



It has no scientific meaning, but no mother is mistaken in what it imby a drowsy, feverish condition of the baby, and by a sharp, ringing, yet hoarse cough, unlike that of most other diseases. The symp-toms are intensified as night approaches. At bedtime the little low is hard to arouse—again the hoarse, loud, brassy cough. The pulse is quick, the breathing rapid.

Other, and more serious diseases of the little throat, exhibit radically different symptoms; diptheria has very slight if any cough. Scarlet fever and measles begin with slight, frequent, rather loose cough, with no outcry during the effort.
