Highway Employment Begins Soon

Actual Work To Be Started
November 10; Complete
In 4 Months

REGISTRATION OF 200
MEN WILL BE NEEDED

Three Days Of Employment
Each Week As Relief
Measure

Homer Sheats, Motley county Chairman of the Texas Relief Committee received notice this week that contracts can be let and actual construction on Highway 28 west for 6.316 miles of improvement would begin November 10, to be completed by March 15, 1934.

Labor requirements which must be filled through applications made to the Matador office for relief employment, or to a representative of the office in the various communities of the county, include: 1 Shovel operator, 2 tractor operators, 2 blade operators and 1 roller operator; 20 trucks and drivers, 10 teamsters and 50 laborers.

The compensation will be 35 cents per hour for unskilled labor working 8 hours per day, and 45 cents per hour for skilled labor working 8 hours per day. Two shifts will be employed, working 3 days each per week.

Mr. Sheats declared yesterday that it will be necessary for 200 men to make application to fill the requirements of 86 employees needed. Two 3 day shifts of 86 each per week with a 20 per cent allowance for "cut-backs".

To date only 55 applications have been made for the employment.

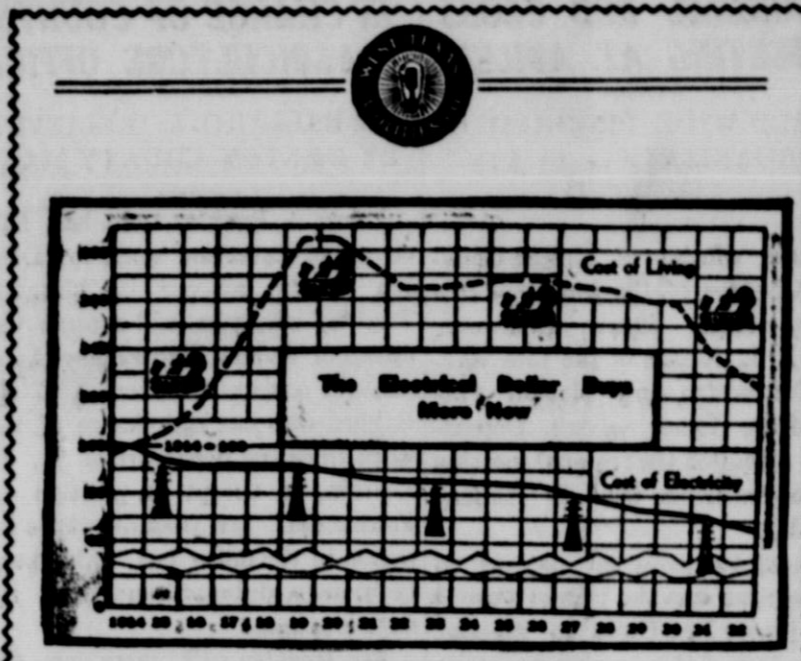

Her eyes glow with a strange mature understanding not developed by the few physical years she has lived on this plane.

Cora Sue Collins was born in Beckley, W. Va., she has resided two years in California and has been in almost twenty pictures. Her debut was made in "The Unexpected Husband" with Zasu Pitts and Slim Summerville—she will also be remembered as Norma Shearer as a child in "Smiling Through". This child often makes up her own dialogue which is most unusual, but the director permits it as he realizes the appropriateness of it from the child's standpoint.

When "Queen Christina" starring Greta Garbo comes your way by all means see it and I am sure you will agree with me that Cora Sue Collins is a remarkable child and she will ingrain herself in your affections and you will press her to your heart with a loving vehemence.

While I am on the subject of this picture, permit me to give you a first hand impression of Greta Garbo. Garbo is above all else an aristocratic personality, not beautiful physically its her inner self that casts the spell. A brooding, mystical abstraction hangs about her, she seems to ignore reality, to slough off the present tangible, she has her being on a finer, subtler, higher plane. She exudes a mysterious charm, the wisdom of the ages lurks in those dark brooding sapphire eyes—the wisdom of a Mona Lisa sans the smile. Two things of physical import obtrude on your consciousness—her walk and her voice. He walk may be better described as a glide, with an undercurrent of rhythm about it like some creature of the wilds slinking through the undergrowth.

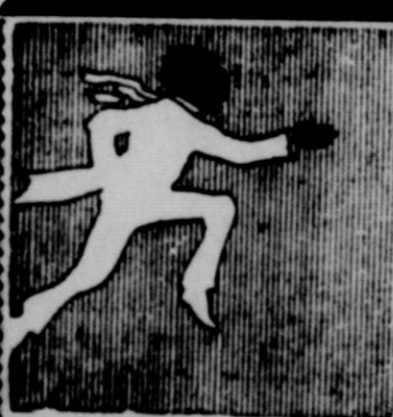
