SHERIFF AND DEPUTIES MAKES BIG RAID

Sheriff Claud Warren, deputies F. P. Dawson and G. W. Green and two special deputies raided a Negro gambling dive last Saturday night on the Mitchell place in the vicinity of Roaring Springs. 32 Negroes were arrested and placed in the County jail at Matador. Fines to the extent of \$550.40 were assessed and collected. The Sheriff and his deputies entered the building to make the arrest, searching the negroes and getting about 15 revolvers. A Negro by the name of Doc. Saddres to put up his hands as requested by deputy Dawson, stated that he was "the house man, and that he was not going to let any damn man take his gun" reached for his gun to make a play, forcing Dawson to shoot him to death, three shots were fired before the negro fell. The charges filed against the negroes were: running a gambling dive and making chalk been in connection with a dance hall.

Things You Should Know

Tuberculosis Germs Not Inherited.

Most anybody nowadays can
write or speak intelligently of tu-
berculosis. My little neighbor, a
lad of ten, not yet in "Junior High"
refers gravely to "T-B" when con-
versing with his play-fellows; the
learned scientists and the statisti-
cian bewilder us with technical
facts. What to do with the dis-
ease however—remains a dark and un-
fathomable secret. We have found
out to a certainty that its cause is
a definite bacillus, a living, virile
organism, shaped like a rod, multi-
plying by dividing itself into short-
er sections when each individual
reaches maturity. Colonies assem-
bled produce peculiar tissue-growth
—tubercles,—nature trying to
ward off the intruder. When the
bacilli develop destructive power
within the tubercle, its walls break
down, and general tuberculosis re-
sults.

The outstanding fact to be re-
membered in tuberculosis is, it is
communicable. People do not in-
herit germs—they are acquired. A
child may be infected, and harbor
the bacteria for years without
symptoms. Let him get influenza,
or pneumonia or even a severe
"cold" and the tubercle bacilli
awaken to do serious mischief.
Bring up a positive conclusion:
All tubercular patients should be
subjected to rules of quarantine.
They should be taught to save and
burn all expectorated matter, and
should sleep alone, using individ-
ual bed-linen. Their towels should
be kept separate and sterilized by
boiling.

The germs when dry, blow every-
where! A dozen school children
racing along in their glee inhal-
ing millions of these deadly germs!
If there is an ordinance in YOUR
town against spitting on the side-
walk, make it include the entire
street at your next meeting!

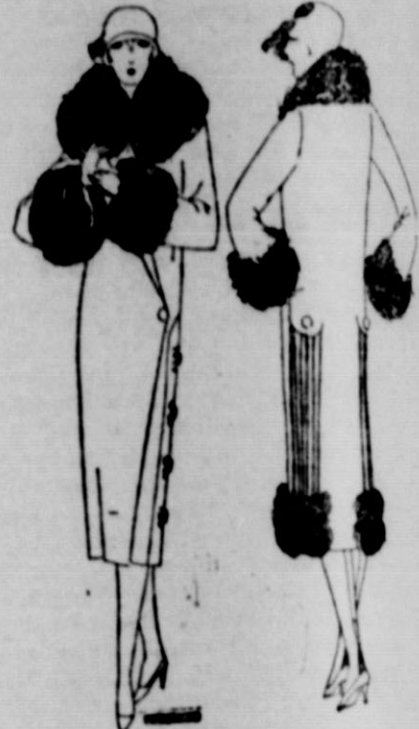

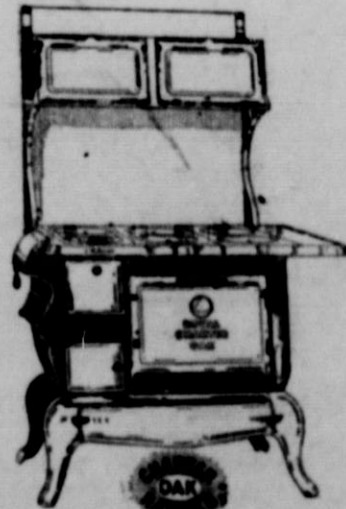

Our crops are worth billions every year. That's encouraging. In our mines and oil wells are hundreds of billions stored away, and that's encouraging.

The unused water power of this nation is worth tens of billions, and other tens of billions for irrigation afterward. That's encouraging, and also the fact that in the atmosphere above there are countless billions worth of nitrogen, which can be brought down by electrical power.

But there is a greater wealth, and its figures more important.

One single city, New York, has for the first time in its history MORE THAN ONE MILLION CHILDREN ENROLLED IN ITS PUBLIC SCHOOL CLASSES.

That is the REAL wealth of today, and the real power of the future.

Take away these children, and this country, with all its mines, water power and fertile soil, would amount to as little as it did when a few Indians possessed it and spent their time murdering each other.

Your only hope is that the Government will know enough to provide the flying machines necessary to take people to that land and to protect it.

John Hulbert, official executioner at Sing Sing prison, quits his job after killing 140 in the electric chair. For this he has been paid \$21,000—\$150 for each killing.

Will the retiring executioner get meet, on the other shore, the 140 that he sent on ahead? If so, what will they say of each other? Thank him, very likely.

It is difficult to find another executioner, because he must be a trained electrician, willing to kill for a living. It should be not difficult but IMPOSSIBLE to find such a man in a civilized state.

CHEVROLET NEWS LETTER

The marvels of modern automotive precision and production methods are depicted in a series of 42 enlarged photographs now being shown to the public at the sale rooms of all American and Canadian Chevrolet dealers.

The photographic series covers the same interesting operations in the manufacture of Chevrolet cars which would be shown a visitor at the factories.

One of the most spectacular pictures shows a huge drop forge hammer weighing 140,000 pounds. Hammers of this type are used to make the Chevrolet crankshafts. The falling weight is a three-ton

block of steel which is lifted by steam. It is so responsive to the touch of the skilled operations that they are able to place a watch on the bottom die block and strike it with the hammer so delicately that the crystal remains unbroken. Each hammer will forge 880 crankshafts during a 10-hour day.

Other striking features of the exhibit are pictures of a monster machine which uses 300,000 am-

pers of electricity to weld the Chevrolet one-piece banjo-type rear axle housing; a machine which drills 32 holes simultaneously in the bottom of the Chevrolet cylinder block; a rotary mill machine which finishes at one operation the lower side of six cylinder blocks, and a 62-ton press which forms a Chevrolet fender at one stroke.

The individual grinding of valves, delicate balancing of pistons so that every piston in each motor weighs the same and many interesting micrometric inspections also are illustrated in the remarkable exhibit.

Danger in 6 O'clock Dinners

In this letter, I would like to record some observations gleaned from many years of first-hand experience. Suppose I meet with one hundred men, all over eighty years of age, and find them without exception, capable, busy, and happy. What more natural thing, than to inquire how these men attained such magnificent power. They must have lived right, for penalties are sure if men live wrong. Here are the outstanding factors: They are all breakfast-eaters. Not one of them indulges in six-o'clock dinners! A gentleman of one hundred and one years, told me he never started the night on a full stomach—his warning was "he couldn't sleep after a full supper." A lady of ninety-two informed me that breakfast was her best meal, and that the harder she worked, the less she ate at night. At my interview, she was alert, steady-nerved, keen of hearing, and looked a woman of fifty.

On the other hand, suppose I am consulted by a hundred men, aged from forty-five to sixty, all with dangerous symptoms and compelled to "lay off business." Every man with high blood-pressure, many with hopelessly damaged kidneys, some with paralysis, most of them city dwellers, all of them overweight, all of them stricken down "in the harness." Dietary about like a hurried cup of coffee and a splash of cereal for breakfast, and a "hot dog" or a pie-pan for lunch; a heavy afternoon's mental toil; a dinner beyond computation in all that the land affords. To bed at midnight, or later—up at nine o'clock next morning—and repeat. These men never reach eighty. We may draw our own conclusions.

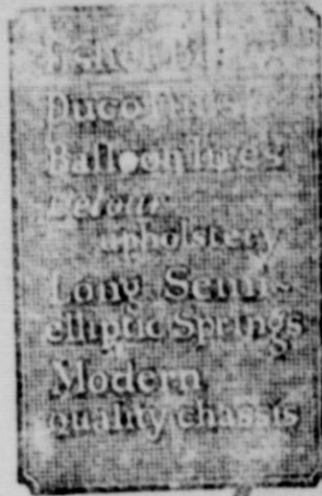

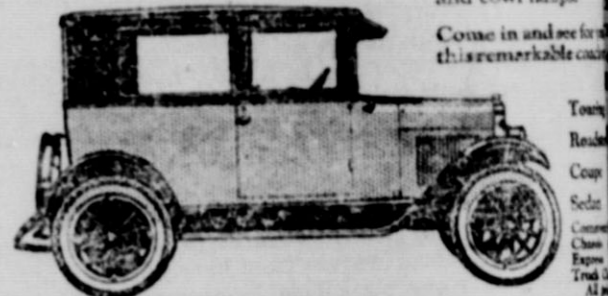

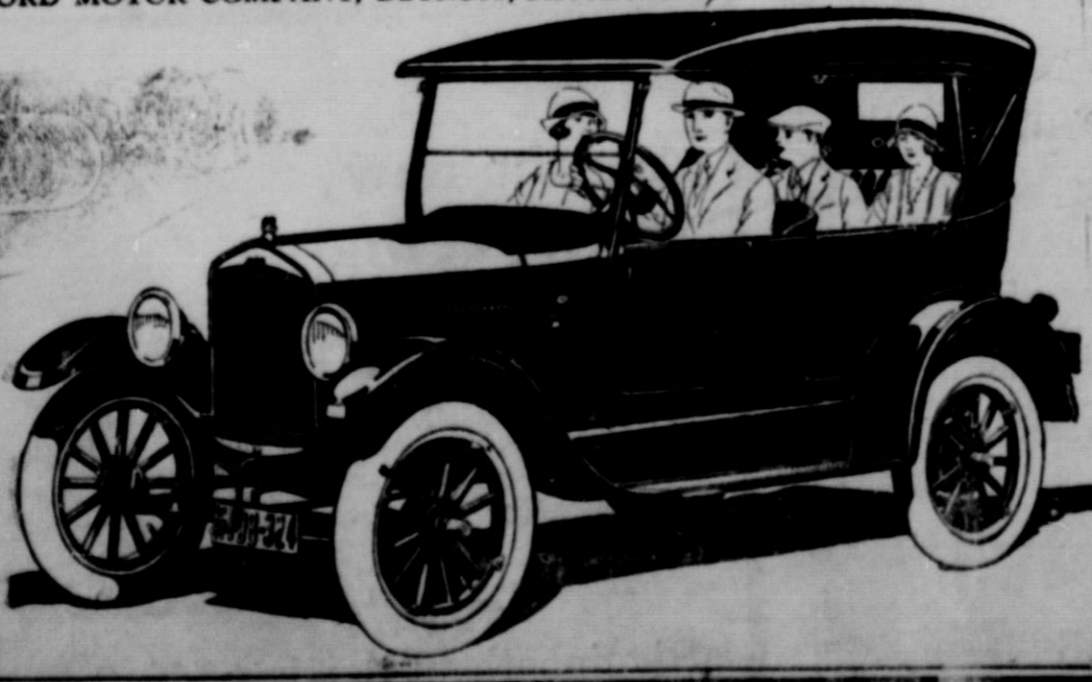
