Texas Democrats Escape After 20 Years As National Party "Political Captives"

Changes In The Texas Constitution . .

This week the Tribune publishes for the third time the eleven proposed constitutional amendments that the people of Texas will vote on in the November general election. The amendments are important news. One Texas weekly, the Gorman Progress, which did not receive an order to publish the amend. ments, set them and printed them at its own expense as a matter of vital information for readers.

The constitutional amendments are another of the processes by which the people can register their will and express their desire in a democratic form of government. It is a power that rests solely with the people. Neither the Supreme Court of Texas, the Governor nor the Legislature can do anything about changing the constitutional laws of the state unless the people of the state authorize it to be done by their vote.

That is why it is so important that every citizen should read the contents of these published notices carefully, and think about them from now until November. They are not something to be passed over lightly. These amendments, if voted on favorably, are going to be a permanent part of our state constitution by which the Legislature in making laws. The Gov. ernor in administering laws and the Supreme Court in interpreting laws, must abide.

One of the amendments is a fulfillment of a campaign promise made two years ago by Governor Allan Shivers. It provides for more assistance to elderly people over 65, the needy, blind and needy children. The Governor promised he would submit it to the Legislature for consideration. It is now up to the people.

Every Texas citizen needs to exercise more interest in fundamental government and the constitutional amendments have to do with the very heart of fundamental government. It is the duty of every citizen to be informed on these changes in our constitution.


