Minimum Skills Program Changing For MC School

As a result of the passage of House Bill 72 by the Second Called Session of the Sixty-Eighth Texas Legislature, numerous changes in the student assessment of minimum skills program will take place beginning with the 1985-86 school year.

One of the most significant changes occurs with the requirement for exit level testing in mathematics and English language arts. Satisfactory performance on the exit level examination is required for students to receive a high school diploma. Beginning with October 1985, the test will be administered to the eleventh grade students for the first time. Students who do not perform satisfactorily on both the mathematics and English language arts sections of the test will have opportunities in May 1986 and in October and May of their twelfth grade year to pass both sections of the examination. Beginning in 1987, high school

diplomas must be withheld from those students who have not demonstrated satisfactory performance by the end of their twelfth grade year. Students who have been denied diplomas and who subsequently perform in a satisfactory manner on both sections of the test will be issued a high school diploma at that time.

State Board of Education rules concerning the student assessment of minimum skills, which underwent first reading at the December 8, 1984, meeting and second reading at the January 12, 1985, meeting, state that "students enrolled in the twelfth grade during the 1985-1986 school year shall not be required to take the exit level examination." This rule will become part of the Texas Administrative Code once it has undergone the third reading by the State Board of Education, which is scheduled for February 9, 1985.

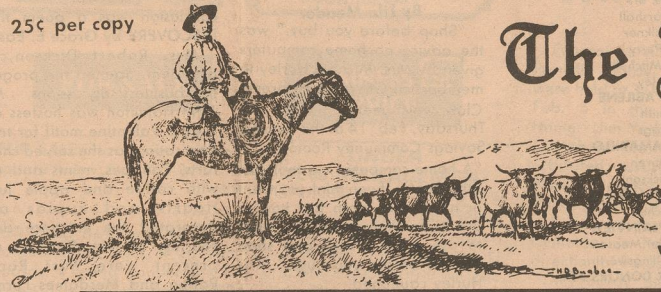
Ranch Not For Sale

Crime-Line Fund Established



Recent burglaries in Motley County have prompted Sheriff Alton Marshall to establish a Crime-Line Fund at the First State Bank to provide reward money for those people who will give information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone committing a crime in the county.

Marshall said that all callers may remain anonymous and will receive a cash reward paid out of the Crime-Line Fund if their information leads to a conviction. The amount of the reward for each case will be determined by the Sheriff's office and may be published in a Crime-Line report or update in the newspaper.

Marshall opened the fund with \$100 and invites businessmen and individuals to

make donations. "The sole purpose of this money is for rewards for crime information," he said. "This is something we all can band together and do to reduce the crime rate here." The Matador Tribune has added \$25 to the fund.

Marshall said residents of the county are urged to be alert and report anything suspicious or out of the ordinary. "With everyone helping us watch, we can catch these criminals and show them they can't get away with it here. We want people to call us whether they think it is important or not."

Crime-Line numbers are 347-2234 or 347-2417. These numbers will be published weekly in the newspaper.

Thieves Hit Company For Second Time

Texas Rangers were called into Matador Wednesday to help in the investigation of the second break-in in 13 days at Matador Motor and Implement Company. The latest break-in took place Monday night, February 18.

According to Sheriff Alton Marshall, the first break-in was on the night of February 5, when 10 tires were stolen. Sizes of the tires were: four P235 Safemart 75 R15 steelbelted, four L78-15 fiberglass and two G78-15 fiberglass.

In the Monday night break-in, fifteen 12 volt car batteries were stolen. They were Safemart

"Top-Kick" batteries with top mounts. Also stolen were light bulbs, a card of battery cable ends, fuses and tubes of glue. A box of tools belonging to "Turk" Anderson was also reported stolen.

"We have a few leads to go on," Marshall said. "We believe there were two and maybe three involved." Small tennis-shoe prints were found at the scene.

"If anyone has information which might be helpful they are urged to contact the sheriff's office," Marshall said.

A cash reward is offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the burglary.

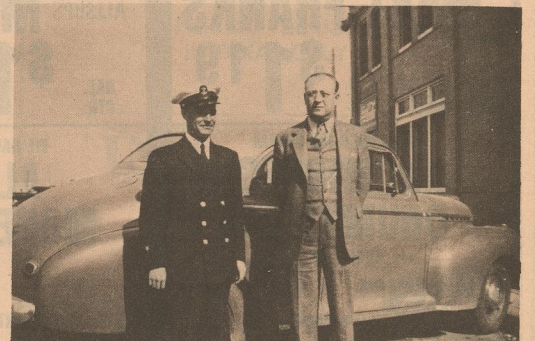

Shop Before You Buy Is Title Of Program

 "Shop before you buy," was the advice on home computers given by Mrs. Michael Hurley to members of GFWC El Progresso Club, which met Thursday, Feb. 14 at the Summit Savings Community Room.

"A home computer is a tool, like other tools. If you think you want or need one, learn first how to use it, and know what you want to use it for. Look and shop around before you buy," Mrs. Hurley cautioned.

A science major with her degree from Abilene Christian University, Mrs. Hurley was introduced by Mrs. R.E. Campbell, Jr., leader for the program on Education, with emphasis on Computer Science.

Mrs. Hurley's husband is girls' basketball coach in Motley County School system and this is their second year of residence in Matador.

Home computers have many practical purposes, Mrs. Hurley told the club. She cited using a computer for figuring family finances, keeping recipe files, and for a number of educational reasons. However, programed discs are expensive, she noted.

"You have to learn the basic computer language in order to get results," she pointed out. "Eventually you will learn to write your own programs. (Blank discs are priced as low as \$5.00). The computer works on the information which is fed into it. Ask questions, read books and ask yourself, 'what am I going to use it for?' then shop around for the machine most suited to your needs."

Mrs. Campbell introduced the program with the yearbook quotation: "What greater or better gift can we offer the republic than to teach and instruct our youth," by Cicero. Her Inspirational Thought at the

conclusion was a poem titled DISCOVERY by Grace E. Easley. Mrs. Robert Dickson, club president, opened the program for business discussions. Macedonia Baptist Started In 1921

EDITOR'S NOTE: Mrs. Marble Barrett is 82 years old this week. We appreciate her taking the time to write this article.

Much of its character was lost by putting it in print.

The Macedonia Baptist Church had a very meager beginning. There were just a few families who came to west Texas from different places to pull cotton. There was no church or school for blacks. The work was good and they decided to stay in Motley County.

We went from one home to another to have weekly prayer meetings and Sunday School We asked our step-mother, Mrs. Mary Bremby, to ask Mrs. Lula Carpenter, Mr. Wileien Carpenter's wife to ask her pastor, Rev. Garrett, if he would come to our house and preach for us some Sunday evening. Rev. Garrett and a number of his members and some of the white people who knew our father, Mr. Joel Daniel Bremby, came with home and held services in our front yard. We sang spirituals which were greatly enjoyed. This was the first preaching we had had since being in Matador. This was August, 1921.

Macedonia Baptist Church was organized the 3rd Sunday evening of August, 1921. We were so happy that a white minister had time for us. Although he was Methodist and we were Baptist, it was the gospel that we hadn't heard since being in Matador.

We had no church building but nevertheless we held Sunday School. Rev. M.A. Thompson was our first pastor. We were finally given a small building near the track where the little Dinkie was kept when it made its trip to and from the junction. We had some white visitors nearly every Sunday night. Mr. and Mrs. Edmondson and their daughter, Maxine and a few others were very supportive of our church and preacher and our needs.

Some of the very early pastors were Rev. I.T. McClanahan, Rev. M. Defreeze, Rev. Collins, Rev. H. C. Mitchell, Rev. J. L. Shellman, Rev. B. H. Campbell, Rev. R. L. Castle, Rev. E. B. Evans, Rev. T. C. Nickleberry, Rev. O. B. Davis, Rev. R. C. Barrett, Rev. Brown, Rev. J. R. Rufus, Rev. J. R. Alexander, Rev. F. L. Phillips and the present pastor, Rev. Joe Horn.

Through the many sotrms, trial and great tribulations. Through faults and failures the church has made wonderful progress these 63 years. Many lost souls have been added to the fold. Many who started the church, are sleeping beneath the clay and have met their Maker/ But we thank God that a few of the charter members now live. They are Mable, Susie, Melvina, Lydia and Prince Bremby and Nathan Walker

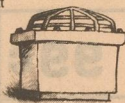
