Local DPS Trooper helping with Shuttle Columbia debris recovery

Local DPS Trooper, Mark Gumaer, has been helping with the Shuttle Columbia recovery. The tragic incident causing the Shuttle to explode occurred on Saturday, February 1. Debris was scattered over four states, including California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. The entire crew lost their lives. Two Texas natives were among

those seven astronauts, Commander Rick Husband and Pilot William McCool both had ties to Lubbock. Other crew members were Mission Specialist Laurel Clark, Mission Speicalist Kalpana Chawla, Payload commander Michael Anderson, Mission Specialist David Brown, and Payload speciaist Iian

Mark is one of twenty-one members of the Texas State Dive Team. The team consists of commissioned law enforcement officers, including Texas Rangers, highway patrolmen and other law enforcement officers. When needed, the team is called out to assist other agencies in recovering evidence from water, such as vehicles, weapons, other types of evidence and bodies.

"We may have to dive in any type of water from the ocean to septic tanks," Mark explained. Divers wear Superlite helmets and dry suits to keep them from getting wet. "The only part of our body that gets wet is our hands," he said. When diving in a sewer or an arsenic lake (which is a contaminated, poisonous lake), the divers use a special suit to protect them from any contamination.

Mr. Gumaer and other members of the dive team have been searching for Shuttle pieces in Lake Toledo Bend, near Hemphill, Texas, at the Louisiana-Texas border. He was first called to this site about a week after the incident. He just returned from a two-week recovery effort at the site, and may possibly be called back.

"At this point, we have not yet recovered any piece of the Shuttle from the lake," Mark said. "We will assist in this recovery operation as long as the Federal Government needs us."

Also assisting with the Shuttle recovery in the Lake Toledo area, are dive teams from the Navy, Coast Guard, Harris County, and Corpus

Mark has been a member of the State Dive Team for 1 1/2 years. Last year he participated in 10 dives. "When I'm called, I don't always know all the de-tails," he said. Most dives are to recover evidence such as murder weapons. "Usually the suspect has lied about the location where the weapon was dis-carded," he explained. "I have recovered everything from match box cars to weights and

bicycles, in attempts to locate murder weapons."

One of the first dives Mark participated in was one he will always remember with sadness. He was called to Possum King-dom to join other dive teams to search for a lost 5-year-old boy. "From what I understand the boy had wandered away from his family during a hike and was lost," Mark said. The boy was reported missing a few days before Christmas, 2001.

On December 6, 2001, not long after diving to search for the child, Mark recovered the boy's body. "The situation was very sad," he said. "Something like this gives you mixed feelings. On one hand I was glad to be able to give the family closure, but it was very sad to find the child's body. It's something I won't forget."

Mark is proud to be a part of the State Dive Team and finds the work to be rewarding. He applied for a position on the team after reading in a state newsletter about openings. The application consisted of a physical training test, a doctor's physical, practice dives and oral interviews. interviews.


"The process of shuttle recovery is a very tedious one," Mark explained. "According to reports, more than 12,000 shuttle pieces have been located, a fraction of the 2 million parts that made up Columbia.

The debris was taken to Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana, where it is being organized," he continued. "I am glad to be a part of this very important recovery operation."

Mark and wife Mitzi moved to Matador in July, 1997. They were both raised in Quinlan and graduated from high school there. Mark joined the Army where he served four years as a Military Policeman. After returning to Quinlan he entered East Texas State University in

Commerce and soon after was accepted to the Quinlan Police Academy. He worked as a Quinlan Police officer for two years and was a member of that department's dive team.

Mark and Mitzi were married in November of 1996 and soon after he entered the DPS Academy. Upon his graduation the couple moved to Matador. He has worked in this area as a DPS officer for the past six

The Hitchin' Post in downtown Roaring Springs offers a little bit of everything to custom-ers. If so desired, one might eat a delicious meal, wash their clothes, rent a movie, grocery shop and play the lottery all in the same location. That is specifically the idea that owners, Gary and Lisa Simpson, had in mind when they opened the business last year.

The Simpsons had been in the cafe business since October, 2001, when they took over LaNita's Cafe, from Mrs. Simpson's sister, LaNita Perryman. "LaNita decided to get married and move to Arlington, so she more or less dumped it in my lap," Lisa explained with a laugh. LaNita, who was visiting at the time of the interview, said, "I knew Lisa and Gary could take over and I wanted to keep it in the family.'

Lisa didn't lack for experience. She had worked in the cafe from the time LaNita obtained ownership of the Cafe in 1998. "I started out washing dishes," Lisa said, "I was too shy to wait tables." Lisa has come a long way since then, although she still washes dishes from time to time.

LaNita's Cafe until they moved she's in town and is actually to their present location, just across the street, to the former location of Feed Trough Steakhouse and Bar. "When the larger building became available, Gary and I prayed about it and everything just seemed to come together," Lisa said. "We wanted to help Roaring Springs, to keep a cafe open and make additions."

The couple immediately started working on their new building and opened the Cafe in its new location and new name in January, 2002. Gary and Lisa planned to convert the side of the building which formerly housed a bar into a convenience store. "Gary had always said that he just knew a Cafe and

Convenience Store combination would work," Lisa said. With a lot of work and elbow grease, the couple opened the Conve-nience store in August, 2002. "We put in a lot of hours

painting and getting everything ready," Lisa explained. "Gary made fun of me, saying that I would try to decorate one wall before we got another one painted." Their work paid off and they now offer groceries, a washeteria, rental movies, video games, a food bar with Gary's speciality barbecue brisket and other food items, and lottery ticket sales in the convenience store. In addition to all this, the store has a gift shop, offering unique gift items from Lisa's mother and aunt, PeeWee Perryman and Carolyn Fletcher. "Gary was right, Lisa said, "the Cafe and Convenience Store combination is working

"Our main goal was to have a grocery store in Roaring Springs and keep the Cafe open, while trying to help Roaring Springs," she explained.

The business is a family affair. Lisa's mother, PeeWee, cooks at the cafe and is known for her delicious cobblers. The couple kept the name LaNita still helps out when planning to move back to Roaring Springs with her husband in a few months. Gary's mother, Von Simpson, works in the store in the afternoons, and Gary and Lisa's sons, Eric, 11, and Britt, 8, help out after school. Eric works at the store and Britt, according to Lisa, "mostly helps clean up the leftovers." But," she says with pride, "the boys do whatever they can to help, and we're trying to teach them the value of a dollar."


Although not raised in Roaring Springs, Lisa and LaNita said they always felt that Roaring Springs was home. They visited their grandparents, Milton and Modean Brooks every summer and vacations and knew al-

most everyone in town. "We all have moved to Roaring Springs," Lisa said. "This is our home." Their brother, Danny and family also live in Roaring

Smith, County Judge; Commissioners Precinct 1, Ronnie Davis; Precinct 2, Donnie Turner; Precinct 3, Franklin Jameson; and Precinct 4, Russell Alexander; and County Clerk, Kate Hurt.


Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Outstanding bills were reviewed and approved. Reports were reviewed from the Treasurer, Tax-Collector, County Agent, Justice of the Peace, and Library. Commissioners approved all reports.

The Court approved Commissioner Alexander's sworn affidavit that he submitted for

record that he personally owns Alexander's Fuel & Service and that he will abstain from voting on any motions that involve his

Roy Hobbs representing The First State Bank of Matador on the County Depository and Investment Account Policy, explained to the Court that the County could divide their CD into more than one, making one a longer term CD. Mr. Hobbs informed the Court that First State Bank waives all service fees and if needed, monies may be transferred without any penalty. 



Program on recycled denim presented to Do Gooders

Mrs. Calvert was dressed for the occasion wearing a decorated denim vest and Levis. She gave each one attending a "no doze" mint though it proved not necessary for her informative and interesting subject.

Highlights of her presentation: Denim is a heavy coarse cotton, in 1908 blue denim was made into work clothes.

The denim was 6 oz to 9 oz weave. Pants were priced at 41 cents to 85 cents a pair, denim jackets were 50 cents to 65 cents depending on the style. Boys blue denim pants for ages 12 to 17 were 38 cents a pair.

Our denim today is still available in different weights, but the prices have increased from \$15.00 to \$100.00. Most farmers have Levi, Wrangler or Lee on that little leather tag on a hip pocket.

It is considered denim has always been recycled as years ago it was used in quilts for warm bed covering, bedding for pets and as rags. However, today denim is used when making decorative wearing apparel and household items. You can dress it up or cut it up as it is a sturdy fabric with countless uses. Blue jeans have become a standard

item of dress at every event. Don't throw away your "Old Blue Denim" if you have no use for it, someone else does.

Monday, March 17th is the final date to purchase sorghum forage (sudex) and watermelon NAP coverage. The application fee is \$100.00 for each crop. A producer is not required to pay over \$300.00 for NAP per coun-try or \$900.00 for a producer who has multiple counties.

To be covered under NAP, watermelons must be planted by June 1, 2003, and the acreage reporting date is July 15, 2003. Non-irrigated sudex in-

tended for grazing must be planted by June 30, 2003, and irrigated sudex intended for forage (hay) must be planted by July 15, 2003.

The Texas State FSA Committee has determined policies established by the federal Crop Insurance Corporation would be applicable to eligible crops un-der the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program.

Crops will be considered in-

eligible for Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance in 2002 and the following crop years if any of the following apply.

* The crop is planted following small grains that have reached the heading stage in the same calendar year unless the acreage is irrigated or adequate measures are taken to terminate the small grain crop prior to heading and less than 50 percent (50%) of the small grain plants reach the heading

stage.
* The Crop is planted following small grain acreage that is nonirrigated and from which a hay crop was harvested (including a harvested small grain hay crop regardless of the percentage of small grain plants that reached the headed stage).

* The crop was grazed past the established pull off date for the applicable small grain.

The day ended with a debriefing and planning meeting for another great fire school next year. A big thanks to our wives for all that they did, and thanks to everyone who attended and helped out.

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
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
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
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
