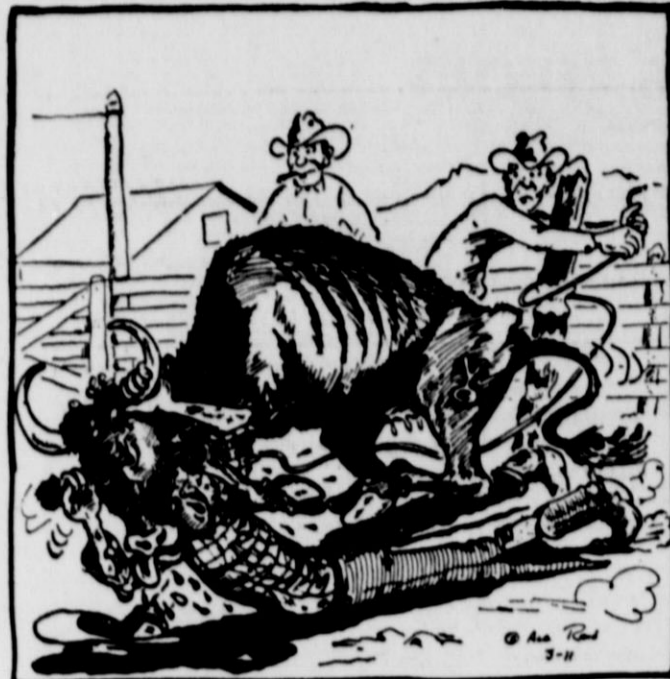
