



In his discourse on "Moral Is- +. sues of the Day," Dr. Howard centered his remarks on the issues involved in wars through the centuries and reviewed conflicts of the early Christian churches. The subject was in keeping with the club's course of study for the year, Action or Apathy.

"War is evil," he declared, "but some things are worse than war. Today's concept is that war is the lesser of two evils."

As justification for the early historical and Biblical wars, Dr. Howard explained that they had to be waged by a "just" authority, for a just cause, with a just intention, and justly waged.

He pointed out that slavery is worse than war, and declared, .. we ought to know more about communism, with relation to our present situation."

Notaries Public Filing Date Set


