Vaccinations At Rapid Pace

HUNDREDS of horses have been vaccinated in Motley County this week as horse owners seek protection from Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE) which has destroyed 10,000 horses in Old Mexico and swept across the border to kill hundreds of valuable horses in South Texas. Five states are under tight quarantine as the USDA seeks to bring the epidemic under control. The disease continues to spread. At noon yesterday no report of oss in the South Plains area had een received.
