BERMUDA ONIONS FROM FERTILE SANDY SOIL IS PROFITABLE CROP

J. F. YORK MAKES DEEP SAND YIELD GREATER RETURNS CULTIVATED IN TRUCK
 J. F. York, well known farmer of this section, is fully convinced of the producing value of the deep sandy soil adjacent to Roaring Springs. Altho Mr. York did not set out a large amount of Bermuda onions this year because he believed the market would be loaded by the south Texas product, he has found a ready local market for his entire crop. The price realized from the splendid white onions has been about \$1.75 per bushel. Mr. York says the average yield is about 150 bushels per acre. No irrigation is used and no fertilizer is needed.

With a garden patch of between one third and one fourth acres, several years ago, Mr. York sold over fifty dollars worth of onions. Planting the land in cantaloupes after the onions were gone, he again realized about fifty dollars besides giving away almost as much as he sold. When the cantaloupes were gone he prepared the ground and planted turnips which again paid close to fifty dollars besides giving away many and storing all he needed for the winter. Thus approximately the rate of five hundred dollars in cash, per acre, was realized from the soil in one year.

"With a good dependable market established for garden produce", declared Mr. York, "I would not want more than ten acres to cultivate. I would make more money than several times that amount in cotton. However, right in this section is the best farming land I know of for raising anything. We have never had a failure in the eighteen years I have lived here."

Besides growing truck, Mr. York also has a large orchard and vineyard. Regarding his fruit Mr. York said, "I believe I could have sold a thousand dollars worth of Alberta peaches this year if the frost had not destroyed them."

COUNTY AVERAGE 122 lbs. LINT IN FIVE YEARS

Roaring Springs Territory Gets Better Rating Because Of Higher Average
 Recalling past glories, the portals of the closed bank building in Roaring Springs were opened Tuesday to allow throngs of cotton farmers in this vicinity to secure information, and receive the preparation of filled forms, which with the grower's signatures offers to the Secretary of Agriculture on behalf of the United States a certain number of acres of cotton—and agree to take out of production the crop of cotton now growing in accordance with such regulations as are or may hereafter be prescribed."

Momentum of support by growers was evidenced in an even greater degree Wednesday when several additional assistants were needed to fill out forms. Greater interest and willingness to sign contracts is expected Thursday when special efforts will be concentrated in Roaring Springs territory. The average cotton yield of Motley county as received from Washington, in Matador Monday, was 122 pounds of lint cotton per acre during a period of five years. Farmers in the sandy-land district about Roaring Springs, are being rated a higher average because of the better yield known to have been produced during drouthy years.

The Texas Almanac shows Motley county had 77,506 acres planted in cotton in 1930.

Studios are like people in as much as they all represent various types of personality.

The old Lasky Studio, formerly in Vine Street, long since demolished, had about it an air of aristocratic seclusiveness and a humming buzz of prosperous activity. You sensed it when you were there. Since the studio is confined in its newer quarters, most of this aristocratic feeling has been lost—like a rare old wine that has been watered.

The Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studios strike me as being surcharged with a prosperous commercialism—not exclusive—not arty, but a vast motion picture factory turning out highly successful wares.

When you are at the Universal Studios you feel like apologizing for your intrusion into a large family reunion—it seems all of Carl Laemmle's relatives have gathered here in conclave, and you are but a rank out-sider.

A friendly spirit of camaraderie hangs over the Educational Studios, while Southern elegance is wedded to charming hospitality at the Ince Studio. The administration building here is a replica of Washington's home on the Potomac, even to its boxed hedges and trimmed trees. As you pass by your impression would be, "Oh this is the home of some wealthy man". Never is the sordid spirit of money-making manifested.

At the Hal Roach Studios you sense a courteous friendly spirit. A thoroughbred lives here, he treats you as an equal, no snobbishness, but friendly elegance.

The Independent Studios that spill along Sunset Boulevard and the adjacent intersecting streets, taken collectively, seem small,

cheap and tawdry. But you have a vague suspicion that all this common-place drabness may prove to be the culture medium for the propagation of unknown genius. Beautiful lilies, as you know, sometimes grow out of the mire and slime.

The landscaping about the First National Studios is the most beautiful of all. Once in the studio confines, however, a sort of cold indifference, an impersonal feeling, takes hold of you. But physically it is most attractive.

The Columbus Studios strike me as a poor workman that has been suddenly raised by a twist of Fate to affluence. He is still ill at ease in his unaccustomed finery. But you can see he has risen from his previous state of servitude.

When you stand before the Charlie Chaplin Studios you think you have been transported to England, so English is its architecture. But once inside and the place seems to be surcharged with the Chaplin personality, with his genius, smiles and tears commingling.

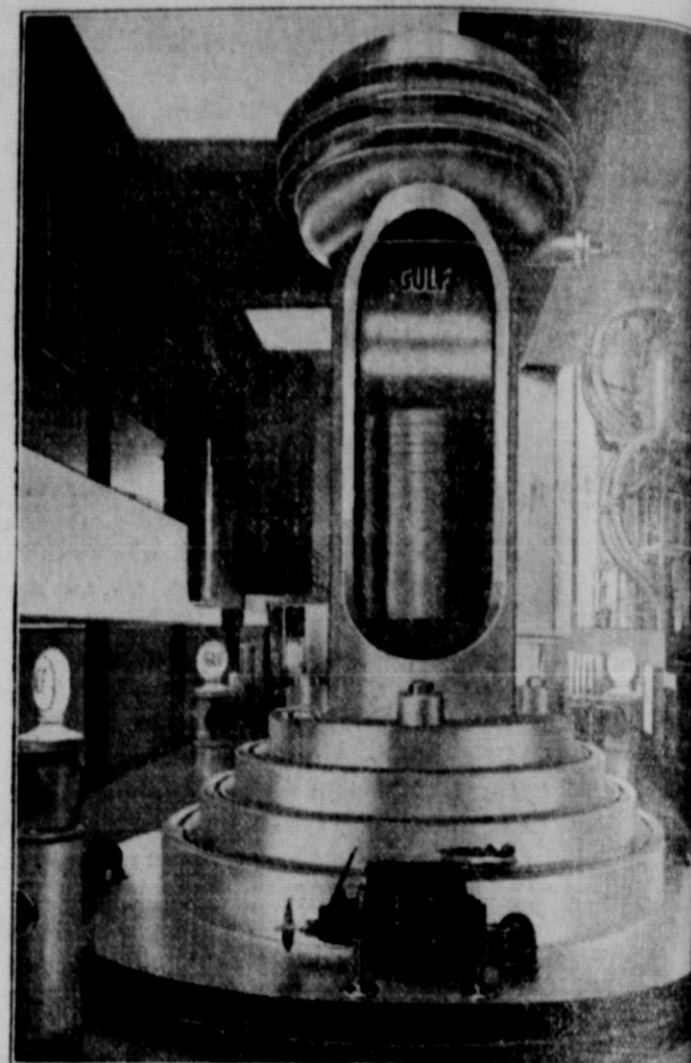
