**Sixty-Three Rattlers in One
Haul from one Den is Record**

What must undoubtedly be the
biggest lot of rattlesnakes assem-
bled in one pile was being shown
in Floydada last Wednesday by
Jake Brock and others in a party
who had stumbled on to the den in
which the reptiles were hibernat-
ing on Tuesday afternoon on the
Curt Martin ranch on the line of
Floyd and Motley County.
Sixty-five rattlers were included
in the haul, the least probably
fourteen inches long and the long-
est around six feet. Probably twenty
were five feet long or more.
Such a curiosity were the pile of
reptiles that a number of amateur
photographers made kodak pic-
tures of them piled against a south
wall where an effort was being
made to thaw them out in the
warm sun.
Mr. Brock and his party, includ-
ing Bud Pope, Clarence Pope and
Burleson Holladay, of Sand Hill,
on a wolf hunting expedition,
found the varmints apparently
leading into a den on the side of a
bluff just "under the hill". Peer-
ing in they found not a wolf but a

whole circus full of snakes. One
venturesome rattler who had a
portion of his cold body exposed
to the warm sun caused the extinc-
tion of the colony. When Brock
shot this snake it shook its rattlers
and wriggled around, disturbing
the other denizens of the cliff home
"I think we got the whole nest of
them", Mr. Brock said. "We shot
snakes until we ran out of ammuni-
tion."
Some of the rattlers were of the
black diamond variety while others
were just plain rusty brown rattle
snakes with slightly mottled backs.
Some of them were aged with
many rattlers and rings on their
tails denoting several successive
winters and summers, while the
very youngest had only a little
button on which he would have
grown one rattle this summer.
Asked what he planned to do
with the reptiles Mr. Brock said
he suggested he would just have to
render them up and go into the
wholesale snake oil business.

"This work, which is being di-
rected by Extension district agents,
both men and women, should be
finished by April 1," Adams said.
Adams, who has charge in Texas
of this agricultural planning activ-
ity, will select a number of coun-
ties in each Extension district
where the Extension district agents
will meet with the county Ex-
tension agents and the county farm
and home demonstration councils
and set the wheels in motion.
"A continuous flow of economic
information to and from the farm
is very much needed; this program
planning is designed to implement
that and to bring the farmer into
the planning and of the agricultur-
al work," Adams gives as the reason
for going ahead with activity
now.
"Mutual understanding of prob-
lems is needed to have democratic
planning. This program is calcu-
lated to get such an understanding
between the agencies in authority

administering government agricul-
tural programs and farms engaged
in carrying those programs into
effect on their farms," Adams said.
